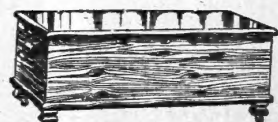

**German Ships Deliver Heavy Cargoes at Puerto Mexico—230 Machine Guns in Lot—One German Ship Held by Funston.**

Washington, May 27.—Announcement was made to the United States government in Mexico, which had been kept in the dark of the German situation in Vera Cruz, that the American occupation of Vera Cruz was reported to have been ended today, at Puerto Mexico.
