COMMITTEE OF TEN NAMED AT SPECIAL SESSION TUESDAY TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE ODORS ARISE FROM PLANT.

A special committee of ten was named by the general council yesterday afternoon to make an investigation of the crematory, the main object of which will be to ascertain if any disagreeable odors arise from the burning of garbage.

During the meeting Attorney George Woodard, who represents the New York Destructor company, gave a detailed account of the operations of the crematory and of the fight he claimed had been made against the company by Mayor Woodard and Councilman Claude L. Ashley.

"We have been unjustly attacked," he said, "and we have about reached a point where we are ready to close the case by a compromise, if that may desire it done. We know our cause is just and we know we will get every dollar that is due us."

The meeting was called by Mayor Woodard, who read a number of communications from citizens who had signed a petition for the closing of the crematory, the mayor said he had sent some of the letters to Judge Newman, who is presiding in the case, because the crematory was now in the hands of Judge Newman, he also had recalled that he thought the city attorney might advise the city of it.

The chief complaints came from citizens of the city who stated that the odors from the crematory were at times almost unbearable. Councilman Ashley introduced a resolution from the sanitary committee which visited the crematory July 26 and reported that the plant was not able to burn all the garbage and that the odors from the plant were detected three or four blocks away.

Respectfully called a resolution calling upon the sanitary department to have the plant inspected and report to council next Monday afternoon.

Mayor Woodard made a brief statement and said he would address the city council on Monday afternoon. He said he had done his duty and it was now up to the members of the council to decide what to do.

BECKER MAY BE HEARD IN HIS NEW TRIAL PLEA

Justice Ford May Elect to Hear Condemned Man's Story From Own Lips.

New York, July 27.—Whether Charles Becker, tormented convict of inflicting the murder of Herman Rosenthal, will die in the electric chair or be hanged, will be decided by an additional special appearance tonight to rest with Supreme Justice on a motion for a new trial, studied by Justice Ford, who will hear Becker's plea for a new trial, as promised his decision as early as possible and it is expected late tomorrow afternoon.

W. Burke Cochrane, chief counsel for Becker, also filed a supplemental brief covering points raised by District Attorney C. A. Perkins. Since he believed Cochrane would indicate his desire to hear them, Becker's brief was brought from Ochsinger's office to the law office of Becker's counsel.

In the case the defendant remained silent during his trial, notwithstanding the fact that he had been given a chance to make a statement, but that he refused to do so, a question of loyalty to a prominent lawyer, and that Becker's conduct in this respect was extraordinary that it was not established by proof and conceded by the defendant.

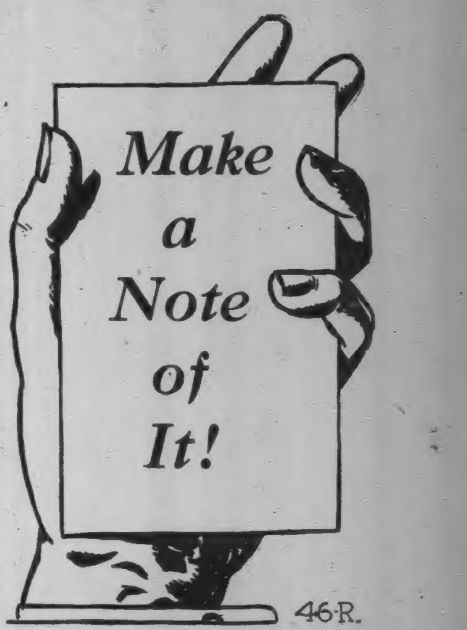
