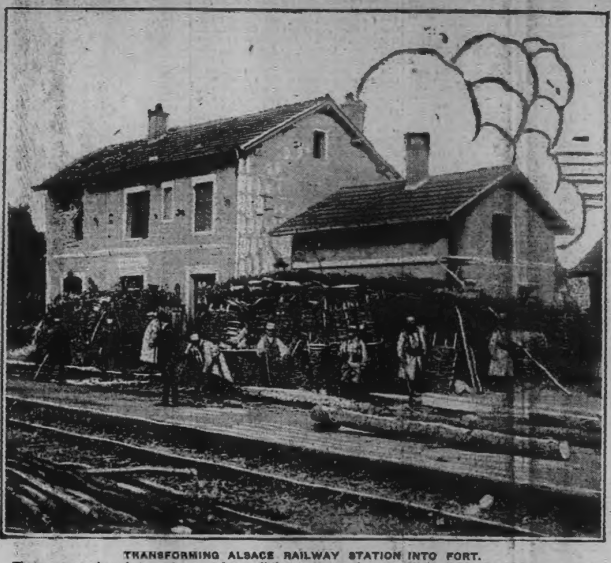
REWARD IS OFFERED FOR SUFFRAGE TORCH

DAMAGE TO PROPERTY ROUGHLY ESTIMATED TO TOTAL \$15,000,000

Washington, August 18.—Destruction of the United States army camp at Texas City by the great gulf storm, with a loss of ten soldiers and a number of unidentified civilians, was reported to the war department today by Major General Bell, commanding 8,000 men of the second division stationed there.

At the time the report was sent by radio to Houston, General Bell said the troops had been scattered in their flight to high ground before the inland waters of the flood that it was impossible to say whether more lives had been lost. All of the homes of the families of officers and enlisted men had been wiped away, but temporary shelter was being provided in the town proper for the women and children.

PARK IMPROVEMENTS PLANNED BY COCHRAN

Eight New Concrete Bridges Will Replace the Decayed Wooden Structures.

J. O. Cochran, general manager of parks, has announced extensive plans for improvement of Great park during the remainder of the summer and the fall, and has a force of workmen already at work on the improvements so that work can begin before the end of the week.

One of the first steps will be the laying of a cement walk along Cherokee avenue, the beautifying of the fountain at the Ormond street entrance on Cherokee avenue, and the laying of a two-foot concrete walk to the head of the lake.

Another big improvement, which has already begun, is the laying of four miles of cement gutter along the old drives which were laid out during the past summer by the county and park forces.

Eight new concrete bridges will be built to replace wooden structures which were destroyed by fire during the spring house built at the Burns street entrance and at the head of the department spent \$150 on the bridge for that side of the park.

Another big improvement, which has already begun, is the laying of four miles of cement gutter along the old drives which were laid out during the past summer by the county and park forces.

One of the biggest improvements has been the closing and setting of nearly three miles of drives in the park and the grading and laying out of a complete new system of walks. In addition to permanent improvements, the small force at the park has been kept busy these days before matting the park and keeping it in good condition.

Says Sherman's Hill Is Only a Side Show To the War in Europe

Living in a country of people who despise the German language, and have a great regard for Americanism, Dr. Walter Brewer, former house physician of the Hotel Ansley, and one of Atlanta's best-known young practitioners, writes from Wiesbaden, Germany, that the hill Sherman had in mind was "only a side show in comparison with the European big top."

The war, he says, will last "Lord knows how long." There is no present prospect of cessation, viewed from the American perspective. Dr. Brewer is attached to the American Red Cross hospital, which is composed of 200 beds, all surgical. He was originally bound for France, but was transferred on account of illness.

"There are about 1,600 things I would like to write about," he writes to the Atlanta audience, "but as the letter has to be read and censored, I will have to assume the mask of a lamb and bide my tongue—rather, my pen. American doctors and newspaper correspondents are literally cleaning up over here. There is no word for millions of romances, adventures, dramas and tragedies within the radius of the distance I traverse every day in my hospital duties. Romance is here a thing of the 'bargain counter,' and drama is to be picked like the wild fruit on the beach.

Among my best regards to all, and shake hands with yourself that you are a long way from the front, I send you a word of abnural and hand grenades. The hat that Sherman had in mind was a sort of side show in comparison with the European 'big top.'

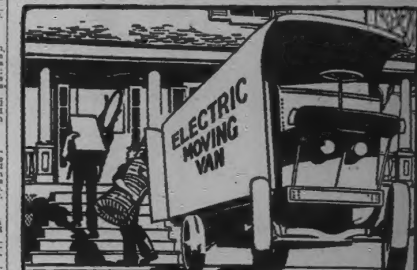
