AS UNDER INCOME LAW**

Washington, February 26.—Cash dividends paid by corporations after March 1, 1913, constitute taxable income when received and should be included in the income tax returns of individuals whose total income is more than \$25,000, according to a ruling today by Commissioner Osborn. Stock dividends declared in good faith and not to evade the income tax law are held not to be subject to the tax.
