MAJOR POPE THREATS AGAINST OFFICIALS

Reported That Government Is Now Investigating the Anonymous Letters Sent to Officers in Georgia.

Secret service operatives of the federal department of justice are said to be engaged in running down the sources of a volume of anonymous missives that have been sent through the mails to public officials since the Leo Frank lynching Tuesday week.

A large number of post-cards, threatening death to public officials—some of them having been sent to Gov. Governor John M. Slaton—have been sent through the mails. A good many of these came from outside states, it is said.

Assistant Postmaster J. C. Staton, acting in the absence of Postmaster Holling, says that he reported to the constitution Wednesday afternoon that a ruling had been received from the postmaster general in Washington barring all pictures of the Frank lynching from the mails.

Hundreds of post-cards bearing the photograph of the slain man as he had been lynched, were taken from the mails and sent to the lead letter office in Washington. The threatening letters are being held, it is reported, for copies upon which the secret service is at work.

A number of threats have been received in anonymous letters by Marjorie Marrett, principal bookkeeper of the Georgia State Bank, whose editorial on the Frank lynching was published in the Atlanta Constitution and extra precautions to guard his home, as he was even threatened that he would be burned out.
