Location for the Theological School and the University East of the Mississippi Not Yet Selected.

**PROPOSALS ARE ASKED BY BISHOP CANDLER**

Several Cities Are Bidding for the Eastern University. Committee Will Shortly Announce Its Choice.

Birmingham, Ala., June 17.—Dallas, Texas, will get the Methodist university to be located west of the Mississippi river according to formal announcement of a special session of the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church, recently held in Oklahoma City, which is in session now. The discussion was suspended to handle the situation growing out of the break with Vanderbilt university.

The location of the school of theology and the university to be located east of the Mississippi has not been decided upon.

Statement by Bishop Candler.

The committee on the Eastern University, chairmen, Warren A. Candler, and the following statement tonight:

"Among the main duties with which the general conference charged the commission, it was to ascertain the earliest possible time for the establishment of a school of theology where young men may be prepared for the ministry, and the location of the same.

At the action of the general conference the commission, to establish this school of theology separate from any other institution of learning, or any other plan of education, under the control and management of the church.

The commission was also instructed to do all that is necessary of establishing any institution or institutions of higher education, of the grade of a university, and it was empowered to recruit and add members to the establishment and location of such an institution or institutions.

The general conference took also the following action: "We express the belief that the school should be located in the river river the same institution and one west of the Mississippi river."

"In this meeting at Birmingham the commission, called to the immediate, given to it by the general conference and took the preliminary steps to obey the action given to it."

"The Southern Methodist university, located at Dallas, Texas, will be the institution west of the Mississippi when all the steps have been taken and finally adjusted."

Proposals Asked for Eastern School.

"For the location of the school of theology and the university east of the Mississippi river several plans are under consideration and the commission appointed a committee to consider these and any other plans that may arise, and to make recommendations to an adjourned meeting of the commission within the next few weeks, when final action will be taken."

"The location of such an institution in the place which may secure it will mean much to the community, and bring in the learned and consecrated men in its faculty and a large body of students from every part of the country. The chairman of the committee to receive and consider proposals from the various places was given detailed charge by Mr. Candler, Warren A. Candler, of Atlanta, who is chairman of the commission."

"The commission promises great results for the Methodist church and the general cause of Christian education in the south."

The Vanderbilt Case.

The commission also considered the results of the various annual and general parroting conferences all the rights the church may have in Vanderbilt university.

constitutional information bureau, disappeared with the rest. Alberto Paul Carranza's agent in charge of the treasury department at Juarez, escaped to American soil, although of his family he was the only one to be taken.

In addition to the disappearance of the Carranza officials from the border port, \$1,000,000 in constitutional currency is missing. It was told today that Carranza's agents had been sent to Chihuahua by Villa and taken to Chihuahua.

Closing of the telegraph office prevented news arriving from the south. Then, in official touch with the situation in eastern Mexico, Carranza had been thrust out of office through Carranza and western Coahuila. Alberto Paul Carranza, constitutional agent at Juarez, today issued an invitation for the Spaniards of the La Gomera Club to a dinner at his home. They had been forced to leave Mexico by Villa's order, just after the fall of Porfirio. De La Garza's statement said:

"The order from General Villa especially ordered that Carranza's departure was made necessary in view of the profound hostile sentiment against these Spaniards in the northern states. They are normal in that region and the Spaniards may return to their labor with full safety."

Explanation sought in Vina.

Constitutional agents here today were busy attempting to explain the sudden and unexpected turn of affairs at Juarez, but owing to the rigid censorship of telegrams from the capital, no news of the messages were permitted other than those denying in a general way that Carranza had been ousted.

General Carranza, constitutional chief, and Villa, his northern chieftain, had reached a point of divergence on account of the constitutionalists' control of the new central zones and other incidents which the Villa elements have been reported.

Parties of Carranza and Villa at El Paso discussed the future of the Mexican government made no mention of the constitutional movement.

General Carranza's constitutional conference played an important part in the argument, especially as regards the position of the constitutional president. Some Villa supporters even declared that General Felipe Angeles, who had been selected by Villa for provisional president in place of Carranza, as soon as he became constitutional, had been reported.

General Villa, his northern chieftain, had been commanding Villa's artillerists along the hills of Torreón and had directed for the first time Carranza, according to official notice.

**BREACH MENDED,**  
WASHINGTON HEARS.

On June 17, official information reaching the Washington government from American Consul Edward C. Jones, of the Foreign Service, and General Venustiano Carranza, leader of the constitutional movement in Mexico, has put an end to the difference between Villa and Carranza, according to the Associated Press. Villa would proceed to the charge of the military movement against Carranza where the constitutional forces recently met a reverse.

That General Villa had determined to proceed to the charge of Carranza had demonstrated his attitude by imprisoning some of the officers in the constitutional army who had been captured and reported in reports to the state department. It was declared, however, that for which it was originated and that the conqueror of Torreón and Saltillo had been compelled to do so.

It was reported, however, that they had been asked particularly about the qualifications of General Felipe Angeles for the provisional presidency of Mexico.

Carranza Not Recognized.

It was reported a representative from each of Villa's brigades was to receive a special commission to go to Carranza's successor, but they had not yet been given the order.

General Carranza, leader of the constitutional movement in Mexico, has been invited to the American conference to return here early today and maintain liaison with both of his mission.

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The Carranza dispute in the Mexican revolutionary ranks while mediation at Niagara Falls rested had stirred up the entire country. The Carranza message served to release anxiety.

