

BRIBERY CHARGES FALSE OF BRIBERY IN PHAGAN CASE DECLARES COL. FELDER; CALLS THEM "FRAME-UP"

Affidavits and Alleged Dictagraph Record Are Made Public, Accusing Prominent Lawyer, of Offering Bribe of \$1,000 to Secretary Febuary, of Police Department, to Secure Affidavit Made for Police by J. W. Coleman, Stepfather of Mary Phagan, in Regard to Felder's Connection With Case.

ALLEGATIONS ARE MADE TO FORESTALL A PROBE OF POLICE, SAYS FELDER

Mayor Woodward Also Dictagraphed, According to Report-Admits He Was Called Into Conference by A. S. Colyar, Who Offered Him, He Says, Evidence That the Police Department Is Giving Protection to Disorderly Houses in Atlanta—"I've Done My Duty, It's Up to Grand Jury," Says Lanford.

CALIFORNIA SIDELIGHTS.

The ignorant Chinese in Charles Lamb's fable burned down the house that they might enjoy roast pig. If a correspondent of The Boston (Mass.) Transcript is correctly informed, Governor Johnson, of California, is willing to set the house of the nation on fire if he may thereby go tothe serate. It is at any rate, according to this authority, the governor's senatorial ambitions that provoked the present crisis, and the story is told as follows:

In California, the politics back of the agitation for an anti-alien land law centers around the desire of tovernor Johnson to reach the United States senate. He will be opposed in the campaign when it opens by Francis J. Honey, whose work in the grait prosecutions in San Francisco he took up when Heney was shot. It is the belief of Governor Johnson that the sympathies of Colorida would place Johnson that the sympathies of Colorida would place Johnson that the sympathies of Colorida would place Johnson the street and in Labor agitators led by one of the gang implicated in the McNamara affair were renewing tooir demands that the Japanese in California, even though they constitute only about two per cent of the population, should be excluded from all land holding. The governor took up this issue and the legislature which he dominates, or rather his following in that body which is in the majority, started upon its passage a rigid bill prohibiting all allens helikible to citizenship from owning property. The outery raised throughout the country and in Japan and the earnest protest of Colonel Rossevell to Governor Johnson had the effect of modifying the original bill. We hope this version is exaggerated. It

is not reassuring to think that demagogy can reach such sinister extremes that it will involve the entire nation in trouble that may end in war, cost thousands of lives and hundreds of millions of dollars, all in exchange for a senate seat! The disparity in the stakes is too tremendous, too appalling. But there is the story for what it is worth.

In this connection former President Roosevelt is completely exonerated from a rather general suspicion that his influence has been back of the persistency of Johnson. When the situation assumed a crisis the California legislature, Colonel Roose velt was asked the point blank question as to how he stood by eastern newspaper men. He responded that he had protested to Governor Johnson. When asked for a copy of what he said, he replied, "That is purely a personal matter between myself and Goverbor Johnson; if he cares to give out the correspondence he may do so." Johnson declined to make public Roosevelt's telegrams. It is known, however, that they constituted an emphatic protest against the proposed action and a stiff warning as to the consequences.

THE ANSWER---COME SOUTH.

The New York Herald laments that the long-continued and increasing tide of immigration is uprooting all our old dietary standards and replacing them with the ne culiar tastes of many European countries. "Strawberry shortcake is fading fast away," it mourns, "pork and beans-cooked according to the ancient New England recipe, with a little molasses—is following in its wake, and corn beef hash is tainted with onions and even garlic. Meantime, the tide of immigration has carried with it foreign drink and cookery and developed the culture of many foodstuffs."

The good old dishes of our forefathers may be vanishing in the east and other sections of the country, but, bless your heart! they still reign supreme this side of the Potomac river. Don't think we're in tolerant or dogmatic. The southern mind

is receptive with regard to cookery as with regard to high finance, highbrow literature or futurist art. There is nothing small or snobbish about the south's gustatory inclinations. But in this section, we venture to boast, you will find more of the original American dishes and the American style of cookery than in any other part of the country.

It has often been said that the south contained the nation's largest percentage of pure Anglo-Saxon extraction. The influthat have militated to keep pure our racial strain—such as isolation, slowness in development, the civil war, etc.-have also operated to guard the diet list against foreign influence. As for shortcake? Well, had The Herald visited Georgia during the season just passed it would have seen no signs of decadence, either in the luscious product itself or in the native love for it. As for meats, it is likely the southron likes his roast and his pork in virtually the same style his Cavalier and Huguenot ancestors liked them-as if fresh from a turning spit, succulent and inviting. And where that king of breads, "corn pone," is concerned, it graces today the representative southern table. Go out on the myriad farms and you will find still supreme those bountiful and well-seasoned vegetable dinners that used to characterize the antebellum regime.

