

GRAND ELECTED COPELAND HOUSE DELEGATE SHEPARD

Fight Upon Appointment of Committees by Head of Lower House Dies With This Election.

SUFFRAGISTS PRESENT WORKING FOR MEASURES

Persons Is Named President of State Senate—Serious Problems Before Assembly, Says Burwell.

The general assembly which met and was organized yesterday morning gives promise of getting down to work with less excitement than in several years past.

The ladies in fact seem to give evidence of more activity than in any year in the past.

The only real fight which developed in the first day's session was over the withdrawal Tuesday of Representative D. B. Ballard, of Campbell, from the race.

The fight upon the appointment of the rules committee by the speaker, which had been undertaken by J. E. Sheppard, of Sumter.

Before the house and senate get ready to conduct their regular sessions the details of the election of a speaker for the house, the choosing of committees by the speaker and the appointment of a reading clerk.

Some of the committees named.

Speaker Burwell will announce his committee next Monday.

At the first day of the session indicated that among the first important matters to come before the legislature will be the Western and Atlantic railroad question.

Among the questions arising from the movement in Chattanooga to condemn the terminals there for street purposes.

The matter of re-leasing the road, known as the Atlanta and Georgia, and the recommendation of the governor that the state board of education be made corporate body with a salary.

Speaker Burwell, in his speech Wednesday, in the first meeting that county school superintendents are residents of the county and must be elected, he recommended.

Also the governor recommends a law requiring that no religious institution should be a member of city boards of education, which provision already appears in the charter of education.

Restrictions on land.

The suffragists were at the state house bright and early with circulars advocating measures which they wish passed.

These measures include a compulsory education law, a law to allow women to practice law in Georgia, a law to enfranchise the women of Georgia, and a law to limit the age of conscription from 18 to 18 years.

The only feature which injected any element of wariness into the morning's proceedings was the accusation of a campaign of "villification and abuse" against Mr. Burwell by the speaker's campaign, this statement being made by Mr. J. E. Sheppard, of Washington county, when he placed Mr. Burwell in nomination.

Remarks were directed toward the gentleman who has not long been a resident of this state, and who in his former life in Virginia and Missouri and other states did not have a favorable opportunity to become acquainted with Mr. Burwell's qualities.

Mr. Lansing is a life-long democrat, but he has devoted his time to international law and diplomacy, and is as popular with former republican officials as with his colleagues.

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JUDGE NAT HARRIS COMES TO ATLANTA FOR INAUGURATION

Arrangements Are Now Being Completed for Big Event at the Panama-Pacific Exposition.

Exposition Grounds, San Francisco, Cal., June 23.—(Special.)—Elaborate plans for the celebration of Atlanta's bicentennial anniversary will be completed Monday, July 19, at the exposition grounds.

Judge Harris will be inaugurated as Georgia's chief executive next Saturday. A large delegation will come to Atlanta from Macon for the occasion and there will also be many of Judge Harris' admirers here from other sections of the state.

In fact, so large is the attendance expected for the inauguration that plans are being considered for holding the ceremonies upon the state grounds in large suits which will probably be used for the occasion.

Judge Harris was busy all Wednesday afternoon preparing his final message to the legislature and his inaugural address.

It will not differ greatly from the message which he delivered to the legislature on Wednesday afternoon and night to pay their respects.

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LEMBERG IS MOST FAIR OF RUSS FORCES

Berlin and Vienna Are Celebrating the Recapture of the Galician Capital Which Russians Have Held Since First Month of War.

Russian Rear Guards Fought Desperately to Cover Retirement.

Believed that Austro-Germans Found Little Booty as the Russians Had Been Retiring to New Front for Several Days—Berlin and Vienna, However, Claim Crushing Blow Has Been Dealt Russia.

London, June 23.—The Russians have lost Lemberg. They occupied the Galician capital early in September and held it continuously until Tuesday, when the combined Austro-German forces compelled their retreat from the city, which is only sixty odd miles due west from the nearest point of the Russian frontier.

Whether the fall of Lemberg means that the Russian army operating south of it in the Galician is effectively cut off from the rest of the army stretching across Poland to the Baltic cannot yet be said.

Vienna and Berlin newspapers have been full of reports that the Russian army has received a blow from which they cannot recover.

GERMAN FORCES FIGHT FOR WEST.

If the stroke proved as crushing as the Russian predict, its effect, military observers here say, soon should be felt in the theater of the west.

