

BOARD COMMISSIONERS MEET TODAY TO SELECT DIXIE HIGHWAY ROUTE

BY CHARLES SMITH. Councilman Believes This Would Be Acceptable to People and That Issue for City Improvements Would Carry.

WILL PREPARE REPORT AT TODAY'S MEETING

\$375,000 for Grady Hospital, and New Schools and Repairs on Others to Be Recommended.

Sensing the hostility of many voters toward a bond issue under the present administration, Councilman W. Smith has worked out a plan for creating a bond commission of fifteen members which will solve the problem and prove satisfactory to every interest.

Prepare Report Today. At a special meeting this afternoon the bond commission will report to the board.

Councilman Smith stated Wednesday that he understood the opposition to bonds and believed that he had evolved a plan that would be acceptable and would mean that the bonds would be carried.

He proposes to create a bond commission of fifteen members, three to be chosen from general council members, three by the three local newspapers from their own ranks, two from the Atlanta Federation of Trades and Laborers from the executive committee of the chamber of commerce, the Retail Merchants' association and other similar business bodies.

"Every department of business will be represented by this commission," he said. "It is certain to give us a more representative commission than could be gotten together by any other method and no interest or faction would have cause to complain."

The special school probe committee has recommended the construction of a dozen new buildings and extensive improvements on as many more. This report was completed after a survey of all the schools.

Hospital Investigation. Councilman J. L. McCord and Dr. C. White, members of a special sub-committee of the general board, have just completed a report on the Grady hospital and its needs and will ask the board to include in its recommendations to council an item of \$375,000 for the hospital.

They recommend that the fund be apportioned as follows: For a new building for white patients, based on the building erected in 1911, \$100,000.

For a new building for negro patients, estimated cost \$75,000.

For a nurses' home, estimated on bids as per plans and specifications, \$80,000.

For the purchase of a lot additional to property already owned, \$12,000.

For installing laundry in building now used for nurses' home, for new machinery for laundry, boiler room equipment and other, \$25,000.

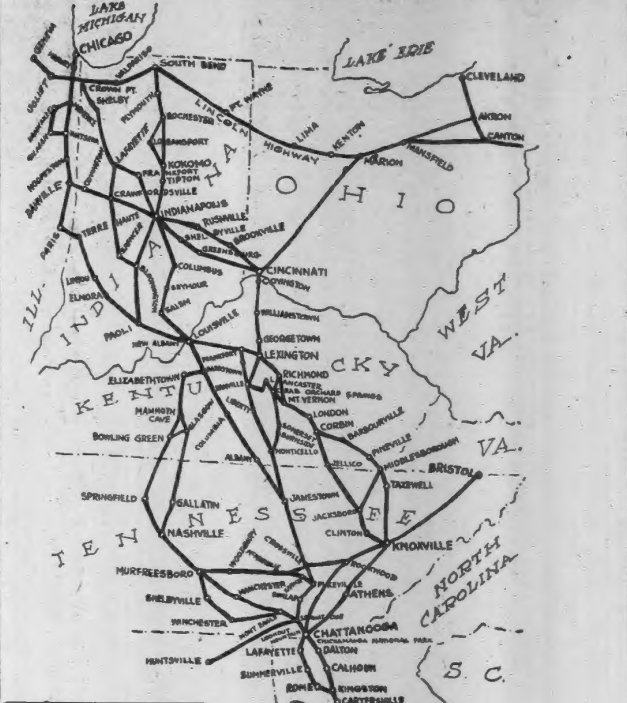
For outdoor clinics, \$50,000.

For inclosing all grounds of the hospital, \$24,000.

For Contagious Diseases. For new building for treating contagious diseases, including proposed building, operating room and instruments, \$50,000.

The subcommittee will also recommend the arranging of a section of pay grade in the proposed building. They claim that these wards will yield interest revenue to pay the interest on the bonds and that the same time would create a sinking fund to eventually pay off the bonded indebtedness.

