BALKAN ALLIES INVADE BOSNIA.

BRITISH DREADNAUGHT REPORTED DESTROYED

George Rottweiler Says the Thunderer Was Sunk in North Sea.

NEW YORK, December 21.—A report that the British dreadnaught Thunderer was sunk by a mine or torpedo in the North sea on November 15, 1914, was brought here today by George Rottweiler, of Chicago, a passenger on the steamer St. Louis from Liverpool.

Rottweiler declared the sinking of the dreadnaught, witnessed by eight men, members of the crew of a small Swedish ship called the Stockholm, that later brought survivors from the dreadnaught to Liverpool.

"These men were taken in charge by British officers and were kept under surveillance at an out-of-the-way sailing mission," said Mr. Rottweiler. "I heard of the report in a round-about way, and through a friend I managed to talk with one of the crew. He told me that the Thunderer blew up and sank in full view of the Stockholm. The crew listened to the sound and a dozen or so of the men were picked up from the water."

Mr. Rottweiler says he is the Bureau representative of the Western Metal Products company, of Chicago, and that he was in the North sea in September, and visited Germany and other parts of the North sea. He is not listed in the Maritime Register but may be due to her being a small boat, as indicated by the small number of the crew.

RULERS OF SCANDINAVIA POOL THEIR INTERESTS

Stockholm, December 20.—(Via London.)—King Christian of Denmark, King George of Sweden and King Haakon of Norway, who, with their foreign ministers, met in conference at Skiohus Friday and Saturday over a plan to combine their respective interests during the war.

An agreement on the special questions raised. An official communication issued here today outlined the proceedings substantially as follows:

The meeting was inaugurated Friday with a speech by King Gustave, who alluded to the unanimous desire of the kingdoms of the north to preserve neutrality, and pointed to the desirability of limited co-operation between the kingdoms as a safeguard to their common interests.

He was impressed with a deep sense of responsibility which would be incurred if any measure which would contribute to the welfare of the three peoples were neglected.

King Gustave and King Christian replied, testifying to their sincere joy at the initiative of King George in calling the conference and expressing hope that it would have happy results.

The deliberations consolidated the good relations among the three kingdoms and also enabled an agreement to be reached on the special questions raised. It finally was decided to pursue the co-operation so happily begun and to arrange, when circumstances should occur, for fresh meetings between representatives of the three governments.

GERMANS ASK BELGIANS FOR ONLY \$50,000,000

LONDON, December 21.—A Renter dispatch from Amsterdam says that the German authorities ask Belgium provinces send representatives to Brussels, who, on Saturday, held a so-called landing session.
