



of her death, to disprove the statement of the Epps boy that he had accompanied the Phagan girl to town, and to show that the car reached the city later than Epps had testified.

Matthews stated that Mary Phagan did not leave the car at Marietta street, but got out at Hunter and Broad streets in company with a girl. Hollis stated he did not see her with a girl, but coincided with Matthews as to time.

The purpose of this testimony is to show that the evidence of the Epps girl is of little value—that Mary Phagan reached the factory later than the state claims.

Harris Scott was recalled by Solicitor Dorsey. He explained that when Conley wrote the first note, at his dictation, it took him some seven minutes, but when he discovered he could write and was not attempting to conceal anything it took him a much shorter time.

N. V. Darley was recalled by the defense. He told of the general condition of the factory floor and of the frequent finding of blood spots in the

parts of the building on the model. He stated he left the factory at 9 o'clock Monday day. Conley confessed he left at 10 o'clock.

Holloway Gets Muddled. E. P. Holloway, who was used by the state last week, was placed on the stand by the defense. On direct examination by Mr. Arnold he answered questions with a cock-sure tone of voice. Conley promised he would prove a valuable witness for the defense. On the cross-examination by Solicitor Dorsey he was hopelessly mixed up and his memory forsook him. He made a number of contradictory statements and the state managed to tear down a good deal of his testimony, which promised well for the defense.

Solicitor Dorsey asked him the direct question if he had not had a conversation with Kendrick, a former night watchman, regarding the times Frank had called up at night, stating to Kendrick that no one would know anything of the conversation. Holloway denied this.

He also denied having stated to a man named Whitfield that something was missing in the factory.

Conley said that he had a conversation with Holloway on the day he was arrested. He stated that he had a conversation with Kendrick, a former night watchman, regarding the times Frank had called up at night, stating to Kendrick that no one would know anything of the conversation. E. P. Holloway, watchman and time-keeper at the pencil factory, whose testimony Solicitor Dorsey riddled on cross-examination, followed General Manager Darley to the stand.

He gave his answers rapidly, making them frequently even before Attorney Arnold had finished propounding his questions. He is a man who looks older than 40, with cold gray eyes and thin lips.

His general appearance causes the lawyer of Dickens to think that the aged witness had stepped from one of the author's novels. He became confused upon the cross-examination of the solicitor, and apologized profusely.

Same Rule for All. He was examined directly by Mr. Arnold. "Was it a habit of Jim Conley to receive as he pleased?"

"No." "You applied the same rule to him as you applied to all of the help?"

"No." "Did you ever see Frank pinch him or touch him?"

"No." "Did you see Mr. Frank even touch him?"

"No." "Do you recall a Saturday that you missed since you have been employed with the pencil company?"

"No." "Who would relieve you before Lee would work on Saturday afternoon?"

Conductor Also Swears Epps Boy Was Not on Car With Mary Phagan

W. T. Houle, of 16 Western avenue, the conductor on the English avenue car on which Mary Phagan rode to town on May 28, was murdered, followed the motorman on the stand.

He also declared that the girl was not accompanied by a boy who he did not get out of Forsyth and Marietta streets where he left the car. He also declared that she was not accompanied by a boy answering the description of George Epps, but that a little girl was with her.

He controverted the testimony of the motorman in practically every detail. He said that he was on duty at the time when she was relieved by the motorman and that she was alone in the car.

Other than that the witness declared that there were only a few passengers on the car that trip. He also noted the girl's appearance as she had often ridden with him on the way to work in the morning. He said he did not know her name until after the murder, when he found out she was the one who had been killed.

"Yes, a newspaper man found out who she was the conductor on whose car she had come to town and he took me to see if I could identify the body." "Did you have any trouble in doing so?"

"No." "I knew her at once." "Have you any recollection of a town-dead boy getting on the car?"

"No." "Hooper, referring to Epps." "Did you see Phagan get on at Lindsay street?"

"Yes." "Do you remember the Epps boy getting on on any other street?"

"No, I have not." "When you took up the girl's car fare was there any other feature up to the moment when she was relieved by the motorman and she left the car?"

"No." "Do you mean a while ago that you keep the files of the company and the motorman's department?"

"Yes." "Do you mean against the rules to get there ahead of time?"

"Yes." "Do you always look at your watch when you pass every important place?"

"Yes." "Do you remember a lot of things you are supposed to?"

"The witness admitted that such might occasionally be the case. He was then excused."

N. V. Darley Denies Testimony Given by Conley and Dalton

N. V. Darley, general manager of the National Pencil factory, who has already been used as a witness for the prosecution, was called to the stand for the defense following the testimony of Mr. Arnold.

Hopkins Woman Denies Charges Made By Dalton and Jim Conley; Is Forced to Admit Untruths

Daisy Hopkins, a resident of DeKalb, Ga., and the woman who Jim Conley and C. B. Dalton declare frequently went to the National Pencil factory with Dalton while Leo Frank was there and was aware of her presence, was the first witness called by the defense Friday morning.

The woman swore to a full and complete denial of every charge that the white man and the negro had made and declared that she only knew Frank by sight as she had worked at the factory from October, 1932, until June, 1932.

When Solicitor Hugh Dorsey took her on cross-examination, however, he succeeded in trapping her into admitting that she had sworn to be on the stand when she declared that she had never been in jail. When confronted with a man who said to have secured her release she admitted that she had been there on a charge of immorality.