Previous dispatches from the Russian capital related details of what purported to be the systematic retreat of the Russian army from the town and if these details should be correct it would be a serious tactical stroke here when the count in the Austro-German body of the Russian army.

TELEGRAMS FROM VIENNA.

Telegrams from Vienna concerning the Russian retreat and the celebration of the populace in Vienna over the victory add that the Austrian correspondents with the Russian front lines are reporting that the Russian army is retreating eastward in good order, leaving behind them a trail of abandoned Russian documents from the city, which since the Russians occupied the town had been called by them the "German empire."

THE GERMAN EMPEROR IS BELIEVED TO HAVE BEEN CALLED BY THE RUSSIAN LEADER, and word comes from Petrograd that Emperor Nicholas has started on his way to the front to inspire his soldiers by his presence.

PLANS ARE MADE FOR ATLANTA DAY

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POPE MAY TRANSFER SEAT TO SPAIN

Vatican Is Discussing Invitation Extended by the Spanish Bishops.

Rome, June 23.—(Via Chiasso to Rome.) It is asserted that the details of the pope's proposed invitation to transfer his seat to Spain, is causing a heated discussion at the Vatican.

It is recalled that after the transfer of the papacy from Avignon to Rome, the pope transferred his seat to the Vatican in 1870.

Some of the cardinals favored the immediate transfer of the papacy elsewhere, but the majority agreed that the transfer should be made only if the safety of the pope were threatened or he was hindered in the exercise of his duties.

The bill amended the law regarding the departure of the pope until he should resume his office in his own residence.

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TEUTONS OF AMERICA

They Will Form Political Association to Force U. S. to Stop Export of Munitions.

Cleveland, Ohio, June 23.—Cleveland Germans received today copies of a call issued in Detroit and Toledo for a meeting of representatives of German, Austrian and Hungarian social, fraternal and political organizations throughout the country to form a political association for the object of forcing the United States to stop the sale of arms and munitions to Germany.

The call was issued by The Deutsche Bund of Detroit, and the German-Hungarian Society of Toledo. The meeting is set for July 3 at the Hotel Statler, Detroit.

The formal call says that German-American citizens "know well enough that the United States has the formal right to export arms and ammunition to the allies," but that on moral grounds and "in the name of humanity" an embargo should be placed on such exports.

New York, June 23.—Thirteen witnesses, including two newspaper men who had been associated with him during the late years of his life, testified today that they believed Harry K. Thaw is sane. They appeared in proceedings before a jury to test Thaw's present mental state, on the outcome of which depends whether the slayer of Stanford White will go free or return to the insane asylum from which he escaped.

Thaw's former trial, two chaplains, a physician and a keeper at the Tombs prison, where Thaw at various times was confined; two newspaper men who had been associated with him during the late years of his life; and Thaw's attorney, a lawyer who had met Thaw in New Hampshire and a juror in civil proceedings instituted by one of Thaw's former attorneys against Thaw's mother.

All agreed that Thaw showed no symptoms of delusion that he could kill intelligently his mother's subjects, had never been violent on his knowledge, and appeared rational.

Thaw appeared composed on the witness stand and answered his attorney's questions in a well-modulated voice and without hesitation. He described the story of his escape from Mattawan, said he had left prison a physician, had told him he was sane and because he himself believed so. Cross-examination was postponed.

Alleges Thaw Is Pervert. That the whole sordid history of the Thaw case would be dragged to light again before the trial is concluded was indicated by Deputy Attorney General Cook in his address. He said the state would prove Thaw was an incurable parasite and was morally perverted.

In his cross-examination of the witness today, Cook put questions designed to impress on the jury that a man suffering from the form of insanity which the state alleges Thaw possessed, might appear perfectly rational in his ordinary associations, especially mentally brilliant. One important witness was the state's doctor, Dr. Susan Merrill, whose home Thaw was alleged at his trial for murder to have frequented, was missing, Cook said today. She has been located in Boston and promised to come to New York.

Evelyn Nesbit Thaw, in Chicago, Cook said, had promised to appear if needed. Thaw's summons to the stand followed the opening statement of his attorney, John E. Stanchfield, who reviewed the history of the Thaw case in detail. He quoted former District Attorney Jerome as saying to the jury at Thaw's second trial for the murder of Stanford White that, "no one present during his first trial in 1897 when the jury disagreed."

