

intercourse with a government which repudiates these principles. Steps would be taken to inform Americans of the dangers to which they were exposed as a result of this action, and such measures as necessary adopted to safeguard the lives and interests of citizens of the United States should Germany accept the principle in a way that would constitute a guarantee for the future, the American government would reiterate its demand for "strict accountability" for violations of this principle and the killing of Americans on the Lusitania.

The decision to base the American note on the principle of international law to obtain an affirmative or negative reply, and not enter into a technical discussion of details raised in the German communication, was the single development of the cabinet council.

Some members favored early repudiation of the note, as the facts asked for by Germany, setting first the point as to whether Germany intended to disregard the American warning of last February that it would insist upon the exercise of the right of visit, and search with respect to vessels on which Americans were traveling.

DELAY OPPOSED BY CABINET.
One cabinet officer believed the American government should enter into an investigation of the points raised by the German answer, submitting its proof and giving the German government an opportunity to do likewise. Others, however, declared that such a process would mean only delay and in the event of a deadlock on facts, would leave the United States which had already assured itself of the authenticity of its information, and whose road fact was at stake, without remedy for the present or future attacks on American vessels having hearts 5 for 1.

BIBB COUNTY GIVES \$100,000 FOR SCHOOLS

Macon, Ga., June 1.—(Special)—The Bibb county commissioners this morning made a special appropriation to the board of education of this county amounting to \$100,000, to be used in paying off the balance of the indebtedness on the new school building erected last year at a cost of \$110,000, and for the building of new grammar school building in the Toccoa district to replace the present frame structure there. The cost of the Toccoa school will be about \$60,000.

LAKWOOD CONCESSION
TRICK HEATS UP BUSINESS

Mayor's Action Taken on Account of the Southeastern Fair.

Mayor Woodward Tuesday held up the opening of bids for concessions at Lakewood park, when he told the park board that the Southeastern Fair association is planning to open a concession at the park that no one else will just at this time that the concession would be worth at least \$25,000 after the fair is established. Several bids had been filed with the park board for the concession, but they were not opened.

After discussion the board voted to allow J. B. Bille, the present concessionaire of the park, to remain there for ninety days, and after that time to meet agree to vacate a portion of all of the park upon demand of the board.

General Manager J. O. Cochran submitted his monthly report, showing unusual activities in improvement work in all the parks. His report also showed more persons patrolling the parks this season than ever before. In the few days that clean-up work has been open at Piedmont park, 10,713 persons have gone in bathing, and no disorder was reported.

Members of the board expressed themselves as being pleased with the work of the general manager, and stated that they were glad to see the letter being shown by the people to the board.

A letter was read before the board from E. C. Coughlin of the humane society, in which he severely criticized the work of the city parks department in conducting the parks. He based his complaints on the action of the general manager in putting him off the board at Piedmont park recently. The general manager stated that Mr. Coughlin was accustomed to riding his horse on the sidewalks and damaging the sidewalks. The city was allowed to use. He also stated that Mr. Coughlin had given the police considerable trouble in this regard.
