PERSONS' VOTE DEFEATS RECOMMITTING OF BILL

Akin and Mangham Issue Statement as to Their Position on Taxing Invisibile Property.

The vote of President Persons, who has a ballot only when it will make or break a tie, prevented the senate yesterday morning from recommitting the report of the finance committee, recommending for passage Senator Persons' bill providing a method for taxing invisible property in the state.

Akin's Position. Asking for the privilege of explaining his view on the Persons amendment, Senator Akin, while admitting that he had not been misquoted in the report of his speech in the House, stated, he feared that the phrasing of the article might lead some to believe that he opposed taxation of invisible property.

Senator Mangham felt the same way. As a matter of fact, it is well known among legislators and others who have followed the legislative careers of Senators Akin and Mangham that neither has ever opposed taxation of invisible property, although they both have denounced the method of such taxation proposed by Senator Persons.

Senators Akin and Mangham desire to go on record as favoring the bill to amend the present tax law so as to reach invisible property in the state. They do oppose the Persons bill, however, on the ground that it would drive home capital out of the state and prevent foreign capital from coming into the state, and that it would increase the burdens of the borrower, the small farmer and the business men.

Senators Akin, Mangham and Way issued a minority report yesterday against the passage of the Persons bill. Senator Royall, of the opposition, made an unsuccessful attempt to again introduce a bill to amend the present tax law. A bill to the same effect as Senator Persons' bill was also killed in the committee.

REPORTS ON PRISON FARM WILL BE LESS DRASTIC

Committee Spends Day Probing Conditions and Noting Needed Improvements.

Shilohville, Ga., July 13.—(Special.) Thirty-five legislators, composing the penitentiary committees from the house and senate, today put in a solid day examining the physical conditions existing at the prison farm. The report of this committee will not be as drastic as former reports.

The crisis in the typhoid epidemic has passed, all patients being regarded as convalescent. This alone is sufficient to temper the report, but aside from that this committee is more inclined to give credit to the prison commission and authorities for the improvements and precautions inaugurated prior to this investigation. Many of the committee members say that they do not see how much more could have been done by the authorities with their limited funds. The report will recommend the following as the chief needs of the prison: A brick concrete structure for the male negro prisoners; enlarging the buildings at the reformatory to relieve the crowded condition there; building a sewerage system; installing electric lights in and around the buildings; thinking deep walking paths, where possible, for water supply; publicly building a small annex at the female building for the accommodation of the few women prisoners.

BLACK BEARD ISLAND FOR GAME PRESERVE

Senator Way Would Have the Government Give Property to the State.

Georgia will soon possess Black Beard island, off the Atlantic coast of the state, for the protection and propagation of game birds and animals, if Senator J. B. Way, of the second, chairman of the senate committee on game and fish, his way, he has introduced in the upper house a resolution asking the United States government for the use of this abandoned light-house station, so that Georgia may have a game preserve. The island is a migratory wild fowl and as a sanctuary and breeding station for other birds and game animals.

"Black Beard island" is a small island off the coast of Georgia, some 100 miles from the mainland. It was named after a pirate who was wrecked there, able to save only himself. When the legislative wheels in the senate turned on this bill from over-work, one can see a group of senators gathering around Senator Way, who then knows is telling some story about a hunting trip on Black Beard island. Senator Way has a steel-blue eye, so clear that no matter how long he makes his run of fast deer, you dare not question his veracity.

"It is no very large island," is the way the senator describes it. "It is 15 or 20 miles in length and 10 or 15 miles wide, and I've seen 'em kill thirty or forty deer there in one day's hunt. It is the greatest place I know of for migratory ducks, turkeys and forest birds. It is off the coast between Savannah and Brunswick. Between Black Beard island, of McIntosh county, and St. Catherine island, of Liberty county, there is a deep channel, and Georgia could rent the oyster and fishery of Black Beard island for more than enough money to pay for the purchase of the island, which is covered with pine and oak timber."

FREE AMEND TAX LAW

One Bill Is Similar to Persons Measure to Discover and Tax "Invisible Property."

The ways and means committee of the house, Mr. Jones, of Coweta, chairman, considered Tuesday afternoon three bills designed to amend the equalization tax law. The most important of these amendments was similar in intent to the Persons bill from the senate, which provides for the discovery and equal taxation of invisible property. This house bill was referred to a subcommittee, consisting of Messrs. Cooper, Green and McLeod, and the joint resolution upon the Persons bill is proposed to arrive at a substitute.

The method of proving that the tax has been paid upon such property as provided by the house bill is for the owner to present to the tax collector a list of such property, which list shall be marked paid by the tax collector. The bill of Mr. Blackburn, of Fulton, amending the act so that county treasurers shall be authorized to appoint a third arbitrator in cases in conflict before local boards, was recommended to pass.

SUFFRAGE LOSES IN FIRST ROUND; BILL IS TABLED

Senator H. A. These bathing will also have the advantage of being taught swimming and physical education by competent instructors.

BILL WOULD PROMPTLY PAY TEACHERS

Committee Reports Favorably on Bill to Increase the Tax Rate Quarter of Mill.

The house committee on ways and means Tuesday afternoon recommended for passage the bill of Messrs. Jensen and Coweta, of the first, and Swift of the senate, authorizing the governor and comptroller general to assess a tax of 1-4 of one mill in addition to the assessment for the necessary current annual expenses of the state, the extra assessment to be for the purpose of meeting the deficit in the state treasury. The report of the committee that the bill in case will be made to the house today.

The object of this bill is expressly that of paying the back salaries due prompt, and the act of the governor and placing the state upon a basis where it can, in future, meet these payments. The state is now one year behind in its payment of the teachers. The constitution limits the tax levy to five mills, or such part thereof as the governor and comptroller general may find necessary for the current expenses of the state. For many years, until 1914, the entire levy of 5 mills was devoted to school purposes.
