Exploiters of Mexico Charged With Seeking Failure of Mediation

Alleged That Interests Represented by H. Clay Pierce Object to Success of the Niagara Falls Conference.

HUERTA AGENTS STYLED TOOLS OF LORD COWDRY

Documentary Evidence Showing the Relation of "Big Business" to the Revolution That Is Rendering Mexico.

New York, June 28.—(Special.)—Readers of Sunday's New York Herald and Atlanta Constitution, who were given an insight into the peculiar and highly significant activities of the American and of the revolutionary propaganda in relation to Mexico, will doubtless be greatly interested in the revelation that the same forces that have been engaged in the formation of a railway program for the Mexican people have been exerted to prevent the success of mediation.

Documentary evidence published in Sunday's Atlanta Constitution clearly indicated the intimate relationship existing between Captain Sherborne G. Hopkins, consultant legal, as he calls himself, of the constitutionalista junta in Washington, and Mr. Henry Clay Pierce, whose deep interest in the railways of Mexico is shown by his conferences with representatives of General Carranza and in other ways.

All Represent Big Business. Attention was drawn to the fact that three Mexican representatives of General Carranza, who are understood to have been named as his delegates to confer with the representatives of the Mexican government at Niagara Falls, are the same three gentlemen to whom, according to Captain Hopkins' report to General Carranza, Mr. Pierce had fully outlined a program for the reorganization of the Northern Railway into a separate system, to be financed by American capital.

According to the same testimony, Mr. Luis Figueroa and his associates of the delegation representing the Mexico City government are charged with being agents of Lord Cowdry, who is characterized by Mr. Henry Clay Pierce as "the actual controller of Mexico outside constitutionalista lines."

One of the most interesting allegations of this remarkable inside correspondence of the revolutionary junta is that Mr. Jose Vasconcelos, one of General Carranza's representatives, received money from Mr. Henry Clay Pierce. Another disclosure which had to do with the payment of money by Mr. Henry Clay Pierce to Captain Sherborne G. Hopkins "for expenses" is the correspondence relating thereto.

Rebels Not Mentioned.

It will have been noted that in one of the telegrams relating to this payment reference was made to the arrival in Washington of the constitutionalista delegation. General Carranza's lieutenant, who had devoted his attention to the railway and the constitution, is also, it is understood to have been named by General Carranza as one of his delegates at the Niagara Falls conference.

The activities of Captain Sherborne G. Hopkins in the role of moulder of American public opinion have been fully alluded to. It is highly significant in this connection to discover that Mr. Henry Clay Pierce has been in some degree directing Captain Hopkins concerning his activities in this particular line.

In a letter written by Mr. Pierce to Captain Hopkins on May 11, 1914, he intimated a newspaper clipping relative to the identity of the three gentlemen named by the Huerta government to represent it at the Niagara Falls mediation conference.

SECRET PARLEY HELD BY HUERTA WITH CARRANZA

Stated in Vera Cruz That Peace Negotiations Have Been in Progress at the Capital of Mexico.

CARRANZA IS ANGERED BY THE UNITED STATES

The Rebel Chief Is Said to Think That Washington Has Assumed a Dictatorial Attitude in Regard to Mexico.

Vera Cruz, June 28.—Secret peace negotiations between General Carranza and President Huerta have been in progress in the capital, according to Antonio Magdon, an American, who arrived from Mexico City today. Magdon said it was known positively that representatives of Carranza had conferred with President Huerta.

Magdon said also that Huerta's volunteer forces at San Luis Potosi, including all the noted chieftains, had refused to go forward further with the capital, but would fight the constitutionalista in that region. The volunteer chieftains, most of whom are veterans of the three years border warfare, declare the federal volunteers are hopeless as soldiers, and only hamper the actions of the veteran volunteers, according to Magdon.

The rebels are fortifying Aguas Calientes against a constitutionalista advance, according to Magdon, but it is understood in the capital General Villa plans his next blow against Queretaro.

