

Impeachment of Mayor Planned by Councilmen At Meeting Last Night

Fifteen Members of Majority Faction Hold Secret Caucus in the Office of Alderman Albert Thomson to Discuss Proceedings.

FAILURE TO PRESIDE AT ELECTION IS GIVEN AS CAUSE FOR ACTION

Mayor Woodard Declares He Does Not Believe "We Have Fifteen Such Fools in Council"—Council May Act at Meeting Monday.

Impeachment proceedings against Mayor James G. Woodard were virtually agreed upon last night by members of the majority faction of the council at a secret caucus of nearly three hours in the office of Alderman Albert Thomson, in the Healey building. Fifteen members were present.

It was stated by members of the caucus that nineteen votes had been formally pledged and that the remaining votes needed could be mustered from three members of general council who have not yet been willing to commit themselves, but have declared they would support the majority if the votes were needed to make the necessary two-thirds.

Councilman Charles W. Smith, who has been one of the most active leaders of the majority faction against the mayor, presided at the caucus and among those who discussed the proposal to prefer charges against the mayor were: Councilmen Sam Freeman, of the tenth; James W. Armistead, James M. Wood and Augustus T. Peacock, the newly elected member from the tenth.

HAVE RIGHT TO IMPEACH

The city's legal department, both City Attorney Mayson and Assistant City Attorney Ellis, have ruled that the general council would be within its rights to begin impeachment proceedings against the mayor, following his refusal to preside at an election to purchase the new gas plant Monday. A written opinion from the attorneys has been furnished Councilman Smith and was used as a basis for action last night.

It was the sense of the meeting that the mayor committed an illegal act in refusing to attend the election of general council performed under the advice of the city attorneys.

Of the fifteen members in the caucus every one favored impeachment proceedings and four others were notified that they would support the majority and vote for impeachment.

Those in the caucus were advised that the first step would be for one or more members of the general council to prefer charges against the mayor, following which the trial would be ordered. The judge of the city court would act as a jury, but in the event of a tie, a two-thirds majority vote for impeachment would be necessary.

HOLD SECOND CAUCUS.

It was not determined at the caucus whether a committee or twenty members of general council would formally prefer charges. At another caucus held last night, the members of general council Monday afternoon, definite action will be taken and formal charges may be preferred.

The special meeting of general council called to order the impeachment bond committee, which has recommended a bond issue of \$1,500,000 for public improvement.

Members of council at the caucus were told that Judge Smith, presiding at the meeting, the bond question would be given only secondary consideration, since impeachment proceedings are deemed probable.

Although pledged to secrecy as to the caucus last night and the action taken, certain members communicated to some of the mayor's political enemies, and members of council, the result of the meeting and received pledges of support from sources outside of the council.

"If all rot and I won't believe it," stormed Mayor Woodard, "I will be the cause of the caucus and the matter under consideration. I don't hold the very best opinion of some of these councilmen, but I won't believe that we have fifteen such fools in that body."

ILLEGAL, SAYS MAYOR

The mayor declared that by refusing to preside at the election of a purchasing agent under the new ordinance he was acting according to his convictions and would not be a party to perpetrating illegality.

"The whole thing was illegal from start to finish and I can prove it in the courts," he said. "If the council had gone through council and then through the aldermen's board, as the law requires in papers involving the expenditure of money, and my veto had been overridden, I would be presiding at the election."

When asked if he would preside at the election he again refused and said that he would not be a party to perpetrating illegality.

"I don't believe that we have fifteen such fools in that body," he said.

