Widow of Late Millionaire Clubman Says Legal Steps Will Be Taken if Valuables Are Not Produced.

TO OPEN NIGHT'S SAFE ON SATURDAY MORNING

"Outside Influences" Attacked—Claims Effort Made to Get His Money and Interfere With Domestic Affairs.

Friends of Mrs. Emmett Hight, widow of the wealthy young Atlanta who died Monday, were seeking to trace amount of valuable jewelry, alleged to have vanished from his body Tuesday. The missing valuables are said to have been worth in the neighborhood of \$500. They were a valuable diamond stud, a diamond ring, a watch, the latter of which was a heirloom. Mrs. Hight stated last night that legal proceedings in this event she did not recover the vanished articles between today and Saturday. Another development in the High case Tuesday was the charge by the widow that she was the victim of a conspiracy to prohibit her from attending the bedside of her dying husband during his last hours. She accused the bedside attendants employed by the dead millionaire of having refused to carry out her request that she be permitted to see him.

Bullet That Killed Dog Endangers Life Of Officer Haslett

For Second Time Policeman Faces Rabies Infection When Ball Passes Through Dog and Wounds Toe.

For the second time in his career, Call Officer B. P. Haslett, champion mad dog killer of police headquarters, stands in danger of contracting rabies. About a year ago Officer Haslett answered a call to kill a mad dog and was bitten on the hand. The dog was killed and avoided serious consequences. Tuesday night Officer Haslett answered a call to 310 East Fair street to kill a dog, presumably afflicted with rabies. As he passed through the dog's body, the dog, roared and passed completely through Officer Haslett's leg, wounding his toe. Officer Haslett went immediately to Grady hospital for treatment, and had the body of the dog sent to the state health department, at the capital. He expects the dog, placed in a cage, will again take the Pasteur treatment.

FOR MORE TROOPS AND POISON GASES KITCHENER CALLS

War Secretary of Great Britain Tells Lords He Needs 300,000 Men to Form New Armies.

London, May 18.—Lord Kitchener told the house of lords today he wanted 300,000 more recruits.

He expressed confidence that in the very near future the country would be in a satisfactory position with regard to the supply of ammunition. The news from the Gallipoli peninsula, in other words the Dardanelles, was thoroughly satisfactory, Earl Kitchener declared.

To the German Methods. Lord Kitchener stated that the British and French governments felt that the allied troops must be adequately protected against poisonous gases by the employment of similar methods of warfare. These would remove the enormous and unjustifiable advantage which must otherwise exist, he said.

"The Germans," said Lord Kitchener, "have persisted in the use of such asphyxiating gases whenever the wind favored or other opportunity occurred, and his majesty's government, no less than the French government, feel that our troops must be adequately protected by the employment of similar methods and justifiable disadvantages which must exist for them if we take no steps to meet on our own ground the enemy who is responsible for the introduction of this pernicious practice."

Referring to the offensive movements now in progress in La Bassée and the Aisne region, Earl Kitchener said:

"We have all followed with admiration the forward movements of our brave allies in an offensive operation which has been marked by complete success, and which is still proceeding with every promise and indication of being wholly satisfactory. The attacks delivered by our forces, at first, were not attended with the same immediate success owing to the elaborate arrangements made by the Germans to defend their lines after their experience at Neuve Chapelle, but on the night of May 18, by a renewed effort, the British forces drove back the enemy on a front of approximately two miles for a considerable distance, and captured from 400 to 500 prisoners. This action also proceeded, and we hope that in conformity with the French operations it will achieve important results."

"These offensive operations against the trenches of the Germans demanded enormous expenditures in ammunition and in the use of the most advanced and of the highest explosive patterns of shells, and it is not without reason that in the very near future we shall see a satisfactory position in regard to the supply of these shells. Our losses and those of the French have been heavy, but the task our armies has accomplished has been of great sacrifice, and the spirit and morale of our troops has never been lower than at the present moment."

The war secretary had this to say concerning the position of the Russians:

"The Russians now hold a strong line from the eastern Carpathians to Przemyel, which forms a pivot of their lines, and then forms a pivot of their lines. In Bukovina the Russians have driven the Austrians back from the Dniester to the Pruth, and German operations have been enormous, and many thousands of unarmored prisoners have fallen into the hands of the Russians."

Turning to the Dardanelles, Earl Kitchener said that the progress of the allies was necessarily slow, since the country was most difficult.

"But the Turks are gradually being forced to retire from positions of great strength," he continued, "and though the enemy is being constantly reinforced, the news from this front is thoroughly satisfactory."

Earl Kitchener then referred to the South African campaign and the occupation by Union of South Africa forces of Windhoek, capital of German South-west Africa.

