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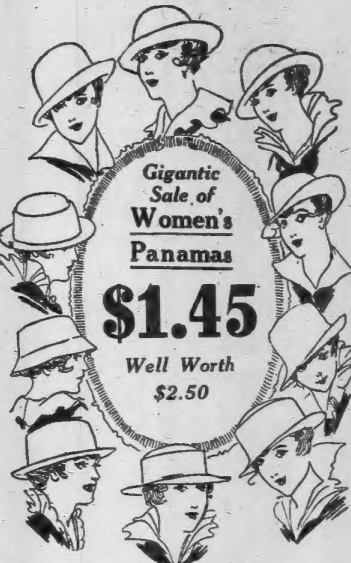

BRYAN IS BRANDED AS "NEAR TRAITOR"

Dr. Broughton Shows Famous "Scrap of Paper" on Stereopticon Slide.

Branding as "almost treason" the recent resignation of Bryan from the cabinet, Dr. Ten G. Broughton, speaking at the Baptist Tabernacle Monday evening, indorsed President Wilson as the greatest living statesman of the world and complimented his name with the name of King George of England, as the two men who should bring about world-wide peace.

"Bryan had a perfect right," said Dr. Broughton, "to forsake President Wilson at this critical time. He had the same right that every man has to fight with his brother in his hour of need. But he has no right to go to the cabinet armed with his name to bolster himself up before the American people and attempt to discredit the president and make him appear a weakling in the eyes of the nations of the world. As I view that scrap of paper, I judge the temper of the American people their refusal will fall upon him rather than upon the honest, humanitarian president in Washington.

"Those who are acquainted with the facts cannot but admire the consummate statesmanship with which he is handling the delicate situation created by the sinking of the Lusitania. The United States now has the opportunity, Dr. Broughton said, "to emerge upon the greatest period of prosperity in its history. The resources of Europe and England would be gone in time," he said, "and an account of the devastated fields and ruined industries would of necessity look to this country for sustenance and means of re-cooperation. Commercial supremacy and economic prosperity would come." He assured the large audience, "if trade could be torn from the clutch of the shipping trust, which has monopolized American sale of commodities abroad. "The greatest hinderer of the American congress ever perpetrated," exclaimed the speaker, "was his failure to pass the shipping bill pressed by the greatest patriot this country has ever had. Dr. Broughton expressed himself as a strong pro-ally man and in speaking of the conflict abroad as the greatest in the world's history, said that he could give much of his information from experiences in Europe and facts gained from the excellent stereopticon "scrap of paper," the treaty which guaranteed Belgium's neutrality, which had been made from an actual photograph and which he declared he was the only man thus far permitted to exhibit publicly.

COUNTY POLICEMEN TO PULL BOXES NOW

Oscar Mills Planning to Give Fulton County Adequate Protection.

With a view to giving the residents of Fulton county a more efficient county police department, Chairman Oscar Mills, of the police committee of the county board, announced Monday that the committee would meet Thursday with Chief George Mathison, of the county police, and arrange for a complete reorganization. "The three lieutenants of police will also be in the room."

Some time ago twenty-four call boxes were installed in the various sections of the county for the thirty-one police of the county force. Up to that time the police had been forced to report over private telephones and when they found it difficult to report.

Chairman Mills' plan is to divide the county into districts or "beats" and assign an officer to each district. He further plans to have call boxes at certain hours during the day and night so that any officer may be located at any time. W. Tom Winn, another member of the police committee, is known to favor the plan and it is said that Dr. W. G. Gilbert, chairman of the county board committee, has seen the need of such a reorganization.
