TURKS BADLY BEATEN IN FIGHT IN CAUCASUS. London, May 6.—A Petrograd dispatch to the Reuter Telegram company says: "Details have been received here of the defeat by the Russians of a Turkish army corps in the Caucasus. An effort was made by 8,000 Turkish units of the 11th Division to invade the Dikman-Khor region, which the Russians occupied. The entire Turkish force was buried against the Russian positions, but the Russians, although numerically inferior, held their ground. An offensive attack was received at the bayonet charge of the Russian troops, who made a counter attack and completely routed the exhausted Turks who retired in disorder. The prisoners include the famous leader Rinko."
