RAILROADS ARE CUT TO MEXICAN CAPITAL

Trains Bearing Refugee Americans Are Held Up—Many Americans in Capital.

Yere Cruz, April 21.—The second section of the morning train from Mexico City filled with refugees Americans and a special train of refugees have both been held up somewhere along the road to Yere Cruz, presumably by General Ma.

Telegraphic communication with Mexico City was cut tonight, and it is assumed that the railroad also are cut.

There are several hundred Americans in Mexico City, including the charge d'affaires, Nelson O'Shaughnessy, his wife and child. Mexicans have protested vehemently against the suggestion that passengers on the trains may be badly treated. At a late hour tonight the American forces in Yere Cruz numbered 1,300. The first landing party consisted of more than 500.

The second detachments landed two hours later.

Secretary of state Bryan, himself, often referred to in debate, Secretary of War Garrison, Secretary of the Navy Daniels, Postmaster General Burleson, Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo and Secretary of the Interior Clegg, all sat about the chamber. They listened eagerly and held whispered conferences as the discussion progressed. The diplomatic gallery was filled with members of the secret service corps with Ambassadors

Spring-Rice, of Great Britain, at the head of the house. The news from Yere Cruz spread through Washington, through the speculations of every walk of life, packed the galleries and crowded the corridors of the senate wing of the capital.