This doesn't mean that we haven't here and there fallen victims to the delicacies and refinements of foreign cuisine. But in the representative instance the south maintains the sturdiest of American standards as regards the table. So whenever our friends of the north, east and west want to sample again a genuine American dinner, let them catch the next limited in this direction. They'll find it worth the price!

CUBA'S CRISIS.

The republic of Cuba probably enters apon the critical period of its history with the inauguration of Mario G. Menocal as its third president. His predecessor, Gomez, narrowly grazed forcing American intervention by his weakness and inefficiency, and the opinion is growing that the next time our troops go to Cuba it will be on an expedition of permanent occupation.

Whether Menocal can merge ail factions and give the island a far start on the road to stable government is an unknown quantity. He is said to be an excellent administrator, is certainly an adroit politician, and, not the least important of qualifications, has had military experience. It is also encouraging that he approaches his task with a full knowledge of its difficulties.

At present, as ever since its nominal in

dependence, Cuba has been the stamping ground of differing cliques and of aspiring politicians. The people themselves have had little or no experience in the arts and restraints of self-government. The legacy of unrest and of force which was handed down from the Spanish regime has more or less persisted to this day. Each succeeding president has been confronted by a patronage problem by the side of which the quandaries of the American democrats are negligible. For if the American aspi rant, however powerful, fails to receive an appointment, he can either nurse his grouch in private or keep a political hatchet whetted. But in Cuba the practice has been to fly to arms. This tendency, and the further tendency to loot the treasury on the slightest pretext, has made troubles for any man charged with administration. Purther complications have been the scarcity of land, great estates being held in "cold storage," President Menocal has pledged himself to attack this abuse.

Should President Menocal succeed in weathering the next year and in bringing all elements in Cuba to a realization of the responsibilities ahead of them, he will have wrought historically for his country. Doubt still prevails in America as to the ability of the island ever to govern itself. Menocal's administration should answer the question one way or the other.

ALSO AN ATLANTA PROBLEM.

"Spotless Town" of familiar memory is to have a rival in "Noiseless Town," and, wonderful to behold, the candidate is to be none other than Chicago, second largest city of the nation. Hundreds of thousands of copies were printed, and over 300,000 were sent to Great Britain and the continent of Europe. In this country men who thought themselves well informed about our natural resources discovered after read-ing this pamphlet that they really knew little about the magnitude and the almost inexhaustible nature of the resources of the

The effect of this pamphlet upon

Europe was immedi-ately felt by the representatives of the gov-ernment who had been commissioned to offer government bonds for sale abroad. Furthermore, one effect of the pamphlot was greatly to depreciate the credit of the bonds which vere offered for sale in Europe by the Confederate government.

The author of this pamphiet was David A. Wells. Its publica-A. Wens. its publication gave him both a national and an international reputation. He E. J. Edwards

ecame one of the leading economic authorities of the United States and was for a time associated officially with the treasury de-partment at Washington. Afterward Mr. Walls was called into consultation professionally by many of the important corporate and railroad interests of the United States.

It was my good fortune to become acquainted with Mr. Wells in 1873. I had many conversations with him. Sometimes he seemed absent-minded and I soon learned that this betokened intense concentration of his mind on some important matter. At other times he was very communicative. I took advantage of a time when Mr. Wells seemed disposed to chat freely to ask him how be came to write the pamphlet entitled "Our Burden and Our Strength."

The World's Mysteries



WAS PISA'S TOWER BUILT TO LEAN?

One of the most curious structures in the world is the Leaning Tower of Pisa. No one has ever been able to ascertain whether the Tower was built in its present inclined position, or whether it has been toppling gradually during the centuries since it was constructed. An investigation that was started shortly after the fall of the famous Campanile of Venice in 1902 has revealed several interesting facts regarding this structure, but even the men who performed the task were not able to fathom the mystery of the great incline of

For many years it was supposed that the Tower was founded upon a massive and spacious base, but instead these investiga-tors found that the real foundation simply consists of a ring of mesonry exactly corresponding in girth to the huge cylindrical mass it bears. In fact, the diameter of the

finer ring of foundation is precisely that of the space inside the Tower.