There are indications that the federal forces before Vera Cruz are being rapidly reduced, and that only a thin fringe of rebel troops will be left to maintain the outposts. It was thought in the capital that a peace agreement between Huerta and Carranza, based on Carranza's resignation, was certain to come soon, Carranza being forced to make some concessions because of his disagreement with General Huerta and Angela.

It is reported in the capital that supporters of Villa and Carranza have been fighting near Monterrey.

FOREIGN INTERFERENCE RESENTED BY CARRANZA

Laredo, Texas, June 28.—Constitutional leaders here have the sympathy of all the people of Mexico behind them, will not allow the dignity of the nation to be lowered by the interference of any foreign power in the internal affairs of the country. This declaration was made by General Venustiano Carranza at a banquet at Monterrey Saturday night, according to travelers who arrived here today. Carranza, it was said, asserted that the United States was assuming a dictatorial attitude toward Mexicans who attended the banquet resolved to declare their independence.

Constitutional movement has now proceeded to such a point, said the first chief of state, that the party has nothing to fear except from the Judases in its own ranks. He mentioned no named enemies.

MEDIATION CHARGED WITH MASS MEETING TO SEELE STRIKE

Differences Between Fulton Bag and Cotton Mills and Former Employees Discussed at the Grand.

BOTH PARTIES ASKED TO SELECT ARBITERS

Addresses on Problems of Capital and Labor Made by Dr. Wilmer, Dr. White and Marion Jackson.

Following addresses stressing the necessity of an immediate and amicable settlement for the public good of the differences between the strikers of the Fulton Bag and Cotton mills and the mill owners and an improvement of conditions at that mill, some 1,500 citizens at a mass meeting at the Grand opera house Sunday afternoon adopted resolutions urging the mill owners to meet the offer of the strikers to arbitrate their differences in the same spirit of fairness in which the striking employees have made the offer.

It was further urged that in order that such a mediation might be most binding and that there might not be the semblance of grounds for subsequent charges of unfairness the part of the proposed board of mediation by either contending party, that the employees and the mill owners select their own board of mediation instead of having the Men and Religion Forward in the arbiters, and as such matters are not recognized in Austria, Hungary or in the United States, cannot be accepted by the strikers.

Dr. John E. White, one of the speakers, said that the subject of mediation is successful in its object, as one of historical significance and one which will in future years be referred to as the beginning of intelligent discussion and mediation of capital and labor differences and the ushering in of a new era of fair play in such warfare.

The resolutions adopted were as follows: Whereas, the strikers of the Fulton Bag and Cotton mill have signed their willingness to have the differences between them and the mill owners settled by a board of arbitration, and the mill owners have refused to do so, and the public is very vitally interested in the settlement of the strike, and the difference between both the strikers and the mill owners.

Resolved, That we, the citizens of Atlanta and Fulton county, hereby assemble, do urge upon the Fulton Bag and Cotton mill the necessity for meeting this offer in the same spirit of fairness and that an arbitral board be selected by the strikers and the mill in a manner and form to be the strikers' choice.

The murder of the archduke and his wife is likely to complicate the Austro-Hungarian succession. The Duchess of Hohenberg was morganatically married to the archduke, and as such matters are not recognized in Austria, Hungary or in the United States, cannot be accepted by the strikers.

There is no law against morganatic marriages. As the law stands at present, the archduke Karl Franz, nephew of the murdered archduke, is the heir to the Austrian throne. If the Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife had lived the latter could not have been empress of Austria, but would have been queen of Hungary.

Tragedy Will Further Embitter None Too Friendly Relations Between Serbia and Austria.

TWO ARE ARRESTED AFTER OPERA

Prominent Physician and Hotel Employee Are Held on Charges of Suspicion. Girl Will Be Witness.

Vienna, June 28.—The assassination of Archduke Francis Ferdinand and the Duchess of Hohenberg caused a profound sensation here. The streets were quickly thronged and anxious inquiries were made regarding details of the latest tragedy to befall some of the most prominent members of the imperial family during the present reign.

When the assassination became known the authorities took possession of all telegraphic and telephonic facilities at Sarajevo and shut off unofficial channels of news.

