

\$3,258,500 Bond Issue For Civic Improvements Approved by Councilmen

Resolution Is Passed Directing City Attorney J. L. Mayson to Draw Up Ordinance Calling for Election.

NEED OF CITY SCHOOLS STRESSED BY THOMSON; \$1,000,000 FOR SEWERS

Council Approves \$1,000,000 for Schools, \$375,000 for Grady, \$133,500 for Fire Department and \$750,000 for Waterworks.

General council, Thursday, at a special session, adopted a resolution directing the city attorney to prepare an ordinance calling for a bond issue aggregating \$3,258,500. A sufficient number of votes has already been pulled in the passage of the resolution to insure the passage of the ordinance.

The date for the election and the itemized statement of municipal improvements the issue contemplates will be incorporated in the bond election ordinance, which is expected to come before general council at its next meeting for final action.

Bonds approved by general council Thursday are as follows:
For public schools, \$1,000,000.
For sewers and extensions of disposal plants, \$1,000,000.
For Grady hospital, \$133,500.
For fire department, \$375,000.
For waterworks department, \$750,000.

REPORT AMENDED.

These items were in the report of the special bond committee of council. Council passed an amendment striking from the bond report an item of \$100,000 for the cyclorama building at Grant park, which had not been authorized by general council.

WARDLAW ACCEPTS PLACE.

The election of Professor Wardlaw as president of the Georgia Educational association, which was held at Atlanta last night, was a notable event. Professor Wardlaw, who has been president of the association for the past three years, was re-elected by a large majority.

FOR SCHOOLS.

Alfred W. Thomson, chairman of the bond committee, stated that the amount needed for the schools is \$1,000,000. He said that the amount needed for the Grady hospital is \$133,500, for the fire department is \$375,000, and for the waterworks is \$750,000.

WATER DEPARTMENT IMPROVEMENTS.

It was proposed that the waterworks bonds shall be used in the following manner:
For new 30,000-gallon pump with boilers and equipment at Station No. 1, \$125,000.
For new 20,000-gallon pump with boilers and equipment at Station No. 2, \$100,000.
Additional coagulating basins and land for same, \$125,000.
New supply main for Chattahoochee river to reservoir, \$100,000.
Duplicate intake for river to pump well No. 1, \$40,000.
Complete new connections of 48-inch line from coagulating basins to filter, \$100,000.
Refrigerating feed line from old reservoir to coagulating basin, \$15,000.
Construction of dams in river and removal of shoals, \$100,000.

BIG CONGRESSIONAL PROPOSALS FOR THE HOUSE TODAY

Would Handle Exports to Europe Under Agreement With the British Government.

Washington, July 22.—Formation of a great American cotton pool to handle exports to Europe under an agreement with the British government, and other proposals informally to the state department as a means of quality distributing among producers such cotton trade as Great Britain and her allies permit America to carry with neutral countries without interference on the high seas.

Any arrangements of this kind would be made directly between the British government and cotton interests without participation or approval of the state department. Officials point out that to accede to any restrictions on trade between neutral countries and cotton interests would mean abandonment of the principle of freedom of international trade. It is noted that Great Britain and her allies have shown greater insistence in any communication now in negotiation.

It has been suggested that pending differences between the two countries, American officials might aid the cotton shippers and cotton interests by any effort they might make to facilitate their trade. It was announced yesterday that Great Britain and her allies would enter into an agreement not to interfere with the export of cotton to neutral countries, provided no more were shipped to such countries than the normal amount.

The British embassy has been active in this matter. It is believed that the cotton trade and embassy officials express confidence that some practical scheme will be worked out.

REVENUE INCREASE IN TAX RATE Believes It Will Have to Be Put Back to Five Mills Unless War in Europe Ends This Year.

The general appropriations bill, carrying some \$3,300,000 in general public population, which was completed and recommended yesterday afternoon by the appropriations committee, Mr. Fullbright stated that it is his opinion that unless the European war ends this year, the tax rate which was last year estimated for 1915 at 4 1/2 mills, raised again this year to the constitutional limit of 5 mills to meet the expenses of the state. The business of the state, he believes, has been so affected by the war that a falling off in the state's revenue, which will make such a move necessary, he believes.

REVENUE FOR 1915.

According to the comptroller general's report the estimated revenue of the state for the year of 1915 is \$5,212,718. There is yet much of this revenue which is not forthcoming on account of the conditions to which Mr. Fullbright alluded in his report.

REACH PERSONS' BILL TO REACH SO-CALLED "INVISIBLE" PROPERTY TURNED DOWN BY SENATE COMMITTEE.

Senator Persons' amendment to the tax equalization law was killed in the senate finance committee yesterday afternoon by a vote of 8 to 4. This bill would provide for the taxation of so-called "invisible" property in the state. After a stormy session of the finance committee on July 18, the bill was recommended for passage. When the measure was reported back to the senate, Senator Mangham moved to have the bill sent back to the committee. This motion was defeated by the single vote of President Persons, who later, however, asked unanimous consent that the bill be passed.

Drainage Association Is Being Organized For Clarke and Oconee. Athens, Ga., July 22.—(Special.)—County Farm Demonstrator Woodruff, whose territory is Clarke and Oconee counties, is organizing a drainage association under the law of 1911, which provides for such schemes that is proposed to raise \$20,000 in bonds to reclaim several thousand acres on three creeks of the county.

It is conservatively estimated that 150,000 bushels of corn will be made the first year on this land. It is believed that the cost of the drainage will be cleared by the increased value of the land and the maintenance of the creek bottom area.

Similar bonded drainage schemes have been carried through in Jackson, Madison and Walton counties. The Haynes creek area in Walton paying the expense of the first drainage issue of \$50,000 was validated for a drainage plan for the same county.

Rev. J. P. Chatfield Made Presiding Elder. Dawson, Ga., July 22.—(Special.)—Bishop John Kilgore announced the appointment of Rev. J. P. Chatfield as presiding elder of the Columbia district to succeed Dr. A. M. Williams, deceased.

Mr. Chatfield is just closing a two-year pastorate at Sumalla, and has been secretary of education for the South Georgia conference for two years.
