In the latter region, following a stubborn engagement with superior forces, our troops retired in the region of Lake Dnau. The Germans, who have been repeatedly reinforced, are continuing their advance.

"Between the Brants and the Vilna, the enemy is also making a determined effort along the railway station of Vilna. His general direction being toward the railway station of Polotsk. Notwithstanding the extreme pressure, the German troops have not been continued to hold them with their own and counter-attacks.

"On the front of the army fighting continued in the Baltic district. The situation in the region of the Baltic brought up reinforcements, we captured one officer and 150 men and five machine guns.

"In this district there have been only insignificant attacks, which the Germans are excessively fatigued by means of fighting, and that losses in the last three days in killed alone amounted to 100 men in each company."

The United States cannot, and will not, interfere at this time except upon the expressed desire or willingness on the part of both belligerent parties. There has been no such expression from either, and it is not anticipated there will be at this time.

Neither side is as yet prepared to give in to the demands of the other, nor is there any present likelihood that either will do it short of exhaustion, which must come long before there could be any possibility of practical annihilation.

Germany's untamed desire for negotiations is evidently based upon probable exhaustion at no distant date. The Kaiser was quoted as having said some months ago that the first of October would see the termination of the war. Some will figure out a possible connection between this statement and the various intimations now widely discussed.

It would be folly to suppose that in view of this admitted weakness, notwithstanding German victories in Russia, the allies would permit Germany in any sense to dictate terms.

There is no apparent hope for present peace. Unless Germany is much nearer the point of exhaustion than we have reason to believe, judging by her performances as well as her claims, the fighting will continue. With the advantages held by the allies, it is certain to continue until Germany, in great measure, at least, is compelled to submit to the terms which they see fit to propose.

TRAINING AN ARMY. In a communication addressed to The Constitution, Mayor George R. Kline, of Moultrie, calls interesting attention to the value of militarizing the high schools of the country. Public sentiment is more and more reaching appreciation of the importance of such action on the part of the federal government, which will supply it in case of emergency with a reserve force well trained and equipped for duty.

The Constitution has both discussed and urged the value of the plan of militarizing the high schools of the United States, concerning which Mr. Kline writes: "The Auditor of the Chamber of Commerce in its report on the condition of the nation is directed towards 'preparations' for the day of war, and our great lack of a standing army. Why would we not take a good thing and make it better by militarizing our public schools by placing in them and furnishing the necessary equipment? In my opinion, one of the very best material for a volunteer army at least 100 per cent of the nation's youth, and each in special training, increasing their physical vigor at a critical time in life, and placing them in a position to defend their country."

SHRIMP AND OYSTER INDUSTRY HANDICAPPED BY GEORGIA LAW

However unusual it may appear, it is true that a practically new and untried enterprise in Georgia, one which has prospect for far more than doubling itself in a few years, is being handicapped to a point where ruin and progress will be stopped by the enactment of a state law.

Down on the coast of Georgia, including Chatham, Bryan, McIntosh, Glynn and other counties, the shrimp and oyster industry has grown to be one of the most important and profitable enterprises at a time when its prospects for the future are at their brightest.

A section in the act creating the fish and game commission, which was passed by the Georgia legislature and which is now in force, contains a section which reads: "The law pertaining to fish are rigidly enforced."

Another section says: "If any person shall catch or take any fish with seine, net, gill or other device, from any of the waters of this state, between the first day of February and the first day of July in each year, except with hook and line, he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor."

These two sections are the obstacles in the way of the shrimp and oyster industry. Hereafter, it has been estimated that the value of the shrimp and oyster industry in Georgia will be worth \$10,000,000 a year.

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and must be enforced. It is in his purpose, these and other reasons, to induce the legislature to pass a law which will encourage rather than discourage the development of the fish and oyster industry in Georgia.

The plan concentrates the enactment of a new and special act for the protection and propagation of fish, shrimp, oysters and crabs in Georgia, and also for the regulation of fishing, oyster and crab boats and the carrying of fish, oyster and crab products in the state.

The new law will hold that all the beds of rivers, waters and shores of the sea within the state, and not already conveyed by special grant, shall remain the property of the state and may be used in common by the people of the state, for the purpose of taking fish, oysters and other shell fish, under the new provisions. Under this proposed law no grant shall hereafter be issued by the authority of any county to pass any title in or to any land, water or shore, or any interest therein, except under the terms of the act, all such property being held to be the property of the state.

The manner of leasing water bottoms and natural resources of the state, as provided in the act, is that of a lease, and not of a grant. On this the commissioner shall determine. The expense of this act shall be borne by the state.

The present defect in the law, which will be corrected by changing the law, will be that the law now in force is defective in that it does not provide for the leasing of water bottoms and natural resources of the state.

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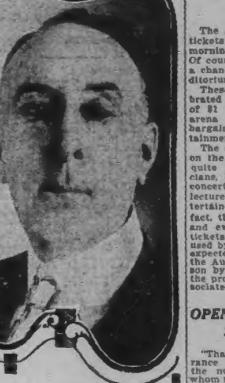
