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WIDOW AKES POISON
WHEN KOSSUTH DIES

Son of the Great Hun Patriot Passes in Budapest—Wedded the Widow of Friend.

Budapest, May 25.—Francis Kossuth, son of the great Hungarian patriot, died here today, aged 74. He had been ill for many months, and his death did not come as a surprise.

Immediately after Kossuth's death his widow attempted to commit suicide by taking poison. Her condition is considered serious.

In January last, during a crisis in his illness, Kossuth was married to his sick bed to Countess Marysary, widow of his life-long friend. She had been the wife of Count Benyovsky.

Kossuth was born at Budapest on January 12, 1841, and was the eldest son of Louis Kossuth.

He was taken prisoner by the Austrians, and was kept in prison for many months. Then he was liberated, but was exiled and sent to Asia Minor, where he joined his father, and together they went to London.

Young Kossuth was educated at London University college, and was a member of the cabinet of the late Lord Russell.

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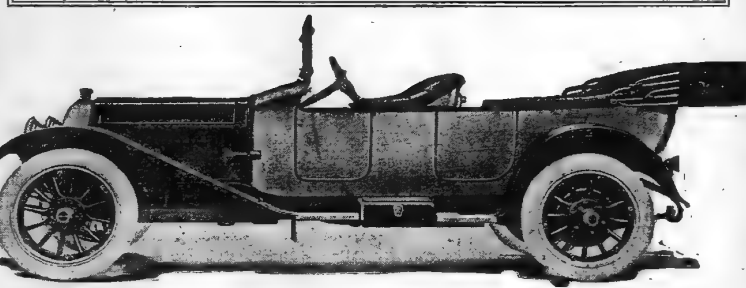