Talked Gibberish in Cell. Deputy Attorney General Cook, on behalf of the state, declared he would prove that Thaw "is suffering from incurable insanity" and would show "by Thaw's mother that he was suffering from nervous prostration when he was brought to the trial in 1897."

"We will show you that in his childhood Thaw talked gibberish and that his teachers had to talk his language" he said.

Mr. Stanchfield began questioning Thaw in a low tone and did not speak quietly. He identified his mother, sister and brother, who were sitting in the court room, at the request of the attorney.

"When you left Mattawan did you believe you had recovered your sanity?" "I believed I was sane," said the witness.

"Physicians had told you so?" "They had," Thaw said.

Thaw had taken over the history of his escape to Canada and his subsequent movements. He was formed acquaintances at various of the places where you stopped, was very fortunate in forming acquaintances," he replied.

Mr. Stanchfield asked the witness to give names, dates and places in great detail and this Thaw did without hesitation.

Thaw was asked to tell of the examination into his sanity by Hancher, N. H. in connection with proceedings to extradite him to New York. He named the members of the commission and told how he came to be appointed.

Honored His Check. Physicians representing a Pittsburgh bank had also come to see him in Mattawan, said Thaw, and he had given them much of an examination.

"This Pittsburgh bank honored your checks, did they not?" "Yes," Thaw said.

When Mr. Stanchfield turned the witness over to the state's attorney, Mr. Cook, he said he would not cross examine at this time. Thaw then was accused.

John E. Blackmore, one of the jurors who acquitted Thaw of conspiracy to escape from Mattawan, was the next to speak. He said that during the trial he had seen Thaw in the courtroom during that trial seemed sane.

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ITALIANS OPENING TURKS DECIAMATED BY FIRE OF ALLIES

Summary of First Month's Operations Shows Success for the Invaders—Much Austrian Territory Held.

Roma, June 23.—(Via Chasso to Rome)—Of the chief general operations of the Italian campaign against Austria about as follows:— One month ago the Italians invaded Austrian territory and occupied the enemy positions along a front of 500 miles. An Austrian squadron bombarded the Italian coast on the Adriatic and Austrian aeroplanes dropped incendiary bombs on Venice.

"During this month the Italians overran the whole of Friuli. The capture of Tolmino and Gorizia, the two Austrian strongholds, is considered imminent, which would open the way to Trieste; while in the Alpine region in the province of Trent they have conquered peaks and passes, from which the picked Austro-Hungarian troops were recently driven into the mountains. Austrian activity had been chiefly displayed in bombarding the Italian coast with shells and torpedoes."

AUSTRIANS CHECKED, ITALIANS REPORT. (Via Paris, 23.)—The following statement was issued at the headquarters of the Italian general staff:—"Enemy activity yesterday was confined to long range artillery fire at several points on the front."

In the Monte Naro zone one of our Alpine battalions encountered yesterday for the first time important enemy forces, recently arrived, probably from Galicia. The Alpine troops attacked and repulsed them, inflicting heavy losses and taking some prisoners. "Night attacks by infantry were removed against our positions at the front with the most intense rifle fire and the use of hand grenades. All these attacks were repulsed."

"On the lower Ineco we further strengthened our occupation. Floods caused by the enemy in the zone adjacent to the Monfalcone canal, allowed us to dig out the canal, which constitute a formidable obstacle. An enemy aeroplane dropped several bombs without doing any damage."

POSITIONS TAKEN BY ITALIANS. (Via Paris, 23.)—(Via Paris)—A Tribune dispatch from Ljubacz says:—"The Italians have gained possession of all the positions defending Malborghetto after a fierce struggle against the Austrians, particularly Honved regiments, who displayed great tenacity. The Italians now are victorious in the struggle against the arrival of Austrian reinforcements from the Carniola and Caporetto, but they have not gone back across the sonce."

Thirty thousand Austrians who detached from the Ternofo forest are marching against positions north of Coriano. Southeast of Filitsch strong Austrian forces sought to drive back the Italians who, after a bitter struggle, repulsed them and retired to the frontier, where they concealed themselves in a forest and allowed the Austrians to pass. When the Austrians were installed in Italian positions the Italians captured a machine gun, machine gun fire, killing over 400 of their adversaries and forcing the rest out of their positions."

