

ARRESTED BY POLICE BOARD MAYO APPOINTED ACTING CHIEF

Commission Will Probe Charges Against Beavers At Meeting on Thursday

Chief Is Accused of Insubordination, of Disregarding Rules of Board, of Inefficiency, and of Failure to Preserve Discipline in His Department, These Complaints Resulting From Recent Probe by Committee—Efforts of His Friends to Obtain Delay in Trial Prove Unavailing.

"BEAVERS HAS ACTED LIKE BULL
IN CHINA SHOP," SAYS ENGLISH

"You Are as Much an Old Bully as I Am," Cried the Chief—Near Physical Encounter Between Two Men Prevented by Police, Commissioners Calling Upon Acting Chief Mayo to Take Beavers Out of the Room—Mayo to Be Permanent Chief, Says Commissioner Clark.

Charged with insubordination, inefficiency, failure to preserve discipline in his department and disregard of the rules of the police board, Chief of Police James L. Beavers was suspended last night by the police board by a vote of 8 to 4 and will be formally tried on the charges next Thursday night. Captain W. M. Mayo was appointed acting chief by Chairman W. P. Pain.

With his title and power removed, Beavers took the floor over the protest of Chairman Pain, who repeatedly ordered him to "Sit down, you are out of order," and hurled some stinging remarks at Chairman Pain, Captain English and Councilman Edwin Johnson, who introduced the resolution containing the charges.

ENGLISH AND BEAVERS CLASH AND THE POLICE ARE CALLED.

There were cries among the commissioners of "Let's adjourn," but still the chief talked on, charging among other things that while making a visit of inspection at the Atlanta club ten days ago he found Chairman Pain there purchasing a dollar's worth of whisky.

Finally Captain English sought to quiet the suspended chief by saying, "Chief, you have always acted like a bull in a china shop whenever you got a chance, and your actions here tonight are enough to back up the charges of insubordination that have been made against you."

"You are as much of an old bully as I am," cried the chief above the din. "You tried to frighten me when I sought to close the district; what did you do when I got after the clubs?"

Several commissioners called to Acting Chief Mayo to "take him out" and Chief Mayo and several other officers circled about the chief as Captain English left his chair and took a step toward him. Beavers took his seat.

MEETING IS PUBLIC.

When Chairman Pain called the meeting to order all members were present. He explained that he had made a mistake in calling it an executive session and on vote of the board the meeting was open to the public. Councilman Edwin Johnson, chairman.

Charges Against Beavers

The formal charges preferred against Chief Beavers follow:

1. The said James L. Beavers, as chief of police of Atlanta, is grossly inefficient and incompetent.
2. The said James L. Beavers, as chief of police, after a long term of office, has wholly failed to suppress a vast number of felonies and misdemeanors committed within the city of Atlanta, and to apprehend and arrest the perpetrators thereof. The number of felonies committed and the percentage of those which have entirely escaped arrest being abnormal, without excuse, and to the grave injury of the public safety.
3. The said James L. Beavers, as chief of police, has not been able to obtain the respect and confidence of his subordinate officers and members of the force, thereby rendering the force ineffective.
4. Because of the absence of respect, harmony and co-operation between said James L. Beavers, chief of police, and his officers and the force has resulted in rendering the police department inefficient, and to the detriment of the public good, peace and morals.
5. The said James L. Beavers, chief of police, has been guilty of insubordination, in that he has failed to obey the instructions of the board of police or to comply with its rules.
6. The said James L. Beavers, as chief of police, has been constantly conferring with and taking advice given by private citizens with reference to the management of the police department, in disregard of the police board and its rules.
7. Because said chief of police has not devoted his official time to the discharge of his official duties, and has spent much of said time in conference with parties unofficially related to the police department, and in attending to matters connected with his personal and political pretenses, to the grave detriment of the public peace and safety.

AMERICAN ACTION CITED BY BRITAIN FOR THE BLOCKADE

Course of United States During Civil War Used as Precedent for the Order in Council.

DECISIONS ARE QUOTED BY U. S. SUPREME COURT

Washington, July 26.—Great Britain's reply to the American note of the 24th protesting against enforcement of the order-in-council which restricts neutral commerce, was received here today. It holds that the order is within international law, although they may involve a new application of principles, and argues that

IT IS PROPER TO WAIT A JUDICIAL INTERPRETATION.