Other officials dispatched were to Carranza's headquarters to inform the officers of the revolutionary movement aided with Villa in his difference with the constitutionalists.

## THE MEXICAN CHAOS.

Chaos is the one word that describes the Mexican situation.

Out of that condition may evolve almost any possibility, the chances growing that whatever does happen will not be of a peaceful nature.

The reported rupture between Villa and Carranza may upset every plan, whether formulated by this country or by Huerta or the A. E. C. M. M.

Villa has half-heartedly denied a split with Carranza.

It is, indeed, possible that for the time being a truce may be patched and that Villa may again be placed in supreme military command. It was his virtual supplanting by Natera that brought matters to a crisis.

But it has for months been increasingly evident that Carranza could not indefinitely maintain amiable relations with his hot-tempered and brilliant commanding chief.

Carranza seems to be a diplomat and executive, pure and simple.

Villa is a fighter, pure and simple, though his admirers say he also possesses administrative ability.

The combination presented by the two men would seem to have been an ideal one. But those who lauded Villa's impetuous nature, and the probability that sooner or later he would balk at playing second fiddle.

It will not be surprising, in the face of these conditions, if mediation goes on the rocks.

If there really is dissension between Carranza and Villa, Huerta sees where he may be the gainer. His withdrawal would not be surprising. At any rate, proceedings at Niagara had for several days been deadlocked, neither the United States nor Huerta being disposed to yield.

As to the effect of these developments upon the attitude of our own country, it is impossible at this time to do more than speculate.

With the constitutionalists divided, and Huerta once more aggressive, there is reason to believe that anarchy will reign throughout Mexico.

At least, so far as the layman knows, a solution of the Mexican problem seems farther away than ever before. It may be that in the face of these conditions it may be imperative for the United States to enter Mexico City and from there work northward. The Constitution uniformly has dreading intervention as the discharge of an onerous and expensive duty. If it should come to intervention, there is the satisfaction that no device has been left untried to avert it.

## AN EQUAL OBLIGATION.

An address by George J. Kneeland to the convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs emphasizes the dangerous fallacy of expecting one sex or any specified class in life to undertake the responsibility for lifting our moral standards. Mr. Kneeland is director of the American Social Hygiene Association, which makes a specialty of the study of problems involved in the social evil. He ought, therefore, to know whereof he speaks. He dwelt at length upon the appalling list of records to prostitution in this country, and devoted much time to our duty in instructing girls for their own protection and that of the race. He devoted only perfunctory attention to the necessity for instructing boys and the part they play in fostering the social evil.

Sound students all know that if any permanent progress is to be made in breaking up "the world's oldest profession," the process must be founded upon education of

young people. Dealing with the evil after it develops is at best a compromise. That premise being admitted, it is evident that it is as essential to impress the sense of moral obligation, the obligation of restraint, upon the boy as upon the girl. The girl, essentially, leads a different life, save in isolated instances, and is to that extent protected. Almost from the start the boy is exposed to contaminating influences.

If the danger and possible disaster of an immoral course is early impressed upon him, a large part of the problem will have been solved.

It is here that we have the often-mooted subject of the "double standard." Without entering into a discussion of that special topic, it may be said, broadly, that the only way we can in common sense expect to advance the higher the universal standard of morals is by practicing the doctrine that moral responsibility rests equally upon both sexes, if not more strongly upon the man. Once he is sensible of that fact, he is apt to disregard ancient quibbles and be franker with himself before he infringes the moral code. To intimate that intensive shepherding of girls alone will bring the desired results is to bow down to sophistry. To place one sex on guard and minimize the other will lead to folly.

**RURAL CREDITS FOR GEORGIA.**

Beginning with July 16, Georgia and the southern states generally are to have their first genuine taste of the long-debated rural credits through the operation of the North American Mortgage Company, organized as a result of the initiative of Edwin P. Ansley, of Atlanta. Incorporation papers will shortly be filed.

The project is the direct outgrowth of the recent tour made through Georgia by Chicago capitalists, attracted here by Mr. Ansley's representations. Everywhere these hard-headed business men went they were impressed by the advantages of Georgia as a field for investment on farm lands. And everywhere they went bankers and farmers welcomed them as promising to co-operate in the inauguration of a new era in farm finance.

The North American Mortgage Company is to work in co-operation with the Anley Investment Company. The latter will take care of 30-year farm mortgage loans, on the amortization plan. The former will handle the short term, 5-year loans. Upon both classes, payments on principal and interest have been worked out on an exceedingly moderate basis.

The incorporators named are: J. H. McNamara, W. P. Kent, T. B. Fether and S. J. Fuller. The initial capital is placed at \$500,000 with the privilege of increasing to \$2,000,000.

The interest manifested in the plan by substantial farmers and business men of Georgia is an earnest that it will become an important factor in relieving the farm finance problem of Georgia and other southern states.

The Colonel is, of course, on record as favoring woman suffrage, as he favors most every other issue with vote-catching possibilities. While in the white house his views on the subject were rather nebulous. But when he took command of the good ship, Bull Moose, all that changed. With one arm around the neck of Jane Addams and with the other snuggling Gittie Pinchot to his bosom, he went roaring down the political pike, inviting all the enemies of "votes for women" to come out and have their way.

But the Colonel's record is that he is never at peace with the suffragettes, and the attention to the fact that E is never in war, always in peace, is the beginning of explanation. The fortunes of the latter are, however, overlocked by the former's. He is overlocked to the point of being a threat to the suffragettes.


