These tremendous German activities in the east suggest that the Western allies have little reserve to devote to their western campaign, offering the entente a respite, either for the completion of munitions supplies or a concerted attempt to recapture the initiative.

Another view holds that the best service the allies could give Russia at this time would be the forcing of the Dardanelles. It is possible the allies may combine both suggestions.

STRIKE TO CLOSE REMINGTON PLANT

Labor Leaders Issue Order Against Great War Munitions Factory—'Foreign Influences' Blamed by Gompers.

Bridgport, Conn., July 19.—Negotiations to settle differences between Remington machinists and the Remington Arms and Ammunition Company, engaged on a gigantic scale in the manufacture of war munitions for the allied armies, have failed.

It was said that it was planned to have the neighborhood of 500 men walk out at first. Then one after another of the various shops would be emptied of machinists.