Justification is claimed. The new note, in courteous language, holds that Great Britain's action is justified by decisions of the United States Supreme court in cases arising during the civil war. Any differences with the United States over what is termed the new application of principles are held to be proper for submission to judicial settlement.

Secretary Lansing announced receipt of the note. It will be forwarded to President Wilson at Cornhill, N. H., and will be given over here for publication in the morning papers Wednesday. The keynote of the British note is a declaration that the British government has steadfastly held to the broad principles of international law in all that has been done by the order-in-council; and that if a neutral government feels aggrieved there is a remedy by the courts or, eventually, in arbitration.

Generally, it is held that when a neutral country or port is made a base of operations against a belligerent, the other belligerent is justified in blockading such country or port.

Precedent by the United States. The precedent of the United States in the civil war in blockading the British island of Bermuda is cited as a warrant for the action of the British government in preventing goods from reaching Germany from the United Kingdom, Denmark, Holland or Sweden.

The original blockade on the west side of Bermuda was a case of sufficient, the American warships were stationed on the east side, and throughout the remainder of the war no goods were permitted to reach Bermuda that might be transhipped to the Confederate States. That action was sustained by the United States supreme court.

The new note makes the point that the only way to ascertain the real destination of supplies from America, consigned to neutral countries of northern Europe is to consider their normal trade, for it is contended that they are not in fact of Germany that they fail to prevent the reshipment of such goods into Germany.

On July 17 the United States gave notice that it did not accept the order-in-council as far as it affected international law, so far as it affected American commerce.

MASSACRE IN POLAND CONTINUES ATTACKS AGAINST WARSAW

Polish Capital Still Holds Out, But London Believes Its Capture Is Only Matter of Time.

CLIMAX TO STRUGGLE EXPECTED IN FORTNIGHT

Germans Are Centering Main Offensive North of Warsaw and Are Driving Russians Towards Junction of Bug and Narew Rivers.

London, July 26.—Field Marshal von Mackensen's effort to throw a heavy body of Austro-German troops across the Lublin-Chelm railway having failed so far, the Germans now are centering their main offensive north of the Warsaw salient and having crossed the Narew river along a 40-mile front, are driving the Russians toward where the Bug joins the Narew north of the Polish capital.

Warship still holds out, but the general belief here is that its capture only is a matter of time. Tonight's Petrograd dispatches predict that a climax to the great struggle in Poland will come within a fortnight, with simultaneous attacks on the city from the north and south.

Meanwhile General von Buslow, driving south from Courland, is thirty-five miles southeast of Shavli, having reached the Ponevich railway junction, linked with the Vilna-Dvinsk line, which the German cavalry is attempting to seize preparatory to cutting the more important Kovno-Vilna line. Petrograd estimates the effective German cavalry in this area at 8,000.

GERMANS CLAIM GAINS IN WEST. Berlin, July 26.—(Via London.)—The German official statement issued today says: "An official telegram from main headquarters dated July 26 says that in the western theater of the war no important events have transpired anywhere on the front."

"In the eastern war theater: North of the River Bug the army under General von Buslow has reached the District of Posen-Politz. Wherever the enemy has offered resistance he has been beaten. We captured over 1,000 prisoners.

"On the Narew front our troops forced a crossing of the river. Furrows above and below our troops are slowly pushing the enemy back in the direction of the River Bug. The Russians are offering obstinate resistance to these advances. Here we captured about 1,000 Russians and more than forty machine guns.

"On the northwest front our troops are advancing toward the group of fortifications around Novogorodsk and Warsaw.

"In the southeastern theater of the war, north of Wloclawka and south of Chelm, on the River Bug, German troops in the recent fighting pushed the enemy still further back. Yesterday we captured here about 1,000 prisoners, 1,457 men and seven machine guns.

The commission is to appoint some well qualified persons versed in the law relating to railroads and their traffic who shall be designated director for the commission and he shall perform such duties as may be required of him by the commission. An appropriation of \$5,000 is made for the expenses of the commission.

All the bills for a commission to re-lease the Western and Atlantic railroad give the commission the power to lease the property on the best and most advantageous terms.

The subcommittee will report at a special meeting of the whole committee Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The same committee made a favorable report on two bills by Senator Perrona, the bills having been passed by the senate. Both bills prohibit the building of any railroad that may parallel the Western and Atlantic railroad, one being a statutory act and the other a constitutional amendment.

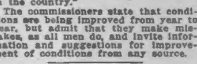
