

CAP AND MINE SAW IN NEBRASKA

"Saw No Submarine, But Am Certain Torpedo Hit Us," Is Statement by Vesell's Commander.

WASHINGTON AWAIT'S REPORT FROM EXPERT

Naval Constructor McBride to Examine Ship to Decide Whether Mine or Submarine Did Damage.

Liverpool, May 27.—(Special.)—The American steamer Nebraska, which was disabled Tuesday night by an explosion off the coast of Ireland, arrived here shortly before midnight. The captain said:

"I saw no submarine, but am certain it was a torpedo which hit us."

"Moreover, a submarine could not have failed to see our mine and we were aware of its position in huge letters on our side."

Members of the crew of the Nebraska were agreed that the explosion was caused by a torpedo.

The forward part of the ship is wrecked.

Captain Greene told this story of the damage to his ship:

"We left Liverpool Monday. The next morning, 48 miles off the coast of Ireland, we were torpedoed. Only ten minutes before we had hoisted down the American flag, but it was quite low, and the submarine must have seen the big white lettering on our side, which read Nebraska of New York."

"I was below at the time. There was a terrible shock which threw everybody about on their sides. Immediately afterwards came a tremendous explosion, which slightly injured two quartermasters and the boatswain, and the terrific 30 feet high wave blew up the hatch."

"The ship rapidly filled with water. In five or six minutes we were obliged to settle. We thought the ship was lost, and got into our lifeboats. Two armed British vessels came up to reply to our distress signals."

"As the vessel still floated we returned on board and made a more careful examination. We found the No. 2 bulkhead holding firm, and decided to remain aboard and try to bring the ship into Liverpool under her own power, which we accomplished successfully."

**NAVAL CONSTRUCTOR
TO EXAMINE SHIP.**

Washington, May 27.—Ambassador Page at London called on the British government tonight that Captain Greene of the American steamer Nebraska, had given the naval attaché of the embassy a sworn statement of the explosion concerning the explosion on his ship off the Irish coast Tuesday and that the attaché was examining the report.

The report of the attaché was forwarded to the state department as soon as Lieutenant Powers reaches London. But any decision on the statement will be delayed until the constructor's report is received.

The first report to Consul General Skinner at London by telegraph today, Captain Greene said his ship either struck a mine or was torpedoed, and he is sure he thinks his affidavit may not be correct.

Think Ship Hit Mine.

The United States government had received a report from Ambassador Page and Consul General Skinner at London and a statement from Captain Greene of the American steamer Nebraska, but from all information thus far available it has been impossible to determine whether the explosion on the Nebraska Tuesday was caused by mine or torpedo.

Many officials are inclined to believe the ship struck a floating mine. Naval officers say the upward explosion as described by Captain Greene has a character more likely to have been caused by a mine than a torpedo.

Ambassador Page reported that he had been informed by the British government that the explosion was caused by a mine.

"Any diplomatic action as a result of the incident will be deferred until there is definite proof of the cause of the explosion. Should it develop that the vessel was torpedoed, the fact that her flag had been lowered a few minutes before the explosion, and the fact that no hearing on the action of the American government which always has insisted upon the exercise of the right of visit and search before an attack upon any merchantman."

There is no international convention now relative to the raising of mines. The United States ratified the Hague convention on this subject, but it is not operative because the signatories did not ratify it. The principles laid down in that convention, however, were that the laying of unmarked contact mines should be forbidden and that all mines should be of a character that would be harmless immediately on being detached from their anchors.

Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, today presented a memorandum to the state department relating that mines laid by Germany were harmless when unlaid. Previously the British government had given a United States similar assurance.

JUDGE R. T. DANIEL DIES AT HIS POST

Head of American Odd Fellowship Stricken at Close of Address to Grand Lodge in Fitzgerald.

Fitzgerald, Ga., May 27.—(Special.)—Just as he closed an eloquent address to fifteen hundred Odd Fellows attending the grand lodge here, Judge Robert T. Daniel, sovereign grand officer of the order in America, was stricken with apoplexy on the platform and died early tonight without regaining consciousness.

