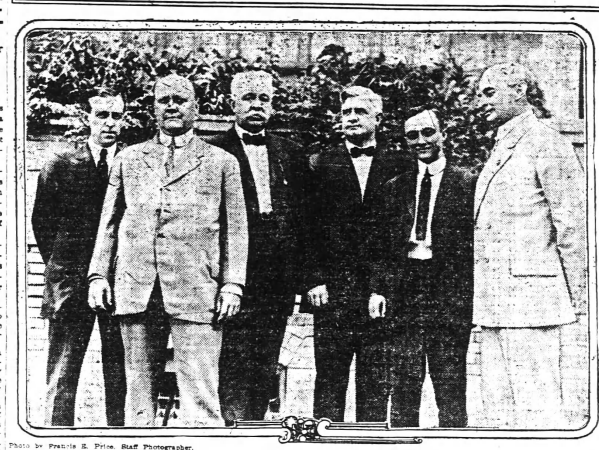

Washington, August 5.—The first attempt to move currency legislation in the senate today seemed to accentuate the division of opinion among democrats. Senator Owen, chairman of the banking committee and sponsor for the administration bill in the upper chamber, was forced off the floor by Senator Hoke Smith, also a democrat, while he was attempting to reply to an attack on immediate legislation delivered by Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, another democrat. VENEZUELAN CHEER INVASION OF CASTRO

Former Dictator Said to Be at Head of Army of 12,000 Men.

Port of Spain, Trinidad, August 5.—Revolutionary Cypriano Castro, in his revolutionary campaign to overthrow the former administration and regain the presidency of Venezuela, has under his command, according to latest advice received here, about 12,000 men. Castro is reported to have been received enthusiastically when he landed at Caracas in the state of Falcon. He is now said to be marching against the headquarters of the state of Bolivar, the seat of 4,000 men.

Two of Castro's adherents, General Rosendo Chaves and General Penabaz, who crossed into Venezuelan territory from the Colombian frontier with 2,000 followers, are reported to be augmenting the ranks of the army as they proceed through the inland towns.

Castro's lieutenant, General Penabaz, is reported to be in the state of Zulia, are leading 2,000 men against Maracaibo, capital of the state and the principal source of Venezuela's oil.

Army Marches Against Castro. Caracas, Venezuela, August 5.—An army of 12,000 men, comprising three brigades divided into seven regiments of infantry and one of artillery, left Caracas today to operate against the forces of General Cypriano Castro.

The brigades are commanded by General Emilio Fernandez, General David Gomez and General Teodoro Trujillo. General Felix Guzman has been appointed chief of staff. A medical corps with six officers and 100 men is also accompanying the government's fighting forces.

President Juan Vicente Gomez will leave the capital tomorrow and lead the army to Maracaibo, 50 miles south of Caracas. During his absence Dr. Jose Gil Fournier, president of the federal council, will act as chief executive.

An air-raid alarm which is reported to be in the state of Zulia is reported to have passed LaGuaira today. Telegraphic communication between Caracas and Maracaibo is interrupted.

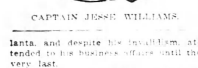