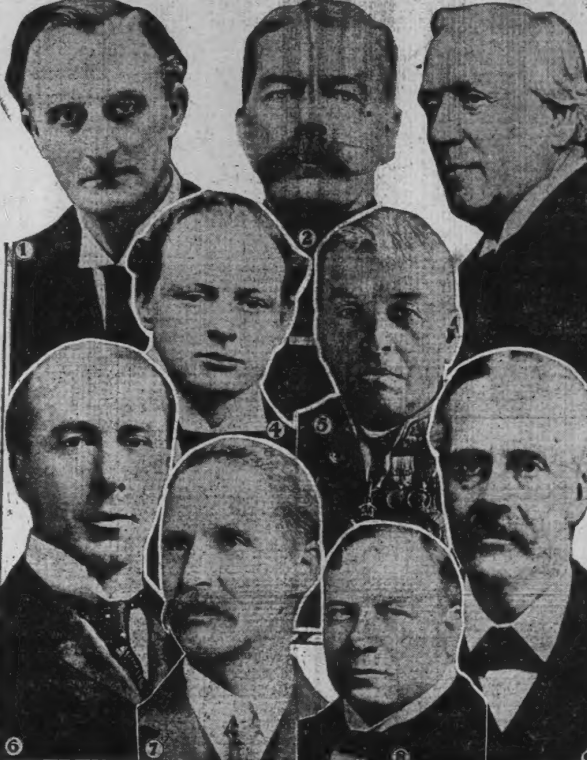

Britain Faces Sweeping Cabinet Changes



The British empire is facing the necessity of completely reconstructing its government and forming an all-national cabinet while it is at war with the most powerful enemy it ever faced. Differences between Baron John Fisher, admiral of the fleet, and Winston Churchill, his civilian chief, which ended in Fisher's resignation, brought the crisis. The Liberal ministry was already weak from a variety of causes—the failure of the Lloyd-George anti-drinking program and the reported inability of the army to secure needed ammunition among other things. It is a matter of time before the British cabinet will be completely reconstructed. Fisher and Churchill will be replaced by a new cabinet, and the present chancellor of the exchequer, and go to France to take active command in the field. Lord Lansdowne, the Lord Chancellor, Lewis Harcourt, the colonial secretary and Reginald McKenna, the home secretary, probably will resign, to be succeeded in their respective offices by the present Lord Chief Justice, Lord Reading; by Austen Chamberlain, son of the late Joseph Chamberlain and unionist leader, and by Andrew Bonar Law, leader of the Nationalists, may enter the new cabinet as colleague, the former as secretary of state for Ireland and the latter in an equally important post not yet in view. ATLANTA MEETS DEATH IN WATERS OF TUGALOO

J. A. Lovett Drowned While Surveying Near Tallulah Falls.

Tallulah Falls, Ga., May 21.—(Special.)—J. A. Lovett, an Atlanta surveyor, was drowned this morning in the Tugaloo river, 2 miles south of here, while running levels with a surveying party under the direction of Engineer P. S. Conner.

Lovett, acting as a rodaman, after working along the bank of the river had to cross to the South Carolina side. Finding it impossible to wade across, he took off his clothes and started to swim over. Although the water is swift at this point, Lovett's companions say that he was making good progress until he reached the South Carolina shore. Then he was seen to raise his head as though looking for a good landing place and was hurled by the current into the water. Owing to the swift current attempts at rescue proved fruitless. Although Lovett sank at about 11:30 o'clock Friday morning, it was not until 10 o'clock in the afternoon that his body was recovered.

Lovett was about 30 years of age. Relatives in Atlanta have been notified and the body will be taken here tomorrow.

SELECT ROUTES FOR DIXIE HIGHWAY AT MEETING TODAY

With Only Illinois Yet Unheard, Fourteen Commissioners State They Will Complete Choice Tonight

Chattanooga, Tenn., May 21.—Arguments before the fourteen Dixie highway commissioners for places on the Chicago to Miami, Fla., roadway were completed here tonight by the center delegates from all the seven states involved excepting Illinois. Representatives of that state will be heard early tomorrow, after which the commission will go into executive session to select the actual route for the highway.

Claims of sections competing for the route in Tennessee, Kentucky, Ohio and Indiana were presented at today's session, which did not adjourn until 5 p. m., and several warm contests developed. Chief interest, however, was held by the rivalry between Louisville and Cincinnati for locations on the highway. The former city claims the route, which is supported by representatives from Indianapolis and Nashville, in addition to the speakers from Louisville, while delegates from eastern Tennessee and the Blue Grass section of Kentucky argued in consonance with Ohio's representatives. Louisville, in turn, supported the Nashville road as against central and eastern Tennessee routes, and Cincinnati's speakers advocated the Blue Grass region's claims in opposition to the routes in western Kentucky.

To Select Routes Today.

The highway commissioners, here given no indication of the route they expect to adopt, but they stated tonight they would complete their selection by tomorrow evening.

The argument on behalf of Ohio for representation on the highway was led by former Governor James Cox, former Congressman Ralph E. Cole, of Findlay, and Harry E. Probasco, of Cincinnati. GREAT LOSSES FOR TEUTONS

Reported They Have Lost 10,000 Men Daily During Last Three Weeks—The Russians Appear to Have Halted German Advance.

London, May 21.—With Austria about to be attacked on all sides, the German allies are making tremendous efforts to complete the defeat of the Russian, who forced out of western Galicia and the Carpathians, are offering stubborn resistance behind the San river and around Presnyal. The Germans who have crossed the San north of Presnyal and the Austrians who have advanced to the southeast of that town, appear to have been halted, as today's report from Berlin does not show an advance.

Just to the north, in Poland, the Russians are carrying on a strong offensive, and driving the Germans back. An offensive against the German flank in Galicia. However, after the war they have been driven back and the heavy artillery bombardment they have had to undergo. The Russians must take time to reorganize the initiative.

