The responsibility rests, however, with the British government, which, through its plan of starting the civilian population of Germany, has forced Germany to resort to retaliatory measures.'

ONLY ONE TORPEDO STOCK LOST AT SEA

But It Caused Internal Explosions and the Steamer Quickly Sank—Lack of Naval Escort Explained.

London, May 10.—The Cunard liner Lusitania, sunk last week off Old Head Kinsale, by a German submarine, was struck by only one torpedo, Captain Turner of the steamer testified today at the coroner's inquest at Kinsale. But this deadly missile found a vital spot and sent the liner to the bottom in less than six minutes, carrying with her more than a thousand souls.

The evidence of Captain Turner, which was given at other points concerning the disaster, and that of members of the crew with a general knowledge of the situation, led the jury to bring in a verdict of "wholesale murder" against the German emperor and his government and the officers of the submarine directly responsible for the sinking of the ship.

It was also disclosed today by Captain Turner, in a statement in the house of commons, that the Lusitania had received wireless advice from the admiralty warning him of submarines on the lines of coast. Captain Turner, in his testimony, said he had followed this advice to the best of his ability.

The character of the advice rendered by the admiralty was not divulged and will not be until Lord Mersey opens his inquiry into the loss of the ship.

Second Explosion Internal.

Members of the jury, after the heavy loss of life, the absence of any naval escort for the threatened vessel, and the fact that the Lusitania had no room afforded for such special protection, Captain Turner, in declaring that the second explosion was an internal one, said that the explosion was not of a committal it was impossible to stop the liner.

This idea of an internal explosion, the supposed naval escort, which pointed out that if the torpedo had exploded on contact with the steamer, it would have only been disabled or had only a minor effect on the Lusitania. It is evident, they say, that if the torpedo had exploded on contact with the steamer, it would have created a great hole in the side of the ship, and the Lusitania would have sunk rapidly and the passengers would have perished.

Reason for No Escort.

Mr. Turner explained that no naval escort accompanied the Lusitania because of the fact that the Lusitania was a merchantman, and that merchantmen must look after themselves.