The woman who was seen in the courtroom for the first time proved to be decidedly plain in features and angular in form. She had none of the pale appearance of a factory woman, but showed rather the complexion of a woman who has lived in the country. White shoes and stockings, a white dress topped by a light yellow straw hat with a white ribbon, neatly completed her costume.

After the usual questioning to establish her identity, Attorney Luther Z. Rosser asked her if she had ever been married. She said that she had not.

"Did you ever work at the National Pencil factory and if so, when?" "I worked there from October, 1932, until June, 1932."

"What floor did you work on?" "The second floor."

"How many other women worked there with you?" "About ten, sometimes more and sometimes less."

"Do you know Leo M. Frank?" "Only know by sight."

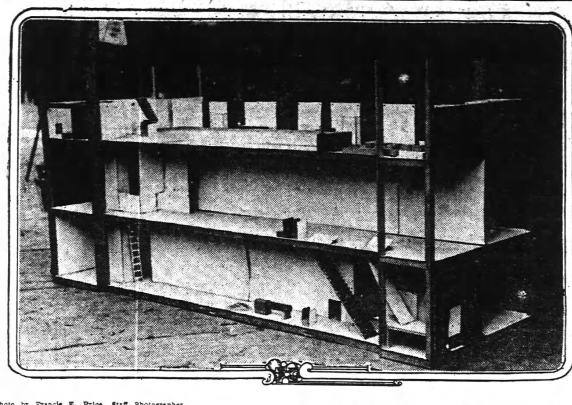

EDUCATION BILL PASSED BY SENATE

Lenient Compulsory System Favored Through Adoption of Substitute Offered by Senator Sweat.

Senator Sweat's substitute to the compulsory education bill yesterday afternoon passed the senate by a vote of 27 to 11. This measure is the most lenient of its kind that has ever been introduced.

It provides that children between the ages of 8 and 14 years of age shall be compelled to attend school for at least twelve weeks of each year, and also children between the ages of 13 and 14 who are not engaged regularly and lawfully in some useful occupation.

Senator Irwin, in supporting the substitute, stated that although our entire public school system was not such as he advocated compulsory education for the protection of the state and good citizenship.

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MANY LOCAL MEASURES ARE PASSED BY SENATE

Augusta Gets Secret Ballot, Although Senator Allen Declines to Vote for It.

The senate Friday morning passed the bill of Representatives Garlington and Olive providing for secret ballot in the city of Augusta and the retention of the present system of election voting.

Before the vote was called Senator J. Allen, of the twentieth district, asked that he may be excused from voting on the grounds that he could not support such a measure, but that he did not wish to vote against the bill through courtesy to the Richmond county representatives and Senator Kelly of the nineteenth district.

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ATLANTA CHARTER BILL PASSED BY THE SENATE

Measure Allows Vote on Proposed Senator Allen Declines to Vote for It.

Atlanta's charter revision bill passed the senate Friday morning. It came from the senate committee with a recommendation that the amendment curtailing the powers of the police recorder be made a separate section of the bill to be submitted to the voters.

The House committee report recommended the adoption of the bill with the two amendments, one striking out the initiative, referendum and recall and the other limited the recorder to a maximum fine of \$25.

Because of the lateness of the hour, only two members could be reached, so the mayor instructed Frank Hammond, his secretary, to call the finance committee together for a session Saturday morning at 11 o'clock.

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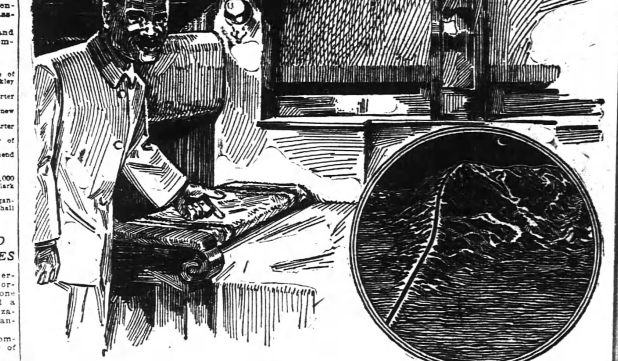

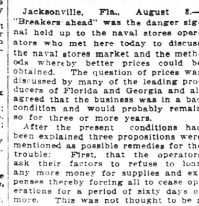

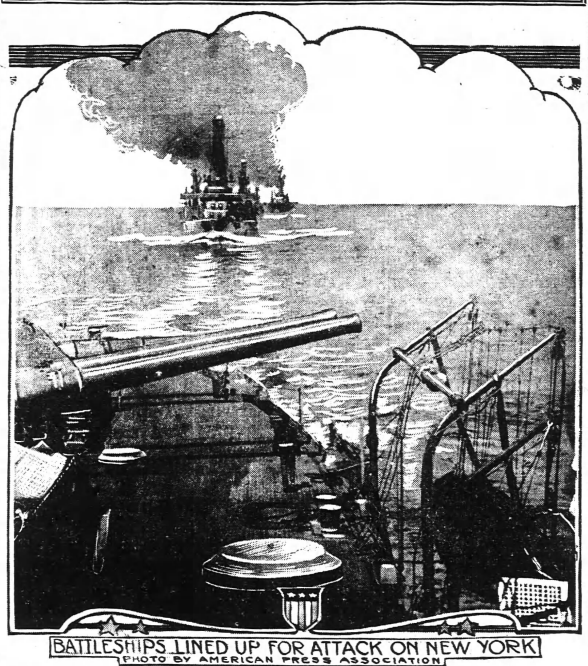