ITALY ALLEGED TO WANT PEACE. Berlin, June 23.—(By Wireless to Berlin)—The German government gives out the following:—"The Vienna correspondent of The Tagesspiegel Bundeshaus says he has received information from a reliable source, realizing already the impossibility of a military victory, that Italy has proposed to Austria that she should simply give up the region of Trent and South Tyrol in compensation for the cessation of all military activity in Italy. This proposition is made to Italy, which might make a new alliance after the war. The Italian government is fearful of a rupture."

ABOVE THE CLOUDS. Geneva, June 23.—(Via Paris)—A newspaper of the Canton of Geneva, Switzerland, give details about the operations of the Italian army respecting the fighting at Stelvio pass and the capture of the mountain. The Austrians have fortified Stelvio pass strongly with mountain artillery and block houses. The Italians are in progress daily above the clouds which cut off the valleys from view. In consequence both the Italian and Austrians have to depend upon field telephones for obtaining the range for their guns.

Italian bowmen lower down have the exact range of the top of the pass for firing. The Austrians are in principal danger in a hotel on the summit of which the Italian army is installed. Dragschlein Spitze with an altitude of 12,577 feet, which is an Austrian territory, is being bombarded from several points above. Stelvio pass is covered with two feet of snow, which might prevent the use of any spectacle, being illuminated by the flash of artillery fire, piercing the clouds."

AUSTRIANS DENY GAINS FOR ITALIANS. Vienna, June 23.—(Via London)—The Austrian war office tonight issued the following in regard to the Italian war:—"During the first month of the war the Italians have not had any great success. Our troops in the southwest maintained their positions as in the beginning, on or near the frontier."

The Ineco zone in the fortified frontier district from Filitsch to Malborghetto has been held by our troops all at the front of the Tyrol, all enemy attempts at an advance have collapsed with heavy losses on the part of the enemy."

REPORT IS SUBMITTED BY ATTORNEY GENERAL. Attorney General Warren Grice has submitted to Governor Blanton his report covering the period of his tenure of office, which is from April 18, 1914, to June 25, 1915.

The report shows that Attorney General Grice during the little more than one year he has been in office has not only accomplished a great bulk of work for the state, but has represented the state with success in a number of very important cases. The report omits a large number of oral opinions upon details which have come to Mr. Grice almost daily from the various state house departments.

GERMAN SPY MULLER SHOOTING IN THE TOWER

The Executed Man Once Lived in Boston, Where He Moved in Good Circles.

London, June 23.—F. Robert Muller, who in June of 1914 was shot in Old Bailey, police court, of being a German spy, was executed today by shooting.

Another alleged German spy, Robert Rosenthal, who is said by the police to have confessed that he was a spy by the German admiralty to obtain information on naval matters, will be court-martialed.

The official announcement concerning Muller and Rosenthal was given by a brief, stating merely that Muller was shot in the Tower of London and that the summary of the evidence in the case of the alleged spy Rosenthal was taken to the Wellington barracks. He will be tried by court-martial.

It is presumed that Muller faced a firing squad in the yard of the Tower of London. He was a native of London, and was a member of the London Lodge, executed last November after he had been convicted of espionage.

F. Robert Muller was arrested some time ago with Anton Kuepfer and a man named Hahn. All three were accused of sending military information to Germany. Muller and Hahn were convicted and sentenced to seven years penal servitude. Rosenthal was sentenced to life imprisonment while he was in progress.

Muller once lived in Boston, where he was in the company of a man who was in good social circles. He claimed to be a naturalized Britisher. His father was German and his mother a Scotch woman.

Not Boston Muller. Boston, June 23.—Friends of F. Robert Muller, formerly in the rubber business here, asserted tonight that he was not the man shot as a German spy in London today. A letter from the former Boston man was shown, saying that he was in the British army and the man mentioned in the letter the embargo on the name of Muller was the fact that he had been confused with a man named Muller recently convicted as a spy.

SHIPMENT OF MUNITIONS STOPPED TO RUSSIA. Seattle, Wash., June 23.—That large shipments of war material for Russia have been canceled by American manufacturers, who are said to be unable to obtain cash payment for their products, became known today when the Great Northern Pacific company announced that the liner Albatross probably will not include Vladivostok as a port of call on her next voyage.

The liner was scheduled to sail direct from Seattle to Vladivostok June 27 with practically a full cargo for the Russian government. Seventy-five per cent of these shipments have been canceled by manufacturers.
