





WILSON BELIEVES PEACE IS FAR OFF.

House Tells President Public Opinion in Warring Nations Will Act Strongly Against Any Compromise.

New York, June 24.—President Wilson does not see any prospect for an early peace in Europe. Colonel E. M. House, his unofficial envoy to Europe, gave the president today the results of his sojourn of several months in European capitals, where he talked intimately with the responsible officials of the German, British and French governments, and the information he imparted in the long walks and talks which they enjoyed today reflected definitely the ideas held by both diplomats and the military element in each of the countries at war.

Wilson Guided by House. The president has been guided largely by what Colonel House has reported to him by cable and letters in handling the delicate question of renewing the efforts of the United States to bring about a general acceptance of mediation. Mr. Wilson himself said last Tuesday that no new tenders of good offices had been made to any of the warring powers, but that all foreign governments had been invited to accept the way for an approach to peace.

The efforts of the United States to make peace in the unpropitious manner of public opinion in some of the belligerent countries is a factor which they fear their averting might advance or that already are discussed. Colonel House observed that public opinion in some countries insisted on terms which the governments of those countries already had learned in various ways would not be acceptable to their opponents.

Freedom of the Seas. In Germany it seemed, according to information given to the president, that the object of a large and influential party was to prepare public opinion for a realization of the idea that Germany's best interests lie in colonial expansion and the incidental development of overseas commerce, rather than in territorial extension in Europe proper. The question, however, which Colonel House thinks likely will play a most important part in any peace negotiations is "freedom of the seas," the principle that the property of all private citizens except contraband shall be exempt from capture or seizure on the high seas in time of war.

Neither the president nor Colonel House would make a formal statement tonight on their conference.

COUNCIL OF ADVISERS CREATED BY DANIELS

Secretary of Navy to Discontinue Meyer's System of Aids.

Washington, June 24.—Creation of "the secret navy" council in the navy department, to include the assistant secretary, the chief of operations, the bureau chief and other naval officers was announced tonight by Secretary Daniels. At the same time the secretary made known his intention to discontinue the system of aids originated by his immediate predecessor, Secretary Meyer, a step forecast by the establishment of the new office of chief of operations.

Captain Josiah S. McKean, now commanding the battleship North Dakota, has been designated assistant for material to the chief of operations. Captain McKean previously had been named as assistant for operations. Under the present organization at the department, the advisory council will be composed of Assistant Secretary Roosevelt, Rear Admiral Benson, chief of operations; the following bureau chiefs: Rear Admiral Blair, navigation; Rear Admiral Strauss, ordnance; Rear Admiral Griffin, steam engineering; Rear Admiral Taylor, construction and dock; Rear Admiral Woodman, general staff; Rear Admiral Stantford, yards and docks; Rear Admiral Clegg, materiel; Rear Admiral Strickland, medicine and surgery; Rear Admiral Parsons, commissary; and Rear Admiral McLean, medical director of the marine corps and Capt. J. J. Knap, lately assigned to the command of the battleship Oregon, chief of the navy.

French War Ministry Attacked by Deputy. Accumbay Raises Storm by Declaring Administration Has Proved Inefficient.

Paris, June 24.—Animated scenes occurred in the chamber of deputies today when M. Accumbay, in discussing the war appropriation, criticized the ministry of war. He declared defects had been proved in shell-making, jealously and protests from various parts of the chamber, but the speaker and the president reminded the speaker he must confine his remarks to the question under discussion.

Bryan Makes Address on Peace in New York. New York, June 24.—William Jennings Bryan, who spoke at Madison Square Garden tonight under the auspices of the Peace Society, an organization of various societies of the American continent, called upon his national honor, and called upon his favor of either side, but in favor of peace for the United States and against war with any of the belligerent nations.

Paris, June 24.—An official note made public here today giving details of land operations on the north side of the Mediterranean between June 21 and 23 as a result of French and British attacks. The British troops took more than 100 prisoners and captured a trench and a machine gun. The French captured approximately 500 yards in depth.

The French captured simultaneously bright sun. The principal attack was upon the Turkish position opposite the British trenches. Believed He Would Regain Sight, But Claims Georgia Railway and Power Company Delayed His Arrival.

All the blind and others afflicted with diverse diseases encountered insurmountable difficulties when about to step into the troubled waters of the medicinal pool at Juruston, so did James Reid, aged citizen of Clarkston, Ga., fall of regalized sight when the Georgia Railway and Power company, through alleged negligence, did not carry him to the stopping place of the "Divine Healer," recently visiting Atlanta.

When he arrived at her doorstep and there talked with this widely known woman of wonderful powers, he came too late to become a beneficiary of her healing, and in a suit filed yesterday in the Fulton county courts, asks \$1,000 of the street car company for his continued condition of blindness.

Sympathizing neighbors took the aged man of the "Divine Healer" of Bellwood avenue, and on April 5, with car fare furnished by friends, only sufficient to carry him and his small grandson to the healer's home, he set out to regain his sight.

When he attempted to board the Marietta car at Decatur and Pryor streets, he alleged, the conductor refused to take him on and the next conductor demanded car fare on the ground that the time limit of the transfers had elapsed. After paying the additional fares for himself and little guide to ride to Bellwood avenue, the conductor, the petition continues, caused the old man great inconvenience by carrying him to the end of the line and thus compelling him to wait for more than a mile to the "Divine Healer's" house.

