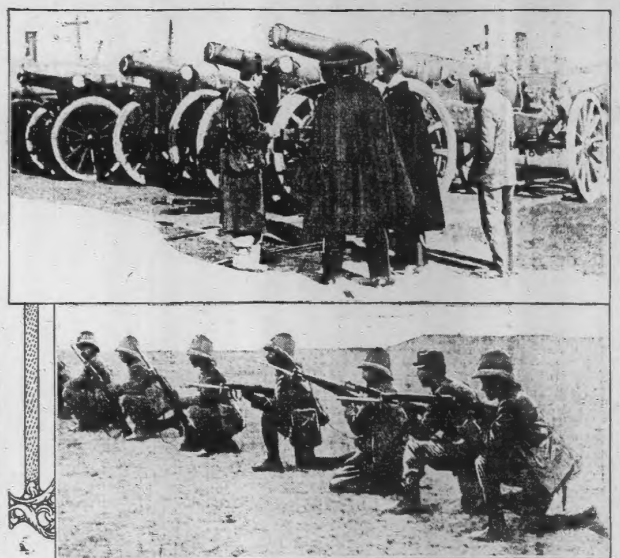

the Idria and Isonzo rivers and that, advancing, they had taken Cormons, which commands the lead leading to Gorizia, an important Austrian frontier station.

Passing from the south to the center of eastern Friuli the report indicated that the Italians also had occupied the village of Verc, on the road to Gradisca, Austria, and that in addition, in southern Friuli, Cervignano, another important Austrian frontier station leading to Montebelluna and Trieste. The Giornale d'Italia commenting on the bulletin says:

"The Italian advance occupied a front of 400 kilometers (about 250 miles) and has an extreme point at Caterio, on the north, to the Gulf of Trieste on the south. The first consists of the Italians penetrated into Austrian territory from two to four miles.

TOWNS TAKEN BY ITALIANS.

Rome, May 25.—(Via Paris).—The war office announced today that Italian forces had penetrated Austria, occupying Caporetto, the heights between the Julian and the Isonzo, and the town of Cormons, Cervignano and Terno.

Caporetto, Cormons, Cervignano and Terno are two to three miles from the Italian border. They stretch along the head of the Gulf of Trieste. Gorizia is 25 miles from Cormons, and Trieste is 25 miles from Cormons. Railroads running east and west pass through Cormons and Terno.

The statement reads:

"On the Carniola front Austrian artillery opened fire against our position without result. During the day the Italian army everywhere and encountered by artillery of the enemy.

"On the Friuli front our troops advanced everywhere and encountered only feeble resistance. We have occupied Caporetto, the heights between the Idria and Isonzo rivers, Cormons and Cervignano and Terno. The enemy withdrew, destroying bridges and burning houses.

"Our torpedo destroyers opened fire against the enemy's detachments at the port of Buco, and have disembarked troops. We captured several Austrians who had been sent to Venice. Our losses were one dead and some wounded."

ITALY'S ENTRANCE TO SHORTEN WAR

That's the Opinion of Russian Foreign Minister—He Declares Separate Peace Is Impossible.

Petrograd, May 25.—(Via London).—Italy's entry into the war will make the war much shorter in duration; it will have enormous influence on the attitude of neutral countries, and it will lead to the rapprochement of states whose interests seem at present to be opposed, said Sergius Sazonoff, Russian foreign minister.

"In any case," he continued, "no state power can henceforth be reinforced at the expense of any neutral country, whatever."

Concerning Bulgaria, M. Sazonoff said he did not believe that she would move against Russia under any circumstances. He declared that the Italian-Serbian relations were perfectly amicable, and that Russia's attitude toward Serbia would not be fulfilled unless Serbia received a free outlet to the Adriatic.

Regarding reports of a separate peace, M. Sazonoff said numerous attempts in that direction had been made, and not only on the part of Austria, but all had failed, and he added that anything of that character was "absolutely impossible."

FRENCH DEPUTIES CHEER FOR ITALY.

Paris, May 25.—Today's session of the French chamber of deputies was devoted to politics of Italy. All of the members of the cabinet were present and the galleries were crowded with the deputies for hourly by way of Titoni, the Italian ambassador to France.

"It is now fifty-six years since Italy entered upon the European stage as a nation of the lower house, and today she is the first of the great nations of the world," said M. Sazonoff, who was speaking at the conclusion of the oration, which the house unanimously approved.

YOUNG AND OLD HURRY TO COLORS.

Milan, May 25.—(Via Paris).—The Italian government has issued an order that all men over 16 years of age should be called to the colors. The order is to be carried out immediately. The idea is to give those who are fit to go to the front an opportunity to do so. It is reported that more than 100,000 men had volunteered to go to the front at once.

ENEMIES OF CARRANZA APPROACH VERA CRUZ

Reports Say That an Attack on General's Headquarters Is Feared.

Guatemala, Texas, May 25.—Reports reaching here today from Vera Cruz said it was feared there that General Carranza's headquarters might be attacked.

Hands of revolutionists opposed to Carranza have been drawing closer and in and out of Vera Cruz, daily have been growing bolder, the advice said. Meanwhile preparations have been made for a possible move of General Carranza to a haven of safety on the island of San Juan de Ului in the harbor. For months he has occupied quarters in the lighthouses on the mainland three hundred yards from a Mexican transport. He seldom has ventured from the lighthouses.

