

ASK CITY TO SPEND MORE U. S. TROOPS TO BORDER WORK FOR THE GREEK MEXICANS

Washington Sends General Tasker H. Bliss to Naco, Arizona, to Stop Firing Across the Boundary.

Five Persons in All Killed on American Side and 44 Wounded—President Wilson Is Tired of Situation.

Washington, December 8.—President Wilson, after a brief discussion with his cabinet today, directed Secretary Garrison to order sufficient troops to Naco, Ariz., to handle any emergency that might arise there in connection with the firing across the American border from Mexican territory.

Secretary Garrison later announced he had ordered Brigadier General Tasker H. Bliss to Naco with three companies of field artillery and "such further orders there."

Not cavalry in addition to that already patrolling the Arizona border has been ordered to the international line according to Mr. Garrison.

The secretary declined to discuss what he termed "the diplomatic side" of the case, referring inquiries to the state department. An executive telegram from the federal government and Governor Hunt, Arizona, in which the governor described the firing from the Mexican forces across the line as a serious menace to the peace of Arizona.

Immediate Aid Needed

Immediate aid from the city government was the keynote sounded by each of the speakers. Return to Anticipate Revenue

Mayor Woodward opposed the plan suggested by Captain Clayton, and he seemed to anticipate the situation of the income of next year. The latter plan was suggested by Jerome Jones, who pleaded with the mayor to give the plan to the city council, and to let the city council decide whether or not to approve it.

But the situation is intense. Mr. Jones said, "and it is not a question of whether or not the plan will be approved. It is the people themselves who will approve it. It is they who will pay you the money, and they will pay you the money."

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UNITED STATES NAVY PREPARED FOR WAR

According to Admiral Badger—Ship for Ship, United States Navy Equal to That of Any Nation.

Washington, December 8.—(Lesson drawn from the European war were discussed before the house military and naval committees today by Brigadier General Crozier, chief of ordnance of the army, and Rear Admiral Badger, of the navy's general staff. General Crozier said the United States navy never used guns similar to the great German howitzers which demolished Belgium's forts, and asserted that American field guns were as good as any in the world. Admiral Badger told the committee that for ship the United States navy is equal to, if not better than that of Germany or any other nation. While these committees were at work majority members of the rules committee were deciding not to grant the request of Representative Gardner, of Massachusetts, for a hearing on his resolution to direct a special inquiry into the preparedness of the United States for war. Chairman Henry Inter-

addressed a letter to Representative Gardner asking him to ask his proper form for a hearing would be before the committee on the committee of the house, which are now in daily session considering matters pertaining to the military and naval strength of the country. Notwithstanding the committee's attitude, Mr. Gardner tonight reiterated his determination to continue his fight for a special investigation. During the day Senator Lodge indicated that he would call up in the senate later his resolution similar to the one introduced in the house by Representative Gardner.

Crozier Tells of Guns.
Ordinance was discussed by General Crozier in connection with his estimates for the next fiscal year. On this score, he said the United States "has no need to feel uncomfortable."

"Have you seen models of the new 14-inch field guns the Germans are reported to be using in Europe?" General Crozier was asked.
"No," replied the general. "And we do not contemplate experimenting with these big guns. No one knows what they may come to, but we must consider the purpose for which these guns were used. The French-Belgian border was defended by armored forts, and the Germans brought up these special guns to demolish them. Now we are not going up against anything like that, and I see no reason why we should use any such guns," said Representative Kahn, "that this same gun which the Germans used was invented by an American named Hiram Maxim. It was offered to the war and navy departments."

"Where is no invention about building a big gun," returned General Cro-

zier. "Anybody can do that. Gethmann's gun was a different affair from this gun. His original model embodied many new-fangled notions. He finally came down to building a reasonable defense gun, using a very large projectile with a heavy charge of gun cotton. We conducted several experiments with this gun, and it was found to be very effective. Finally an 18-inch gun was built along the lines suggested by Gethmann. It was tested out side by side with a 12-inch service model gun."

American Field Guns Good.
The witness said that the Gethmann gun was of much less efficiency than the service gun with an armor-piercing projectile. Crozier said the exchange of views was experimenting with field howitzers. He said that the 155 mm. gun, he said, could move with a mobile gun. At present, he said, the field artillery is supplied with 3 and 5 inch guns. Of these, he said, he expected to increase the number to 115 during the next year, and hereinafter 125 guns as the maximum needed.

"We think our field guns are as good as any in the world," said the general. As to ammunition for field guns, General Crozier said, the department had a supply of 1,800 rounds for each gun. The department contemplated a supply of 1,800 rounds for each gun, he said, and the entire reserve would be supplied in four years. In the war, General Crozier estimated, government plants and private industry would produce 40,000 rounds in six months and 130,000 rounds a year. "If you were in a war, would that be sufficient?" he asked the committee.

"Well, the ammunition plants are being built up," General Crozier said. "They are meeting an increasing demand."
