

STATE TRIAL FOR. S. MARYLAND. CASE OF FRANK

Supreme Court Has Right to Modify Decision in Any Fashion It Pleases Within Thirty Days.

WHEN MANDATE COMES AT That Time State Automatically Resumes Jurisdiction of the Case—Papers Expected by May 20.

Judge Ben Hill decided yesterday afternoon that not until he had received the official mandate of the supreme court in Washington would he grant the writ of habeas corpus applied for by Solicitor Hugh M. Dorsey in an effort to have Leo Frank brought before Judge Hill for passage of a new death sentence.

In this connection the interesting statement was made by Judge Hill that the United States supreme court, within the thirty days it officially writes the mandate to the governor, may on its own motion or in any manner its decision in the case in question. In short, the supreme court, if it deems it proper, can, between now and May 20, revoke its decision in the Frank case, or modify it, or reconstruct it in any form it sees advisable.

Asked for Resentence. "The application for the writ of habeas corpus presented to me by Solicitor Dorsey this morning," said Judge Hill late Monday afternoon, "requested me to direct the sheriff to bring Leo Frank before the court for the purpose of fixing the date for execution of the sentence passed upon him by Judge Roon."

Under the rule of the United States supreme court the decision in the Frank case will be held in Washington for thirty days before the superior court of this state can apply for a writ of habeas corpus, to modify or to annul its decision in any manner.

RUSSIA ADMITS DESPERATE BATTLE.

Petrograd, May 3.—(Via London, May 4, 2:30 a. m.)—The following official communication was issued tonight:

"West of the Niemen, on May 2 the engagement continued along the upper reaches of the river Szezug. On the evening of May 3 a battalion of the enemy attacked the village of Szezug near Osnovetz, but was dispersed by the fire from the fortress.

"On the Izara river important skirmishes occurred near the village of Mitrova.

"Since the evening of May 1, the Lower Nida to the Carpathians, in the region of Gledyev, an action of the greatest intensity developed. On the left bank of the Nida, on the night of the 2d, we repulsed strong enemy attacks.

"In the region of Tarnow and farther southward, the artillery fire continued with great violence and fierce isolated combats took place.

"In the direction of Stry and south-

east of Golovatchko, we captured Mount Lukavsk and took 250 prisoners. In the direction of Olska, on May 3, near Zaleska, the enemy made two fruitless attacks.

"On the left our Black sea fleet bombarded the forts of the Bosphorus. The fire was very efficacious and caused great explosions and set fire to the Turkish batteries. The Turkish batteries replied vigorously, but without result. We also destroyed a steamer with a cargo of coal and sank two large sailing boats.

RUSSIAN FRONT REPORTED BROKEN.

Berlin, May 3.—An important Austrian victory is announced in the German communication issued today. The German front has pierced and broken the entire Russian front in west Galicia. The text of the official statement follows:

"In the western theater—

"Yesterday we successfully attacked in Flinders, northeast of the Pockopolis-Tyres road and took the farm. In the Chamagne district we inflicted considerable damage on the enemy's positions and captured his positions. In the Meuse and the Moselle there were only artillery duels.

"Northeast of Skierwiesko the Russians also suffered a heavy defeat in which they lost a great number in killed and 100 men taken prisoners.

"In the southeastern theater—

"In the direction of the Stryn commander-in-chief, Field Marshal Archduke, the Russian attacks under the leadership of General Colonel von Mackensen, the allied troops yesterday after bitter fighting pierced everywhere and crushed the entire Russian front in west Galicia from the neighborhood of the Zaganar river to the junction of the Danube.

"Such of the enemy as succeeded in crossing are in heavy retreat toward the east, closely pursued by the allied combat troops. The trophies at the victory cannot yet be approximately estimated.

"The victory in western Galicia reported in the German official announcement would appear to be of no importance, as the Russian front from the junction of the Vistula with the Dniester to the south is about 80 miles. After the surrender of Przemyel, the Russian

"The Austro-German forces being fought in western Galicia has been indicated in the dispatches received from the official dispatches from Petrograd, which show that the Austro-German forces are continuing in western Galicia, apparently with the view of offensive.

VIENNA REPORTS.

Vienna, May 3.—(Via London)—The Austrian official statement issued today confirms the German reports of a Austro-German victory along the entire front in west Galicia, and says that 6,000 Russian prisoners were captured.