Commissioners Meet in Chattanooga Today to Select Dixie Highway Route

All roads today lead to Chattanooga, where the Dixie highway commissioners will meet for the purpose of deciding upon the route of the greatest highway which has ever traversed this section of the country.

The commissioners arrived in Chattanooga last night. All day Wednesday tremendous delegations from all sections through which the proposed highway will pass, between Miami and Chicago, were arriving. Some delegations, it is estimated, will have as many as 1,000 members to boost their particular route.

Best Route for Highway. It will be the business of the highway commissioners Thursday and at least one or two days thereafter to select the best route for the highway. The committee meets at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

Some idea of the tremendous interest which centers in the selection of this route may be gained from the statement of the number of proposed routes which will be presented for the consideration of the commissioners. There are several fixed points in the route over which there is no contest. These points are Chicago, St. Louis, Chattanooga, Atlanta, Miami, Jacksonville and Miami. But between every one of these points, with the exception of the section between Jacksonville and Miami, there are anywhere from two to a half dozen proposed routes. The number of such proposed routes is more than 100 in Georgia and Tennessee and Kentucky are shutting up their places of business and migrating to Chattanooga. The north is equally as interested.

PRODIGAL GEORGIANS GETTED BY BRITISH

President Wilson Will Not Allow Issue to Be Complicated by Complaints About Britain's Detention of Cargoes.

LIVES ARE ENDANGERED BY GERMANY'S CONDUCT. While Only Questions of Property Are Involved by British Action—American-German Controversy Necessitates Prompt Understanding.

Washington, May 19.—President Wilson will await a reply from Germany to the recent American note before making further representations to the allies on alleged violations of international law in their commercial embargo on Germany.

This was made clear today with the explanation that data concerning detentions of American cargoes had not been completed, and that, moreover, the notes under preparation would not be sent now in any event because President Wilson was unwilling to have the situation with Germany complicated by the American government's correspondence with Great Britain.

It is understood the president's position is that the case of the United States as set forth in its note to Germany should be disposed of irrespectively of any contemplated move with regard to the allies. The idea prevailing in some quarters that representations to the allies might influence the character of the German reply is not shared, it is said, by the president, who is understood to hold that the German government naturally should have confidence that the United States would do its utmost to safeguard its rights in all cases.

The German government's attitude is a grossly undervalued one. The idea of property raised by the issue over contraband as between the United States and Germany is not a matter to collect data and no lives are endangered by delay.

Secretary Fisher said today that the "immediate answer" was expected from Germany to the recent American note. The German government is occupied just now with the Austro-Italian crisis, and its reply will require several days of preparation.

Germany Still Under Submarine. Reports that Germany had decided to suspend submarine attacks on merchant ships are not confirmed today. The German and Austrian governments are still in a state of suspense. Reports that British ships were torpedoed in an anticipation of the report that the United States had announced its intention of arming and ammunitions aboard the Lusitania are also unconfirmed.

Germany's Crowling to the United States. Berlin, May 19.—(Via Amsterdam and London.) The Vossische Zeitung says: "If America succeeds in bringing it about that British merchant vessels should no longer be protected by the United States, the United States will be in an endeavor to lead submarine war into more humane channels."

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TEUTONS DRIVING A CAZAR'S FORCES

According to Berlin and Vienna—In Bukovina the Russians Are Reported to Have Broken the Austrian Extreme Right.

London, May 19.—The Austrian and German armies continue massed attacks through Paris says that Austria is attempting to form a new line behind the river San, both north and south of Frazzetta and west of the Vistula river, in southern Poland.

These attacks, according to Austrian and German reports, have met with their greatest success north of Frazzetta, where the German allies have crossed the river and have occupied several of the eastern banks. They also claim to have captured positions southeast of the former Austrian frontier, while their heavy guns are being used as bombardment from the west.

In southern Poland their progress is not so marked. The Russians having their main forces concentrated at Ivangrad, which they brought into the field and checked the advance. It is stated from Petrograd that the German and Austrian forces are using between thirty and forty army corps on the 200-mile front from Opotow, in Poland, to Kolomea, in eastern Galicia.