The utmost sympathy is expressed everywhere for the venerable emperor, Francis Joseph, who only yesterday left Vienna after a serious illness for Ljubljana, upper Austria, to recuperate.

Archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife left the capital Thursday for a tour of Bosnia and Herzegovina, where the archduke was to take command of important maneuvers. According to reports received here, the archduke was everywhere with an enthusiastic reception. Rumors of a plot against the life of the heir to the throne had been in circulation, but the police thought they had taken effective precaution to safeguard the archduke and the duchess.

Archduke Was Warned. Austrian opinion regards the assassination of Archduke Ferdinand and his wife as the result of a well-prepared conspiracy.

When the Serbian legation here learned of the archduke's intended to go to Bosnia, he was advised not to undertake the journey, as certain Serbian extremists were known to be plotting against his life.

The archduke disregarded the warning. It is reported here that several Bosnian and Serb have been arrested at Sarajevo for complicity in the plot, which is said to have wide ramifications.

Ever since the publication of an imperial rescript October 1, 1908, proclaiming the annexation of Bosnia and Herzegovina to Austria, strong opposition to Austrian rule has been displayed by Serb and Moslem residents.

They were in European Turkey, but the Austrian-Hungarian occupation was authorized in 1908 by the treaty of Berlin. The treaty, however, contemplated the annexation of the territory of Bosnia and Herzegovina to the Austro-Hungarian empire.

Couple Were Shot Dead While Riding in an Auto Through Bosnian Capital

Shots Were Fired by a Serbian Student—Archduke Shot in Face and Duchess in Abdomen and Throat—Royal Couple Escaped Bomb Before Bullets Were Fired.

Double Murder Most Shocking Of Numerous Tragedies Recorded In Annals of House of Hapsburg

Aged Austrian Emperor Had Already Lost a Brother, Son, Wife and Other Members of Family by Violence—Latest Tragedy Charged to Serbia and Anti-Serbian Outbreaks Are Reported.

Sarajevo, June 28.—Archduke Francis Ferdinand, heir to the Austria-Hungarian throne, and his morganatic wife, the Duchess of Hohenberg, were assassinated today while driving through the streets of Sarajevo, the Bosnian capital. A youthful Serbian student fired the shots which added another to the long list of tragedies that has darkened the reign of Emperor Francis Joseph.

The archduke and his wife were victims of the second attempt in the same day against their lives. First a bomb was thrown at the automobile in which they were driving to the town hall. Forewarned, however, of a possible attempt against his life, the archduke was watchful and struck the missile aside with his arm. It fell under an automobile following which carried members of the archduke's suite, wounding Count Von Boos-Waldeck and Colonel Merizovic.

DARTED AT CAR AND FIRED

On their return from the town hall the archduke and the duchess were driving to the hospital when Gavrio Princip darted at the car and fired a volley at the occupants. His aim was true and the archduke and his wife were mortally wounded. With them at the time was the governor of the city, who escaped injury. The bodies of this murdered companions collapsed across him and protected him from stray bullets.

The governor shouted to the chauffeur to rush to the palace. Physicians were in prompt attendance, but their services were useless, as the archduke and his wife were dead before the police was reached.

Until the emperor's wishes are known the bodies will lie in state at the palace here. They will doubtless be interred in the Hapsburg vaults in the Capuchin church at Vienna.

In Sarajevo there is mourning everywhere, with black draped flags and streamers on all public buildings. Throughout the city weeping women were to be seen in groups, while great crowds surrounded the spots where the bomb exploded and where the fatal shots were fired. The bomb was filled with nails and lead filings, and the explosion was violent. The iron shrapnel on many shops were splintered by flying fragments and iron railings were shattered. About a score of persons were injured, several of them women and children.

TRAGEDY PURSUES HOUSE OF HAPSBURG.

This fatal tragedy, which has come to the house of Hapsburg, is the culmination of a series of misfortunes.

News of this incident came to the news department late tonight in a dispatch from Captain Russell, of the battleship South Carolina. The battleship was sent into the harbor at Puerto Plata prepared to repel the Dominican forces several times had violated an agreement not to use artillery in attacking the rebel forces holding the post.