He was attended immediately by Dr. E. B. Clarke, of Atlanta, who is attending the session here, with the aid of Past Grand Masters J. H. Dozier, John W. Bennett and W. B. Coleman, who hurried to the Lee Grand hotel in the ambulance.

Dr. E. J. Dorniney was called in and a trained nurse secured. His family at Griffin was promptly notified, his brother and family physician, with Mrs. Daniel, hastened to his bedside by automobile, reaching Fitzgerald late this afternoon.

His death came a gleam over the grand lodge proceedings and they rapidly spread over Fitzgerald. The fifteen hundred delegates attending the grand lodge are leaving the city greatly affected by the death of the leader of American Odd Fellowship.

Accor British Battleship Best of the Storm

War's Cloud Hangs Over Practically All Europe

MAJESTIC SINKS IN DARDANELLES

Nearly All Officers and Men Were Saved—Ship Was Supporting Army on Gallipoli Peninsula.

STEAMER IS BLOWN UP IN SHEERNESS HARBOR

Accidental Explosion Costs Many Lives—British and Danish Steamers Are Sunk by Submarines.

London, May 27.—The British battleship Majestic, another of the ships supporting the allied army on the Gallipoli peninsula, was sunk by a German submarine today. Nearly all the officers and crew were saved.

At about the same time the steamer Princess Irene, built last year for the Canadian Pacific-British Columbia coast service, and which was taken over by the admiralty at the commencement of the war, was destroyed by an accident while at anchor at Sheerness, where she was undergoing repairs. All her crew, numbering about 200, except one seaman and 19 dockyard workmen aboard at the time, lost their lives.

The Majestic, which was the oldest battleship on the active list of the British navy, was the sixth capital ship lost by the allies since the beginning of the Dardanelles operations, and the second which has fallen a victim to German submarines which recently arrived in those waters.

**SUBMARINE MENACE
STEADILY GROWING.**

While the warships are able to escape submarines in the waters around the British fleet, the increase in their numbers and the carrying of a submarine trade more and more seaward.

The admiralty still believes that the American steamer Nebraska, now on her way to Liverpool, was torpedoed by the British steamer Morwenna, bound for Canada, and the Danish steamer which has not been contacted since only a few days ago the commander of a submarine informed a Danish captain that he had no orders to sink Danish ships.

**TEUTONIC ALLIES
SURROUND PRZEMYSL.**

London, May 27.—The British admiralty issues the following report on the vice admiral in the eastern Mediterranean:

The submarine E-11, Lieutenant Commander Martin E. Naasmit, has sunk in the Sea of Marmora a vessel containing a great quantity of ammunition, comprising 100,000 rounds of howitzers, several gun mountings and a 6-inch gun. She also carried a supply ship with heavy cargo of stores and torpedoed her alongside a pier at Constantinople.

ITALIANS 30 MILES FROM CITY OF TRIEST.

Geneva, Switzerland, May 22.—(Via Paris.)—A strong Italian force today crossed the Isonzo river, in Austria, after a sharp fight with Austrian troops, and arrived before the town of Montebelluna, 30 miles from the Austrian report of Triest.

TURKISH LOSSES EXTREMELY HEAVY.

The allies report continued progress against the Turks on the Gallipoli peninsula. During the night the Turkish attack for they buried many more than 2,000 dead, while the British gathered up no less than 12,000 Turkish rifles—proof that the Turkish losses were extremely heavy.

These losses were sustained in a terrific counter attack directed against the positions which were held by the British. The Turks came under the fire of the ships at the same time.

The results of these counter attacks and the carrying of attacks by the allies themselves have resulted in considerable losses on the allied side to which must now be added the losses sustained by the sinking of the battleship, Triumph, and the destroyer, the Italian continues their offensive on the frontiers of the Trentino and Istria, and have taken a chain of important positions, but they have not yet come into contact with the main Austrian forces, which are waiting for the opportunity to attack.