On the other hand, it is reported that the Russians have broken the Austrian extreme right and are reported again to have occupied Czernowitz, the capital of the Bukovina province. The sudden break in the weather in France, which had been bright and clear for several days, has returned to its former gloom.

BATTLE RAGES ON LONG FRONT. Fighting continues without intermission along a 200-mile front from the mouth of the San to Kolomea. The Russians are sending in troops as rapidly as possible to meet the German and Austrian forces. Operations along the San may be considered as in three sections. The first section is the mouth of the San to the Carpathian foothills; second, from Frazzetta to the mouth of the Vistula; third, from the Vistula to Bandomir, in Russian Poland, 67 miles southeast of Radom.

Nothing Decisive Won by Teutons. London, May 19.—"As the result of the latest German tactics," says a dispatch to The Times, "the Austro-Germans have been unable to accomplish by their advances in the Carpathians what has been the object of their operations during the duration of the war."

General, May 20.—(Via Paris, 12:30 a. m.)—The German emperor and his staff had a narrow escape on Sunday while watching the operations in a village near the River San, in Galicia. According to a Budapest dispatch, a heavy shell burst 600 yards from the emperor among some automobiles, destroying several, including the emperor's, and killing his chauffeur. The emperor had left his car only fifteen minutes before.

intervention in the war and those who have worked in the interest of peace have seemed to agree that they are awaiting the action of the government.

The republicans have published a manifesto declaring their readiness to go to the front "to fight for the glory of the country and the right of manhood." From all the provinces come appeals from volunteers to go to the front and willing to make all sacrifices as some express it, "to free our Italian people as we long have suffered under a foreign yoke."

King Victor Emmanuel visited the barracks today without an escort. He recognized and acknowledged the same enthusiasm as his grandfather in the case of those eventual campaigns of 1848 and 1849.

Queen Helena and the Duchess of Aosta, on leaving the Quirinal were the objects of an affectionate manifestation, in which the people shouted for victory for Italy, for Montenegro and Serbia.

Colonel Giuseppe Garibaldi visited the minister of war and asked his permission to organize a body of volunteers. The people cheered him, remembering his grandfather's leadership in the defense of Rome.

Large numbers of students gathered at the university and proceeded to the ministry of public instruction, where the minister, Signor Arrivabene, addressed them and thanked them in the name of the country, saying that much was expected of them.

Italy Masses on Frontier. Italian Frontier, May 19.—(Via Paris.)—The frontier towns of Udine, Belluno, Verona and Trieste are as their respective provinces, are entirely in the hands of the military authorities, and trains carrying field guns, horses, troops, ammunition and provisions are congested all the lines.

The greatest anxiety is felt for Venice, where large platforms have been hastily constructed for new batteries to protect the town. The danger to the monuments from aeroplanes is recognized. Protective measures also have been taken in Florence, Rome and Naples since the Austrians can easily reach these towns from the Italian coast.

Italy Seizes All Railways. Rome, May 19.—(Via Paris.)—A royal decree, under which all railroad lines and stations in Italy are placed entirely under the supervision of the military authorities, was published by The Official Gazette.

Under the decree, military officials are given power to prohibit suspected persons from traveling on the railways or even approaching the lines. All travelers are warned that at certain points they must not look through carriage windows, but must keep the shutters closed.

Any person approaching a tunnel or bridge will be imprisoned for six months. If war has been declared when the offense is committed the offender will be punished as a deserter.

Soldiers and the police entrusted with enforcement of the decree are authorized to arrest any person who violates its provisions.

It is said Austria has decided to prevent the United States the protection of her subjects in Italy in the event of war. Owing to the feeling caused in the United States by the sinking of the Lusitania, it is reported to have decided to ask Switzerland to undertake the same in this country. It is understood that the Swiss minister of foreign affairs has been informed that the mission would be entrusted to him.