The captain's dispatch, dated Friday, reads: "This afternoon when the Borden artillery shore fired shells into the city of Puerto Plata, the Machias anchored in the harbor and with some shots from her main battery stopped the firing of the artillery. There was no further firing. We have the situation well in hand. The prompt stopping of the artillery fire into the city will have a reassuring effect on Americans and other foreigners in the city who recently have displayed great anxiety about their safety."

At 3 p. m. Friday the revenue cutter Albatross took on board forty-two persons for passage to San Juan, Puerto Rico, being Porto Ricans, Americans, ten men, thirteen women and nineteen children, and a family of four.

The Clyde line steamer, from Norfolk for San Juan City, arrived at 3 p. m. Friday, and after delivering mail took away from Puerto Plata four persons. The Clyde line steamer Albatross took away twenty-four persons, and the passengers were put on the three vessels by the South Carolina's boats.

IMPORTANT WORK FOR LEGISLATURE

State Highway Commission Bill Will Probably Be The First General Measure to Come to a Vote.

Both houses of the state legislature will meet again this morning at 11 o'clock. Now that the preliminary work has been disposed of during the sessions of last week the general assembly, it is believed, will get down to work and dispose of some of the important measures without any unnecessary delay.

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GRIND OF FOR THE SENATE

Weeks of Discussion Likely on Trust Measures—Senate Far From Resigned to the Outlook.

Washington, June 28.—Convinced that there is no other path to adjournment but the one which begins with trust legislation, the senate will adjourn this week to the steady grind of work on the federal trade commission bill.

The senate is far from resigned to the thought of six weeks or more of discussion of trust legislation in midsummer, but it is not probable that the spirit of open revolt will show itself on the floor and unless senate leaders are at fault in the predictions, the three house bills or legislation designed to cover the same ground will be put through by the familiar process of debate, committee action, and amendment and then passage.

There is no doubt whatever that in his insistence upon the anti-trust program the trouble in committee is regarded as not more than a few days to have them finally disposed of.

Trade Commission Bill.
The trade commission bill is the unfinished business of the senate, the Clayton anti-trust bill is still unfinished by the judiciary committee and the railway capitalization bill is in about the same shape in the hands of the interstate commerce committee. Just when the latter two measures will get to the senate floor is still a problem. The judiciary committee found the Clayton bill, already passed by the house, a difficult problem and made and remade many of its sections. This bill deals with interlocking directorates and combines, with price fixing, with labor union exemption from the anti-trust law and with the question of labor in labor disputes. Although many of the leading lawyers of the senate are on this committee, they have discovered their task to be most difficult, and the trouble in committee is regarded as a preview to the fight which will come when it reaches the floor.

An effort will be made by the interstate commerce committee to get together on the railway securities bill this week. Chairman Newland and representatives of the railroads and of the interstate commerce com-

mission to meet with the committee to discuss a plan proposed by Louis D. Brandeis, of Boston, for the regulation of the railway industry. This plan has been accepted by some railway men, but the committee is sure that it is discussed between the senate and commission representatives.

The Nicaragua Treaty.
The senate foreign relations committee will continue its investigation into the transactions leading up to the negotiation of the proposed treaty with Nicaragua. This treaty, providing for \$10,000,000 in exchange for the establishment of a protectorate over that country and the construction of an oceanic canal and naval base. It has been the object of bitter attack by several senators and the committee is expected to get to the bottom of transactions which preceded the negotiations. As an incident, the committee plans to look into the way in which information has leaked from its past discussions of this subject. These matters have been discussed, but reports regularly have come from the room and democratic on the committee particularly have been anxious to know the details.

The senate banking and currency committee plans to meet Thursday to take up President Wilson's nomination for the federal reserve board. Investigation of the nomination will be under way by sub-committees and the committee will report to the house today devoted a brief session to eulogies of the late Representative George K. McGowan. Tributes were paid by Representatives Cramer and Lister of that state.