ALLIED FORCES PRESS ATTACK AGAINST TURKS

Have Occupied Important Positions as Result of Bayonet Attack.

Paris, May 22.—A Havas Athens dispatch says the action of the allies against the Turkish positions on the Gallipoli peninsula is continuing vigorously. Reinforcements constantly are being brought up and the Turks appear to be retreating by the incessant renewal of the attacks.

Zepplin Raids South End; French Fire Powder Plant

Kaiser's Airmen Kill Two Women and Injure One Child.

London, May 27.—(Special.)—An admiralty statement says two women were killed and a child injured in a Zeppelin raid on the South End.

The Zeppelin, says the statement, and bombs were dropped on South End. The casualties reported to date are two women killed and one child badly injured.

South End, England, May 27.—Another Zeppelin raid was made upon the South End tonight, in which three persons were killed by bombs.

The Zeppelin was illuminated by the bursting of shells dropped by the air craft, but the material damage caused appears to have been less than on the occasion of the last raid.

A revised count shows that only one person was killed, Mrs. May Fabin, who was here on a visit. A number of other persons were injured.

Some reports say that two, and others that three, Zeppelins took part in the raid last night, and that the number accurately for heavy clouds.

The noise of the propellers was first heard shortly before 11 o'clock. They came in once, and then went away.

Some of the bombs were incendiary. Crowds assembled in the streets, and Fabin was killed as she was leaving a street car. It is recalled that in the Zeppelin raid the only victim was a woman.

British aeroplanes went up in pursuit of the raiders, but they could not take them. Some time later two Zeppelins were seen over Bournemouth, but no more bombs were dropped.

South End, a municipal borough and popular resort, has been the target of Zeppelin raids several times in the last six months. On no previous occasion have the results been serious.

French Birdmen Bombard an Important Ammunition Factory on Rhine.

Paris, May 27.—A French aerial force, composed of eighteen aeroplanes, each carrying 110 pounds of projectiles, this morning bombarded a chemical factory at Ludwigshafen, on the Rhine, opposite Mannheim.

Fire broke out in several of the factory buildings as a result of this bombardment.

This factory is one of the most important manufacturers of explosives in all Germany. The French aviators were in the air for six hours, and covered more than 400 kilometers (240 miles).

The expedition against an important German military establishment was the French army's first attempt of German aviators on the city of Paris.

Information was contained in the French official statement given out by the war office this afternoon.

Belgian troops last night repulsed two German attacks, one north and the other south of Dinant.

TO CREATE MARKET FOR U. S. BILLS OF EXCHANGE

Large Interests Back Plan to Facilitate Trade With Chile.

Washington, May 27.—A definite plan for creating a market for bills of exchange on loans in the United States payable in dollars was presented today at the conference between business and financial representatives of the United States and the Chilean delegation attending the Pan-American conference.

It was said tonight that the Guggenheim copper interests, the Bethlehem steel company and the Dupont Powder company, which have large interests in Chile, are behind the plan, which would involve exchange aggregating some \$25,000,000 a year.

Business representatives of the United States in this conference were told that Chile created an export duty on nitrate and had provided that ninety-day bills of exchange on London payable in pounds sterling shall be practically tendered for the same purposes.

It was said that the plan would make bills drawn on banks in the United States legal tender to the same extent to facilitate the business of the United States which would spend millions each year in nitrate purchases in Chile.

The Chileans promised to urge their governments to make the steps necessary. Later, it was said, the same plan would be made to other South American countries where bills in London are legal tender.

At the conference today were a general session, a luncheon given by Secretary McKim, and a trip to Mount Vernon on the presidential yacht Marlborough. Tomorrow there will be more open conferences and a general session of the conference.

It is expected to make reports. Several of the South American nations intend to make vigorous efforts to have some concrete plan for improvement of the United States legal tender to the same extent to facilitate the business of the United States which would spend millions each year in nitrate purchases in Chile.

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Some of the South Americans probably will remain in the United States after the conference close in the hope of enlisting capital or of making other arrangements that will assure the establishment of steamship lines.