ITALY'S BRIEF FOR FIGHTING. Rome, May 19.—(Via Paris.)—The green book, containing diplomatic documents designed to show Italy's attitude since the beginning of the war and efforts made to reconcile the obligations of the triple alliance with the rights of Italy, is reported to have been "set up" by the typographers employed by the police pro-committee.

Every precaution was taken to prevent the printers from communicating with the world outside their office, and they were reminded that any betrayal of the secrets contained therein would be severely punished under the law. The green book is said to show that Italy is not making the mistake of neutrality, and that during the negotiations with Austria the republicans failed to realize that Italy was firmly determined to enter the war with a view to obtain satisfactory territorial concessions by diplomatic action.

The documents seek to demonstrate that Austria failed from the first to recognize Italy's chief purposes was to have her recognize the justice of the demands made by the country. For Italy it was a question of maintaining her dignity before the world and gaining her object at any cost. The green book contains also the note of May 4 in which Italy, after summarizing the course of events and emphasizing that Austria's course had been contrary to the letter and spirit of the triple alliance treaty, denounced that treaty.

In explanation of the manner in which the treaty was denounced, it is stated that on May 4 the Duke of Aosta, Italian ambassador at Vienna, acting under instructions from his government, notified the Austrian minister of foreign affairs that Italy considered Austria's declaration of war against Serbia a violation of the triple alliance treaty. He added that the negotiations started first by Germany and continued by Austria, for maintaining Italy's compensation for maintaining neutrality, had resulted in Italy deciding to resume her complete liberty of action.

Resentment has been caused here by the statement appearing in some German newspapers that Italy had denounced the triple alliance treaty only so far as it referred to Austria. The purpose of this statement is believed to be to give the impression that Italy has decided to fight only the dual monarchy. It is pointed out that Italy's denunciation of the treaty only to Austria would not assist her ally, but simply create a difference exists between Italy and Austria, which is not between Italy and Germany.

D'ANNUNZIO. Rome, May 19.—(Via Paris.)—D'Annunzio's famous note, a noted figure among advocates of national expansion, was received today in London.

When he returned from the palace he said in the first place: "Certainly King Victor Emmanuel is in the right in the present situation, and I believe that I have done my duty in the present situation."

Describing the interview D'Annunzio said he was struck by the wonderful power of the sovereign and his problems now agitating Europe. "There is a man," said the poet, "who is able to fulfill the duties of state, could absorb so much knowledge and possess such close and accurate perception of foreign countries, in our day."

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On May 18 the Lesbosian territorial division made considerable progress and on the following night advanced further. 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DRUGS AND LIES CAUSED THE STRIKE, CHARGES PREACHED

Rev. Mr. Gaddis, Formerly in Charge of Colorado Fuel Company's Sociological Work, Draws Terrible Indictment of Concern.

Washington, May 19.—While John D. Rockefeller, Jr., waited here again today to testify before the industrial relations commission in a supplementary inquiry into the recent strike against the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, the commission listened to an arraignment of that concern's methods by Rev. Eugene Gaddis, a Methodist clergyman, formerly in charge of the company's sociological department.

Mr. Gaddis said that he was discharged from the sociological department of the Colorado company last February, after making a personal appeal to Mr. Rockefeller to be allowed to continue important betterment work among the miners. He justified the results of the strike against military and other constitutional authority in Colorado on the ground that laws for improvement of the mine condition had never been ignored and there was no other way left to seek a remedy.

"Technically the terrible strike of the Colorado miners was lost," said Mr. Gaddis, "but in reality it was one of the greatest labor victories ever achieved in the United States because today the coal operators have their hands tied."

Mr. Gaddis declared that twenty-five years ago, Gaddis said, four-fifths of the men in Colorado...

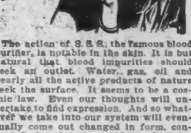

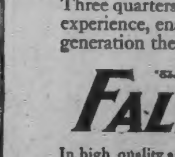

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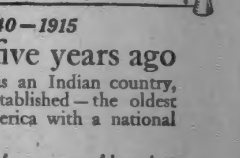