Although the Russian war office continues to report that the German forces in Galicia have won further victories, it asserts their successes have been gained at enormous costs in men.

An official statement from the Austro-German forces in Galicia during the last three weeks at upwards of 15,000 men a day, and estimates that they have lost one-fourth of their strength.

Since foggy weather has stopped battle in the west, the allies have confined themselves to attempts to improve and organize the positions gained, and in this way they claim to have been successful, although the German claim that all the allies' attacks have been repulsed.

CLASH EXPECTED AT ANY MOMENT

Simultaneously with the anticipated outbreak of Italy, Serbia's reconstruction of army has fully recovered from the campaign which resulted in the Austrians being driven from Serbia, and will be ready to enter the Balkans at any moment.

This Austro-German force, which all sides and has still another enemy, Rumania, in prospect, for it has been reported that the Austro-German forces in Italy and Rumania have an agreement to act in concert. Rumania, however, is making the construction of an agreement with Greece and Bulgaria, which also are expected to join the allies before the end of the war.

DR. ERIC ZOEPEFFEL TO LEAVE ATLANTA FOR NEW STATION

Dr. Eric Zoepffel-Steinlein, German consul general of the United States, has been transferred to the northwest as consul general of that territory, with headquarters at Seattle.

Dr. Zoepffel expressed great interest in the dispatching of the German presence in the neighborhood of Radway, Ga.

"Radway," he said, "was formerly my home and I have a brother, John Zoepffel, who is here. I have an anxious to get news of him, and I hope to see him when I have a break of the war."

Dr. Zoepffel said that his brother is a naturalized Russian.

such Italy's entry into the war was announced, there was a great demonstration of enthusiasm inside the senate chamber, shouts of "Long live Italy" intermingled with the cheering and hand-clapping of the senators, the

ministers, army and navy officers and the people in the galleries. King Victor Emmanuel and members of the royal household witnessed the demonstration. Prince Colonna, mayor of Rome, had

been chosen to present the bill to the senate and his speech was frequently interrupted by applause. The mayor said he was proud to address the senate as so many as monuments for the country and for civilization. In the name of the people, he saluted the king and the parliament of the country to make a just war in order to deliver their oppressed brothers. The bill was referred to a committee. Meanwhile, the senate took a recess. When the senate again convened the committee reported the bill favorably and it passed almost unanimously. Several hundred thousand persons, led by the mayor of Rome, assembled tonight before the curtain. Members of the royal family made their appearance on a balcony and amidst indescribable scenes of enthusiasm. King Victor Emmanuel was greeted with cries of "long live the king" and with cheering and waving of the Italian flag.

AUSTRIANS DESTROY FRONTIER BRIDGES.
Brno, Italy, May 21.—(Via Paris.) The Austrians evidently consider that

a state of war between the dual monarchy and Italy already exists. The Austrians have withdrawn their troops and customs guards from the frontier at Pavia, Ferrara and Lodi, and are destroying the bridges, the telegraph and telephone lines and the electric light apparatus. Other bridges on the frontier have been mined.

From Rome, Pavia and Lodi and two roads pass over the frontier and serve for communication between Italy and Austria. Austrian artillery can be seen on neighboring mountains.

AUSTRIAN AIRSHIPS PATROL THE FRONTIER.
Paris, May 21.—A Havas dispatch from Milan, Italy, says that the Austrian military authorities today, after crossing the Italian frontier, cut the telegraph communications and also removed rails from the railroad line. A dispatch from Rome says that Italy today has received a report from the Austrian military authorities that the latter have been suspended.

ITALY HAS MASSED TROOPS ON COAST.
Italian Frontier, May 21.—(Via Chicago and Paris.)—The Italian military authorities are guarding with strictest secrecy the movement of troops. It is known, nevertheless, that some 150,000

holders have been concentrated on the coast of Italy, across the Adriatic from Albania. Three troops are at Brindisi, Bari and Vienna.

VON BUELOW READY TO LEAVE ROME.
Chisano, Switzerland, May 21.—(Via Paris.)—Prince von Buelow, the German ambassador to Rome, is expected to reach here from the Italian capital very shortly after the senate vote on the house bill empowering the cabinet to act for parliament in matters pertaining to the declaration of war.

The German consul at Leghorn, arriving here by automobile, and many other Germans are coming to the city from the frontier in Italy by train and by automobile. Among the stories told here today by arrivals from Rome was that Prince von Buelow was seen in his private car at the station yesterday afternoon, concluding with the words "I thought you had left Italy."

Representatives of independent telephone companies at Chicago, Washington and other cities besides those mentioned attended the meeting, which will adjourn tomorrow.
