PROBE IS STARTED AT SOLDIERS' HOME

Committee From House and Board of Trustees Will Hold Another Meeting on Wednesday Afternoon.

The investigation of recent charges by veterans of the Soldiers' Home was started at the Soldiers' Home Wednesday afternoon, by a special committee of the house of representatives, which was appointed Wednesday morning by Speaker Burwell, following the unanimous adoption of a resolution presented by Representative Fred C. Foster, of Madison, Ga., who is a member of the board of trustees of the home. Only a preliminary hearing was held, and the formal charges made several days ago against officials of the institution by thirty old vets, in the nature of a statement, were not in hand. The investigation was adjourned until next week, in order that some of the old vets who have complaints to make against employes at the home, might be asked to get a copy of the formal charges against the officials.

An informal meeting of the board of trustees of the Soldiers' Home was held in Atlanta, Tuesday night, and Judge Fred C. Foster was instructed to introduce a resolution in the house asking for an investigation. Judge Foster's resolution, which read as follows, was unanimously adopted by the house.

"Whereas certain grave charges have been made in writing to the members of the general assembly concerning the management of the Soldiers' Home and reflecting upon the honor and credit of the United States; and whereas said trust and desire the fullest and broadest investigation of charges and best management of said home; and whereas said trustees at an informal meeting of their body on the 19th day of July, 1910, determined to send a committee of five old soldiers to the Soldiers' Home on July 21 at 1 o'clock to investigate said charges and express their views thereon to the board of trustees; and whereas said committee of five old soldiers, in their report to the board of trustees, stated that they had filed charges in the house of representatives and request an investigation; therefore be it resolved that the speaker appoint such committee to meet with said trustees at said Soldiers' Home on July 21 at 1 o'clock, and that said committee be empowered to take evidence and compel the attendance of witnesses and production of books and papers and to do any and all other acts necessary for the full investigation of said charges and ascertainment of the truth and to report the result of such investigation as early as possible during the present session.

Committee Named. Speaker Burwell appointed on the committee a representative from each congressional district, as follows: First district, Reaser; second district, Hoggins; third district, Lunsford; fourth district, Hudson; fifth district, Green of Clayton; sixth district, Ayer; seventh district, Anderson of Fayette; eighth district, Arnold of Oglethorpe; ninth district, Marshall of Hall; tenth district, Beall of Richmond; eleventh district, Strickland; twelfth district, Hatcher.

Representative Ayer, of Bibb county, was made chairman of the committee. At the joint meeting of the board of trustees of the Soldiers' Home and investigating committee, which was held at the Soldiers' Home Wednesday, a motion by Representative Green to hold the investigation in executive session in order to bring out full complaints of the old soldiers, was carried. Mr. Hoggins speaking against said committee, and Mr. Marshall, of the old vets who were brave enough to face the board of trustees and stand face to face with the officials of the institution and the trustees, and in open defiance of the law, and in violation of a half-dozen veternan laws arose to object and sought to have the committee held in contempt of the house whom they had filed charges in the house of representatives. Several old veterans charged, though, that the board of trustees did not want to have an investigation. Others charged that the food and sleeping quarters were all right, but that they were not treated right otherwise. Others charged that the Soldiers' Home had been given a good cleaning the day before the investigation committee came to it to make the probe. The investigation will be resumed on next Wednesday, when the formal charges will be gone into and the old veterans will have their attorneys on hand.

GUARDS ARE INCREASED FOR U. S. BATTLESHIPS

Recent Fires on Warships Apparently Cause Extra Precautions to be Taken.

Philadelphia, July 21.—Although officials at the Philadelphia navy yard denied that recent fire aboard battleships had caused them to take extraordinary precautions, guards about the yard were increased today to more than five times the usual number. The entry carried a rifle loaded with ball cartridges. Some said they had instructions to shoot if necessary. Strategists passing through the entrance gates were closely scrutinized, while near all the vessels of the reserve fleet were signs saying visitors were not permitted. On some battleships, however, it was said visitors were allowed Saturday and Sunday. In addition to the close guard placed around the buildings and warships, extra men have been detailed to guard the advance base.
