DESPERATE FIGHTING ON THE WESTERN FRONT

Each Side Dwells on Losses of the Other and Each Emphasizes Its Gains, All of Which Have Been Costly, Though Small as to Distance.

14,000 WAR PRISONERS CAPTURED BY THE BRITISH

The prisoners taken by the German army during the Russian campaign to June 14 total 141,000, according to the Bavarian State Gazette. The newspaper says this total is divided into 120,000 British, 25,000 Russian, 1,000 French, 45,000 English, 26,000 Belgian, 41,000 American, 50,000.

BATTLE RAGES FOR LEMBERG

Before Lemberg the Russians have been driven back on their last defense, but dispatches from the Austro-Hungarian press headquarters, and both this source and news and the Austrian official account assert that nearly everywhere in the Galician front the Russians are meeting with repulse.

HARD FIGHTING ON THE WEST

Although disagreeing as to results, the German official statement, and the British official statement indicate that the fighting in the Arras sector and at the northern and southern ends of the Salient near Arras is as desperate as any the western theater of war has known since the British have brought their hand-to-hand fighting, the British and French striving to distance the trenches gained and the Germans, with a preponderance of machine guns, as promptly initiating counter-attacks.

through, but it is patent that they are on the offensive. The French declare they are continuing to advance in the region of Metz and along both banks of the Meuse river. In this region Paris asserts that the French troops are holding under their fire the German line of communications between Metz and Munster.

AUSTRO-GERMANS PURSUE RUSSIANS.

Vienna, June 18.—(Via London.)—The Austro-German troops in pursuit of the retreating Russians have crossed the Galician border north of Sieniawa and have reached the heights north of Krasny Rudnik, and occupied the Russian town of Tarnograd, according to an official communication issued by the war office today.

The communication says: "North of Sieniawa, our pursuing troops have reached the heights north of Krasny Rudnik and occupied Tarnograd. The Russian forces between the lower San and the Vistula have retired at several points. The heights north of Cieszanow (10 miles of Lubaczow) have been taken. In the mountainous region east of Nienimierz and near the Warzawa river the fighting continues. Our troops have gained a footing at some points eastwards of the Warzawa river. Elsewhere the situation of the upper Dniester the Russian forces have been fighting, were compelled to retire from positions near the mouth of the river. On a position along the Dniester is unchanged. The eastern groups of General Prater's army have been fighting three Russian storming attacks. The enemy making desperate attempts to throw our troops back in Bukowina, suffered heavy losses from our artillery and retired quickly. Light officers and a thousand men and three machine guns were captured."

FRENCH GAIN IN ALSACE.

Paris, June 18.—The following official communication was issued tonight:

"In the sector to the north of Arras a violent artillery duel has taken place today. The front here remains unchanged. We hold all the ground we have captured."

"In Alsace we have fortified the positions which we took yesterday and continue to make progress here. Our advance parties at the end of the day had reached the outskirts of Metzler. We have advanced along both banks of the Fecht. We hold under our fire the enemy's communications between Metzler and Munster. Further south our machine guns have been very largely effective against the enemy's positions and carriages, have been destroyed. There is nothing to report concerning the situation on the remainder of the front."

BRITISH HOLD GERMAN TRENCHES.

London, June 18.—The following report from Sir John French, commander-in-chief of the British forces on the western front, was received today:

"The fighting in the northern and southern portions of our front continues throughout June 18. In the latter connection with the attack of our ally about 3 miles of the German first line trenches which we captured remain in our hands in spite of two counter-attacks which were repulsed with heavy loss to the enemy. We were, however, unable to retain possession of the enemy's second line trenches which had been occupied in the morning."

ALLIES REPULSED, GERMANS CLAIM.

Berlin, June 18.—(Via London.)—Official announcements made here today that an allied force which attacked German positions north of La Bassée, northwestern France, was repulsed, only a few succeeding in retreating.

The text of the statement was as follows:

"Western front: Our enemies continue their attempts to break through our lines north of La Bassée canal and have suffered a new defeat. Their attacking troops were destroyed. Only a few men succeeded in retreating."

"On the eastern front, the French pushed their attack on the heights of the north of the Loreste hills, situated within range of the enemy's fire in the direction of the Champagne district."

"Since June 15 we have captured on the battlefield north of Arras 17 officers and 467 men. The sanitary losses of our opponents were equal to those of the battles in the Champagne district."

"In the Argonne we repulsed weak enemy advances at Vauquois. Local fighting between our troops and German detachments around Metzler are still going on."

"The German aviation division was driven from the Argonne south of the Argonne branch. East of the high road between Cysoy and Bessin an attack by the enemy in strong force against the Duvivier line was repulsed."

"Southwestern theater: The German aviation division of the Tarnograd Austro-German troops yesterday drove the enemy back toward a branch of the Tanow river. Later, during the night, the German aviation division was driven still farther back by the army under the command of General von Scholtz as far as the prepared positions at the mouth of the Tanow river. The German aviation division was repulsed at the junction with the River Duvivier."

"On the Danube front, northeast of the Danube, the situation remains unchanged."

Rome reports that three civilians were slightly injured at Rimini.