There she had him, he declares, that the hours within which her mysterious powers were in power were past, and advised him to return to his home in Clarkston, since she would leave for Marietta in the early morning train. The old blind man also sets forth that when he and his grandson reached Decatur again, their car fare was gone and it was 10 o'clock at night. He was brought him to Clarkston at 2 o'clock in the morning, since the way rough and unfamiliar in the darkness with his guide, a boy 10 years old.

RANDOLPH FARMERS MUCH DAMAGED BY CONTINUED DROUGHT

Outbert, Ga., June 24.—(Special.)—The continued drought in the immediate vicinity of Outbert has played havoc with the crops on the farms and the gardens in town. There has not been a rain, such as is called a "seasoner," which means sufficient for the time being, since April 30.

Nearly all the gardens have been utterly burned up. The bean crop in the gardens is almost a total failure. On the farm the cotton is growing fine, the continued sunshine assisting in a needed degree in the eradication of the grass from it. The weather has been steady for that crop. The corn fields look very bad, though, and if rain does not come in a day or two the amount which has been planted to date will be a total loss instead of the large crop as expected. There has been a heavy amount of corn planted than usual, and already about half of the expected amount to be reaped is in the field, some of which is a large amount, and although they should have done so several days ago, it is feared that all that have been planted have been lost.

The early peanuts have come in, but the later ones have not. The early watermelons are coming in, all small, and if rain does not come the crop will be small. A quantity of wheat has been threshed and sent to mills in nearby towns for grinding into flour. One man, G. H. Bridges, who lives nearby, is planning to have not only a Georgia product dinner in the near future, but is intending for the entire menu to come from his own farm here, on which he is living.

Evansville, Ind., June 24.—Delegates from eighteen counties in Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky and Tennessee, tried in vain at the Dixie Bee-Line association's convention today to locate a state route completing the highway from Chicago to Savannah.

After hours of debate, the 1,200 delegates voted to leave the question of a board of vice presidents, on from each of the counties represented. The board must perform its task by November 1, 1915. A resolution was adopted calling for completion of the route by January 1, 1917. The association elected Mayor Benjamin Boss, of Evansville, president for the first year, with power to choose a vice president and secretary for the year. The board of vice presidents will act as a governing body.

Tifton, Ga., June 24.—(Special.)—Ford Hill, colored, was shot and instantly killed at a late hour last night while resisting arrest by Bailiff E. M. Ford of the Tift county jail. The killing was at T. T. nine miles west of Tifton on the Atlantic Coast Line. Hill had a row at a negro church with another negro named Charles Thomas, and shot Thomas over the ear with a revolver, but did not kill him. Hill was drunk and a warrant charging him with assault and attempt to murder was placed in Officer Ford's hands. When the officer and his brother, Charles Ford, who had been deputized to arrest him, approached Hill he began with his revolver. It was then that Hill was shot, one ball entering his forehead and the other his neck. It is believed to have been a plain case of self-defense.

Georgians Urged to Take Advantage of Opportunity Smith-Lever Bill Offers

Dr. A. M. Soule, head of the State Agricultural college at Athens, will call to the attention of the present session of the general assembly the importance of Georgia's qualifying by legal enactment and state appropriations, for accepting federal appropriations which will be available under the Smith-Lever bill adopted by the last congress for the furtherance of agricultural education.

This was announced at a luncheon of the directors of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce Thursday, when it was also brought out that, in addition to an annual federal appropriation of \$100,000 to each state, the federal government will make appropriations for agricultural experimentation and state appropriations for duplicate experiments.

The Smith-Lever bill provides for an annually increasing appropriation during a period of six years, beginning with next year, the appropriation to be based upon rural population. \$7,000,000 Next Year.

Should Georgia qualify at this legislative session and would, in addition to the \$100,000 federal appropriation, while seven years from now the would receive approximately \$1,000,000 from the federal government.

All the members of the directors of the Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, Senator Hoke Smith addressed the directors upon the Smith-Lever bill, and urged that they lend their influence for the passage by the general assembly of Georgia necessary measures for Georgia to take advantage of the federal assistance offered.

An chairman of the chamber of commerce committee having ANN T. BE under consideration, Robert F. Maddox expressed his appreciation of the worth of the provision and pledged himself to do all possible to get proper legislation in Georgia.

Senator Smith outlined the progress of federal co-operation in agricultural education, showing that fifty years ago each state received funds for agricultural colleges, and that twenty-five years ago agricultural experiment stations were established in the states with federal aid.

Will Furnish Machinery. "These," said Senator Smith, "have become largely a sort of cold storage plants of information, and the great difficulty in deriving the benefits from these institutions is the lack of efficient machinery to convey the information to the farmers so that it may be put into practical use."

"It is the object of the what you call the Smith-Lever bill to furnish this machinery."

He explained how it is the plan under this bill to furnish certain farm demonstrators who shall go to the farms of farmers who cannot attend the agricultural colleges and work out upon their own farms for them the problems with which they are confronted. It is also planned to send trained women into the homes of farmers and show them how to better their home life. It is, in fact, a tremendous enlargement and co-ordination of the work being done by the extension agents, corn clubs and by similar agencies.
