NEUTRAL ENVOYS INDORSE THE NOTE.
In diplomatic quarters there was wide discussion of the note to Germany. Among representatives of the allied powers, the document was approved as well as by neutral envoys, many of whom obtained copies from the state department. The German embassy—the one place where it was natural to look for some leaking or information of what Germany's position would be—remained silent. Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, in fact called on secretary Bryan "with the express purpose of warning him that none of the published stories were true which purport to give anonymous views of members of the embassy staff to the effect that Germany would refuse to accept the American note. He asked co-operation of the state department to prevent the spread of this misinformation, and Mr. Bryan made formal announcement of the request.

GERMANY MAY STOP SUBMARINE ATTACKS.
While the United States is expecting prompt action from Germany in guaranteeing that there will be no repetition of such a tragedy as the sinking of the Lusitania, diplomatic discussion of the vital issues raised on points of maritime law probably would not be rejected by the American government. It is as many diplomats think, Germany would even of her own initiative suspend all submarine attacks on merchantmen, even of belligerent nationality, while notes were being exchanged.

American ships are given the right to carry mail and even if carrying coal, including munitions of war, the ships or cargoes can not be considered as contraband and the cargo "requisitioned" in which event all contraband or non-contraband taken would be paid for irrespective of its destination.

THAT'S THE VIEW IN LONDON.
Severance of Diplomatic Relations Expected—Allies Value United States More as Neutral Than as Belligerent.

DIGNITY AND FIRMNESS APPLIED IN LONDON.
London, May 13.—(13.5 A. M.)—All the diplomatic summings up on the American note to Germany appear to be different from the official defense for the sinking of the Lusitania and the approval of the note by the German government.

ONE PARAGRAPH JARE BRITAIN.
The Daily Chronicle, "President Wilson," says the Daily Chronicle, "has at last spoken out. His note to the German government is studiously courteous, but it is very firm in substance. There is no room for any further delay on British feeling. It is that in which Mr. Wilson alludes to what he calls the 'human and religious attitude hitherto assumed by the imperial German government' in matters of international right and speaks of German influence in the field of international obligations as 'always suggested upon the side of justice and humanity.'"

WILSON IS SUPPORTED BY SOUTH AMERICANS

While making it clear that what he said was his personal opinion and not to be taken as representative of the attitude of their governments, they all expressed a conviction that the public sentiment of their countries would approve the American course.

DO SOMETHING WITH IT. Why shouldn't the state and its people get some substantial and lasting benefit from the \$100,000 and more now coming in from the specific tax on motor vehicles?

There is now in the state treasury from this source \$104,000 awaiting distribution to 148 Georgia counties in which the law requires it shall be distributed in accordance with rural road mileage, solely and specifically for use in road construction or improvement.

Recent investigation among the unemployed people of Atlanta showed that the majority were inefficient, and that they had not taken advantage of the schools provided for them. The same condition prevails in the reform and charitable institutions, while comparatively few of the unemployed girls in rescue homes have taken advantage of the schools the state and city provide for them.

At the recent annual meeting of the Georgia Association of Graduated Nurses, a step higher in professional efficiency was taken when the association appointed a committee to draft a bill to be presented to the legislature requiring compulsory registration of nurses; stricter requirements in admission, and otherwise raising the standard of the profession.

The proposed law would require a high standard of training not only from the graduate nurse, but it would require that certificates and diplomas should be recognized only where issued by training schools measuring to the highest standards.

The more important improvements made in the fire department subsequent to the 1914 report, the three remaining agencies will barely meet the maximum rates of domestic consumption, with no reserve for fire fighting.
