

COUNCIL ACCEPTS HOPE RESIGNATION AFTER HOT FIGHT

Action Declared by Friends of Education Board Leader to Be Blown at School System.

COUNCIL TIE BROKEN BY VOTE OF CANDLER

Nutting and Friends Block Proposal to Allow President Hope to Withdraw His Resignation.

Atlanta's public school system, which has been allowed to degenerate because of the past neglect of the general council, was dealt another severe blow Monday afternoon when action was permitted to dominate in the matter of action on the resignation of President George M. Hope, of the school board.

Under pressure, President Hope tendered his resignation last week to the mayor and general council, and trusted the communication to Alderman James R. Nutting, who prevailed upon him to remain at the head of the system. He recommended, on Monday he made a request on Alderman Nutting for the return of his letter.

By a vote of 13 to 1, a resolution offered by Alderman Nutting accepting the resignation was adopted in a deadlock, which was broken when Alderman John R. Candler, presiding, cast his vote in favor of the resolution, and it carried by one vote.

Under pressure, President Hope tendered his resignation last week to the mayor and general council, and trusted the communication to Alderman James R. Nutting, who prevailed upon him to remain at the head of the system. He recommended, on Monday he made a request on Alderman Nutting for the return of his letter.

London, December 7.—After a long battle fought with the greatest stubbornness, the Germans have succeeded in occupying Lodz, Poland, an important city. According to the Berlin report, the Russians suffered severe losses.

This success of the Germans, largely because of what preceded it, is considered by military experts a really remarkable achievement. Less than a fortnight ago the army which this victory has fallen was surrounded by Russians, and cut its way out only in the last moment, losing great numbers of men and many guns. Yet it was able within a few days to reorganize, take the offensive and defeat the Russians.

GERMANS AIDED BY THEIR RAILWAYS. This was made possible by the network of strategic railways on the German side of the frontier, over which the German army could move with the greatest ease. The Russians, on the other hand, were unable to do this.