"The military ability displayed by General Botha has been of a very high order," he said in this connection, "and has confirmed the admiration felt for him as a commander and a leader of men."

Indian soldiers were utterly routing the Turks in Mesopotamia, the secretary declared, and were gradually clearing the whole country of hostile forces.

"After referring in succinct terms to the news in the army, Earl Kitchener continued: "I said I would let the country know when more news has come, and I now call for the news. Those who are engaged in the production of warlike articles and kind should not leave their work. It is to men who are not permitted to do their duty, and I am convinced the manhood of England still available will loyally respond. "In my first speech in your lordship's house, I pointed out that this year would be a long one and would demand great sacrifices. These sacrifices have been cheerfully made by the people of this country, who not only responded in vast numbers to the summons to create the new armies required, but have since continuously supplied a constant stream of recruits which has enabled us to maintain the forces in the field and in training at their full strength with effective men. "The growth of the new armies and have done so without the difficulties which confronted us in providing them with the material of their equipment. "I cannot speak too highly of the men and the devices so dexterously have displayed, or of their cheerful acceptance of hardships and their kind and pleasant weather which have proved the admiration of experts and the reports to me as to the wonderful training program of the new recruits, training to become efficient soldiers. "I am certain that the men in the field, which immediately saw in that these men will continue to maintain the reputation they already have attained at home."

ADVOCATES OF PEACE MEET AT LAKE MOHONK

Mohonk Lake, N. Y., May 18.—Because the present war is unprecedented in its extent, the Lake Mohonk conference opens here tomorrow will discuss the international arbitration, which is the cause for the war. The conference has labored for the past several years to bring about the results of the struggle now raging. The results of the struggle will be discussed by the college presidents, experts on economic conditions and other leading business men and others here tonight were all most unanimous in their opinion that the cause for the war is the lack of settling international disputes without recourse to arms. They were advised that there should be no discussion of the causes and conduct of the war in the form of direct attacks of specific policies of acts of any belligerent or groups of belligerents.

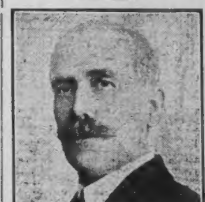
BARONETCY STICKS TO SIR EDGAR SPEYER

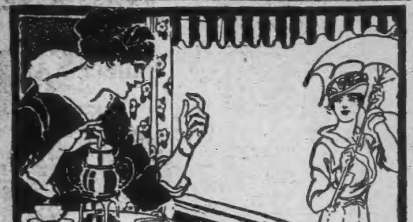

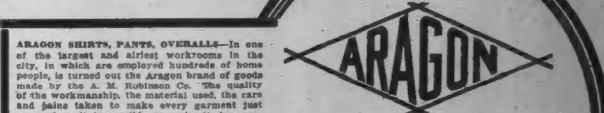

OPponents of Mayor TALKING IMPEACHMENT

But Woodward Says They Are Afraid to Go to Court.

The talk among certain members of council about trying to start impeachment proceedings against Mayor Woodward received a new impetus Tuesday afternoon when it was learned that the city ordinance required two-thirds of the members present and not two-thirds of the entire body to impeach a city official, as has been the impulsion.

When impeachment of the mayor for refusing to preside over council, in order to block the election of purchasing agent, was first talked of it was found that only eighteen members of council might be depended upon and that was not two-thirds of the total number. The matter seemed to lag until the law was quoted.

City Attorney Mayson stated to a reporter of The Constitution that the mayor's refusal to preside over council was an impeachable offense.

"I should refuse to try a case for the city," said the city attorney, "could be impeached, it simply means that any official who refused to go on to attend to the city's business."

Under the law when a mayor is tried on impeachment proceedings the judge of the city court must preside and the members of council are to be present. No appeal is provided for once a verdict is rendered.

Impeachment proceedings are started by a council by a formal resolution adopted by a majority of the members present.

It is not improbable that the matter may come up in council next Monday afternoon.

When asked what he had to say about the impeachment talk, Mayor Woodward said:

"It is all poppycock. I have done nothing for which they know me as guilty as those who passed an illegal ordinance."

Could Impeach Council. "If that purchasing agent ordinance is legal, why don't they let it in court? They know it is illegal and they want to preside over council to hold an illegal election. Talking about impeachment, what is that bunch for? Presiding over an illegal election which is not legal. They had to do an illegal act in order to impeach me."

The mayor said that if such a thing as an impeachment should be tried, he would tell the court that he had refused to make part in an illegal proceeding and then the legality of the ordinance would have to be tried.

"In the first place," he said, "every member of council who turned up at Monday's session was impeached as disqualified because of a law which they knew was not legal. They had to do an illegal act in order to impeach me."

This temporary law impeaching me has got a long way to go."