"The text of the statement follows:—

"Austro-Hungarian and German forces yesterday captured the Russian positions in west Galicia and repulsed the Russian attacks on the front of Malastov, Gorlice, Gromik and other places.

"The Russians suffered severe losses. The official statement issued today a great number of Russians and machine guns. Simultaneously, we forced our way across the Danube river.

"On the Carpathian front, the Beskid situation has changed. In the wooded Carpathians we gained ground to the east of Kosivce. We repulsed several counter-attacks with great slaughter, capturing several hundred Russians and taking three machine guns.

"To the north of Kosivce, the enemy was thrown from several heights with heavy losses. The fighting in this region is progressing.

"On the Italian front, between the Froth and the Dniester, there is nothing new to report.

BRITONS REPULSE GERMAN ATTACKS.

London, May 3.—A British official statement issued today reports that at 10 p. m., May 1, the Germans attacked the British front in the west and yesterday evening they attacked the British front in the east.

"These attacks were both repulsed. We lost no ground and the British front remained in its position. The British front in the west was repulsed by the British troops in the forest of the Dniester.

"The communication issued in the afternoon follows:

"The Germans yesterday made two attacks on the British front in the west of the North of Tyne, near St. Eiler, and the other to the south of Tyne, near Hill No. 99. Neither one of these attacks was successful.

"There is nothing to report from the rest of the front."

ITALY TO PUNGE TO GREAT WAR.

Washington Hears That Action Is Only Matter of Days—Italians Are Warned to Leave Austria.

Washington, May 3.—Advice reaching the United States government through official and unofficial channels within the last few days indicate that Italy's preparations clearly tend to her participation in the war at an early date.

"Evidence from her extensive military preparations and orders for war supplies, the expected public appearance of the Italian fleet, the Italian military collaboration in Rome Wednesday is regarded there as of much significance, and demonstrations there in favor of war would not be surprising. Heretofore all the Italian newspapers have given no official sanction and have at times been repulsed.

"American diplomats in Europe, some of whom are in touch with the Italian situation, believe Italy's decision now only a matter of days, and arrangements already are being made to coordinate Italian interests should the emergency arise.

"If Italy should enter the war it is understood she would ask the American government to grant her diplomatic immunities in Vienna, Berlin and Constantinople to her diplomatic interests. Italy now is the custodian of the Turkish capital of Constantinople, and Ambassador Morgenthau probably would be the Italian ambassador accredited to Great Britain.

"The Italian government has already forwarded Italy's final declaration of war to Germany and Austria. It is expected that Austria will not return to their posts.

TO LEAVE AUSTRIA.

Vienna, May 3.—(Via Paris)—The Austrian government has just recommended to the Italian government to leave Austria-Hungary as soon as possible. The Italian government, manufacturers and trades unions are arriving today at Vienna from points in Austria.

ATLANTIC SHIP WILL BE DROPPED.

Washington Defers Action About the Torpedoing of the Gulfight Until All the Facts Have Been Secured.

Washington, May 3.—Pending an official investigation of the circumstances of the attack on the American steamer Gulfight in the English channel, the United States will defer diplomatic representations as well as any pronouncement of policy.

"Two messages were received today from American Consul Stephens at Plymouth, England, reporting that the Gulfight was torpedoed off the Scilly Islands Saturday; that her captain died of heart failure and two sailors drowned.

"Secretary Bryan said he would ask for a thorough and complete report from the consul, and would direct Ambassador Gerard, at Berlin, to make similar inquiry of the German government for such facts as it might have.

"The secretary announced he did not wish to make any predictions as to the course of the American government's policy until all the facts were in its possession.

Immunity to Be Demanded.

"Officials here are said to have granted the truth of reports that a German torpedo struck the Gulfight. The investigation later will be made by the United States consul at Plymouth, England, and the United States consul at Berlin. It is thought probable that an expression of sympathy for the victims of the attack. 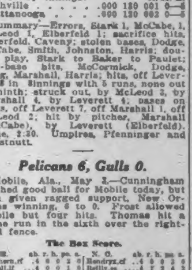
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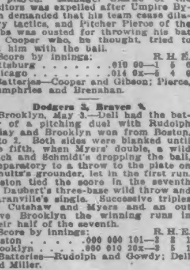
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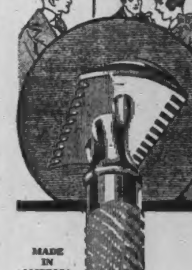