Until the American occupation of Vera Cruz last year the island, built by the Spaniards, was used as a place of refuge for Carranza. Carranza's headquarters in the lighthouses were brought to Vera Cruz. At Jalapa crowds of women recently filled the place and after hearing that the revolution had stopped, they fled to the mountains under a hail of bullets.

The activity of the anti-Carranza bands around Vera Cruz is causing concern in Mexico. Numerous passenger trains have been held up and the passengers, including Americans, have been forced to run to the mountains under a hail of bullets.

FRANCE MAKES OFFER TO PURCHASE DACIA

New York, May 25.—E. N. HIGH COURT GIVES SWEEPING OPINION ON FUTURE TRADES

New Orleans, May 25.—The federal court of appeals today decided that a debt incurred through "future" trading where there was no intention to deliver or receive the commodity traded in cannot be collected. Doubts Commission's Authority, But Thinks Legislature Will Confer It

Editor Constitution: The state railroad commission has taken no action at the instance of the local railway company, the question of whether or not to extend the existing law to include the "Jinny bus." We have thought it best therefore to submit the question in your column a brief exposition of the considerations which must determine that body's decision.

The railroad commission was created by a city ordinance approved April 10, last. This ordinance was attacked by the "Jinny bus" owners, who sought to enjoin its enforcement. Judge Ellis refused to enjoin its enforcement, holding that it was a reasonable exercise of the city's police power, an undoubted fact.

The determination by the railroad commission of the question before it must be made in accordance with the law, not creating it and the acts amendatory thereto. This, because it is an administrative body created by the legislature to see to the enforcement of general laws concerning certain public utility companies, its jurisdiction, therefore, is purely statutory and it can exercise no powers not granted expressly by necessary legislation.

The railroad commission was created by act of 1873, for the supervision of railroads only. Its power was enlarged in 1890 to include telegraph and telephone companies; in 1907 the commission's powers were largely extended to include the supervision of the 2603 of the civil code of 1910.

It is the commission's duty to say which of these interpretations is the correct one. In the present absence of any controlling ruling, precedent or construction, the commission must have recourse to the general rules of statutory construction.

CLEARING HOUSE FOR UNEMPLOYED MEETING WITH READY SUPPORT

By Isaac Dooley. From the clearing house for the unemployed, established now in offices on the sixth floor of the Chamber of Commerce building, a number of practical suggestions have been rendered women workers. The clearing house is the creation of a board of women managers, of which Mrs. Beaumont Davison is president, and Miss Susan McClellan is secretary.

For three months Miss McClellan has had the register in charge where the unemployed women register in seeking employment, while employers seeing the value of the well-kept record in securing practical patronage, this work originated by the Emergency Association.

In the last two weeks seventeen women have secured permanent positions through the clearing house, while a firm of young women stenographers has been established through the agency of the clearing house. The new clearing house, "Martin & McClellan" is operating a confidential commercial stenographic service, which is being run as a firm for the purpose of doing this class of work.

It is explaining the venture a member of the firm stated yesterday. "We are not soliciting permanent stenographic work as a business, but rather as a means of employing several stenographers who have no other means of support. We are not desirous to have the regular routine of the business, but rather to have a few stenographers, therefore, we are here to help them in their work, and we are currently and confidentially executed. We have the highest indorsements to offer. We intend that we will run on a high-class basis and no work of a questionable character shall enter our office. We have adopted this as our business policy and mean to maintain it. We hope that we will be able to help them."

He says that the national government must develop the roads in this country, and he believes that the time will soon come when the entire country will be threaded with fine roads.

Speaking of the meeting of the Dixie highway commission, he said: "It was one of the most remarkable gatherings ever held in this country. Do not believe that there has ever been such a demonstration regarding the improvement of roads in the history of the United States. There were fully 500 people present, and they came from every section of the states through which the Dixie highway will pass, from Chicago to Miami, Fla., and represented the best and most progressive class of business and professional men."

"Those who attended the meeting not only listened to the speakers from their own sections, but heard with interest what those from other sections had to say. The meeting was a wonderful revelation of the material resources and the historic and scenic beauty of the south."

"At first a majority seemed to favor only one route, but after the commission decided upon two routes, they declared that such action was warranted because neither could be ignored. The selection of two routes will create a healthy and stimulating rivalry between them, and each will strive to offer the best inducements to attract it."

"He said that the construction of the Dixie highway was already having a wonderful effect in Tennessee. UNITED STATES WAITS FOR GERMANY'S REPLY

To Note in Regard to Louisiana Horror—Reported Reply Will Satisfy America.

Washington, May 25.—President Wilson told cabinet today he did not know the causes for the delay of the German reply to the American note on the Louisiana, but he presumed the German government was, for the moment, absorbed in the new circumstances arising out of Italy's entrance into the war.

While Ambassador Gerard has sent several messages bearing on what the German reply may be, no direct information had been received concerning its contents. In German quarters it is said the note will be of a character to give the American public some light on the shipping situation as between Great Britain and the United States.

London, May 25.—The following dispatch was received today by the Exchange Telegraph company from America: The German government has asked America to furnish it with a statement in its reply to the note concerning the Louisiana, pressure is being brought to bear informally on the British foreign office.

HOLLAND PROTESTS ABOUT LUBIATINA. The Hague, Netherlands, May 25.—(Via London).—The Netherlands has sent a note to Germany protesting against the sinking of the Lusitania.
