President Wilson Has Resolved That No Faction in Mexico Shall Obtain Munitions From United States.

REBELS SCORE POINT AGAINST GEN. HUERTA

Sentiment Grows in Congress in Favor of Lifting Embargo on Arms and Giving Both Sides Equal Show.

LONG CIPHER TELEGRAM SPOILS BRYAN'S WHOLE

Adel, July 23.—The whole local entertainment plan for Secretary, Bryan was spoiled by a long wordy cipher telegram, evidently unexpected, which awaited the secretary here, and which came from Washington. Mr. Bryan retired to a hotel room, where he spent two hours deciphering the message and writing another. He declined to discuss the message.

Washington, July 23.—President Wilson has determined that no faction in the present Mexican revolution shall obtain arms or ammunition from the United States and that neutrality must be observed in the present sense. This was the interpretation of the neutrality laws decided upon by the president today after conference with Senator Bacon and Representative Flood, chairman of the two congressional committees on foreign relations.

While the Mexican rebels have been getting no arms heretofore, today's developments mean that the Huertistas will be deprived of the privilege previously accorded the Madero government and that the United States will treat all sides alike in the present dispute.

The situation was precipitated by the repeated complaints of constitutionalists and other patriots in this country that if the United States did not virtually assist the Huerta government by selling it munitions of war, a termination of hostilities would be possible.

Strong sentiment for new policy. Statements by the president today grew in congress to such extent that today a canvass was made of the committee in both houses dealing with foreign relations. It was found there would be little objection to repealing the joint resolution of March 14, 1912, which gave the president discretionary power to prohibit exports of arms or munitions of war to countries where domestic violence existed, but permits him to issue orders to the white house today that the Huerta administration could not be considered a legitimate successor to the Madero regime or a legally constituted government.

The constitutionalist representatives had protested to the state department that inasmuch as the Huerta government had not been declared to be a legitimate successor, it ought not to obtain arms. This contention was the case. The committee of the resolution of March 14, 1912, was considered by the state department and it was decided that the same purpose could be observed by denying ammunition to all factions.

HONOR ABOVE ALL THINGS SLATON'S KEYNOTE IN BEHALF OF TEACHERS AND TAXATION

LaGrange, Ga., July 23.—(Special.)—Appearing to the members of the Atlanta Weekly Press association for assistance in what he termed one of the most serious phases of the state's history. Governor John M. Slaton, in his annual address tonight before the annual banquet of the association, held at the Hotel Hamilton, stressed the importance of the present system under which the teachers of the state are forced to do without their money for a year after it has been voted by the legislature.

"We may differ about economic," declared Governor Slaton. "We may differ about the present system, but we must agree on the justice of any such system and the necessity for radical reform."

"Therefore to you I appeal as Georgians—the most powerful body for progress in this state—to lend your aid in meeting this crisis. Call on your gentlemen—educators and instructors of the people—strong with the power that you alone possess, to put up the hands of the legislature in bravely and honestly solving this question."

In referring to his recommendation of an extra tax, the governor said: "I have recommended an extra levy of 1 cent on the state property tax. I declare to you that the payment of one mill in 1915 and one-half mill in 1916 is a small price to pay for the maintenance of the state."

Governor Slaton declared himself in favor of the equalization of taxes, saying that an increase in the state property tax would simply equalize the burden and not increase that of him who is bearing the burden of the state's debt.

PAY TEACHERS MONEY AND SOLONS 'SCRIPT' SUGGESTS M'MICHAEL

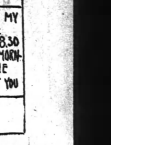
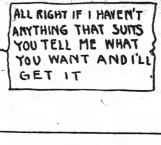
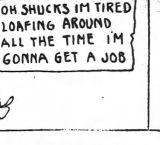

SEVERE BREAK MADE IN COTTON

Market Closed 9 to 12 Points - Net Decline - Weakness at New Orleans Cause of the Decline - Spot Quiet.

New York, July 3.-Cotton prices experienced a rather severe break today and closed steady, 5 to 6 points net loss or practically the lowest point of the season. The decline reflected a more favorable outlook for rain and cooler weather in the western belt, and was attended by the most active trading that has been seen here in some time. Local short lines were considerably increased, as a result of the weather news, while southern selling for both hedge and speculation account was very liberal at times during the day. Owing to the unexpected steadiness at Liverpool, the market here closed 9 to 12 points lower to 2 points higher, according to a time was fairly well sustained by scattered room covering, and absence of Texas rain, according to the early map. Sudden weakness at New Orleans, however, was accompanied by private predictions for unsettled conditions over the western belt, and these were later confirmed by the official forecast, which indicated unsettled weather in the western belt, Texas, with a possibility of showers on the Texas coast in the next twenty-four hours. This brought a quick response in the way of general selling and the market was under pressure for the balance of the day, with active buying developed at times in the afternoon.

British sentiment was increased by a rumor that a southern authority had made the condition 82, or a slight increase for the month, and that indications pointed to the possibility of a Gulf disturbance. The higher cotton prices of July at New Orleans, which has broken 66 points in two days also contributed to the unsettled feeling here. More showers occurred in the eastern belt, and the foreign portfolio situation was again a subject of appreciation among the market. The developments of the day emphasized the sensitiveness of the market to all weather news, and particularly to any prospects for relief in Texas from the long spell of dry weather. The higher cotton prices were generally steady. Spot cotton quiet, 5 points down; middling uplands, 12 to 20 profit, 20 to 25 no sale.

LARGE EXPORTS HELPED WHEAT

Foreign Demand Caused the Market to Become Firm. Corn Had Loss of 14 to 3-4 Cent.

Chicago, July 3.-Larger exports than any previous day this season caused firmness today in wheat. The market closed steady at last night's level to 1-8 higher. Corn showed a net loss of 1-4 to 3-4 and oats a decline of 5-8 to 9. For provisions the market was about 5-8 to 1-2 higher to 1-4 lower.

Export sales of wheat here today amounted to a full million bushels. The total for the day before was also large, 1,000,000. Exports were said to be outstanding ordinary dealers in Kansas and Nebraska. Wheat was in short supply in Europe, and was accepted as explaining the unusual foreign demand. Country offerings, which early in the day had fallen to practically nothing, assumed normal proportions when the market advanced. Hedging sales that resulted then wiped out in turn most of the gain, but still left a net continued upward in the final settlement. The market was said to be continued heavy, 2,235,000 bushels against 1,375,000 a year ago. Seaboard clearance wheat and flour equalled 544,000 bushels.