This discovery, with the further astonishing fact that the foundations are merely three meters beneath the surface, would appear to constitute almost incontrovertible proof that the Leaning Tower of Pisa was originally built perpendicularly, and that its leaning propensities, which are becommore and more accentuated, are due other causes than the intention of its Its lean has been gradual, though mark

ed, within the past hundred years. Two English architects who examined the Tower in 1817 noted that it was 12 feet 7 inches out of the vertical line, but since that time it has increased more than one foot, be-ing at present 18 feet and 8 inches from perpendicular. Including the cornics, it

is 16 feet off the perpendicular.

Another English writer, who visited the Tower about the middle of the last century, wrote as follows: "I am as much satisfied that this Tower was built in its present form as with any arguments I bave read to

the contrary."

He then refers to the statement of Messrs. Creasy and Taylor, which was published in 1829: "They have shown, to their inshed in 1829. "Trey have shown, to their minds, in a very satisfactory way, no doubt, that the Tower of Pisa was not built in a leaning position, as the scaffold holes incline just as the Tower does, and also that the settlement must have begun to show itself before the completion, from the attempts that were made to rectify it by increasing the height of the columns and cornless on the lower side in order to throw the upper part of the building in the opposite direction. I observe the same artifice in the tower at Bologna."

The lower at Bologia.

The base of the tower has always been immersed in water, which is one reason for its unsteadiness, and it has, no doubt, been affected at various times by seismic movements. It is stated that Galileo, who swung his pendulum from the overhanging south cornice in 1615, in his experiments to con-firm the laws of gravitation, found nine years later that his pendulum reached fur-ther from the base by several inches, but in the meantime there had occurred the earthquake of 1620. It is also stated that after the earthquakes of 1834 and 1859 the tower showed a very perceptible increased inclination. When the Tower of Pisa was begun in

1174, one historian tells us. after the plans of the architects. Bonnanus, of Pisa, and William, of Innsbruck, the structure was intended to stand erect. The third story. intended to stand erect. The taird acory, however, had scarcely been reached when it was found to incline towards the south. Work was stopped and for nearly a century it remained as it was. The five additional stories, completed in 1350, show a slight instories, completed in 1850, show a significa-cilination of structure in the northerly direc-tion, and this, added to the fact that the two heaviest bells of the seven in the tower are bung in the northern side, shows the attempts, that were made in the fourteenth century to maintain the equilibrium of the tower, if not its permanent stability. These bells weigh 12,000 pounds, and are named the Assumption and the Crucified Christ. There are good arguments that would appear to sustain both sides in this con-

troversy, and the only fact upon which re-cent investigators have based their belief is that the tower was built crooked unin-tentionally, as its meager foundation would prove. A learned Frenchman of the six-teenth century suggested, and apparently with seriousness, that the architect was a hunchback and made the tower crooked to resemble himself.

is no duplicate. Galveston has 37,000 people. It used to have 38,000, but on September E, 1900, the Gulf of Mexico rose up over it and drowned 6,000 of its people. The next morning Galveston was a soggy wreck and the nation began collecting enough money to bring the survivors to some safe place and let them

start a new city. The Galveston folks who were left were all Texas people and instead of being discouraged they got mad. Galveston lies on a long narrow island shaped like a hat pin and about as slender. It was so low that when there was an unusually high tide, the wandered down the main street and called for mail at the postoffice. Galveston built a sea wall 17 feet high and 17,500 feet long. Then she raised herself up to the top of the sea wall, twiddled her fingers at the gulf and dared it to come again. How are

you going to discourage a town like that? Galveston is little but mighty important. The ships of the carth sneak in behind Pelican island on which Gaiveston stands and load cotton. It takes fifty steamship lines to carry away Galveston's cotton. The city is visited by more tramps than any other city in the world, but it doesn't mind it. Its tramps are tramp steamships and they make her tonnage figures bigger than those of any American city except New York.

Galveston has had quantities of history. It has been under six flags-Spanish, La-Fitte's black flag, Mexican, Texan, United States and Confederate-and has dipped into four or five wars a little ways. Its citizens have grown rich and when they die they leave high schools, hospitais, libraries, war monuments and drinking fountains to the town. It has the finest beach in the country and the climate is so even that the mer-chants sell thermometers with the temperature painted on the glass and the citizens

She has 13 square miles, but better than that, she has several square commissioners who govern the city on the commission plan and save \$100,000 a year with which to pay interest on the sea wall bonds.







"Nothing has been further from my mind than to embarrass or to tend to render more difficult the peaceful solution of whatever differences, read or imaginary, may exist between the friendly government."
