other grounds on which she could have told such a untrue story except in seeking revenge.

Night session held. So anxious are Jenkins county authorities to hurry and finish the Godbee trial that Judge Hammond, at the close of the afternoon, ordered the trial to proceed tonight until both the state and defense were able to close.

The largest crowd that ever gathered in this community thronged the doors of the courthouse when court was reconvened for the night session at 8 o'clock. There were hundreds of women and girls flocking madly for entrance and seats. Many were forced to stand on the outer walls.

Mrs. Godbee on stand. Telling between sobs the dramatic history of her married life, the wife was born in the quiet little village of Perkins, until the day she stood in the Miller postoffice and jumped Jordan death by the hands of her husband and his girl bride, Mrs. Edna Godbee took the stand this afternoon in her own behalf.

There was barely a dry eye when, at the close of her heart-rending, there were audible sobs throughout the courtroom as the figure of tragedy wept through the night session of a matrimonially down-trodden life and of its terrible culmination.

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"Which way did she face?" "She started back," said Godbee. "On one standing in the position she was in, she was looking toward the postoffice."

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WRIGHTON'S PRISON BOARD Full Pardon Recommended for Man Convicted to Die. Patterson Would Commute Sentence to Life.

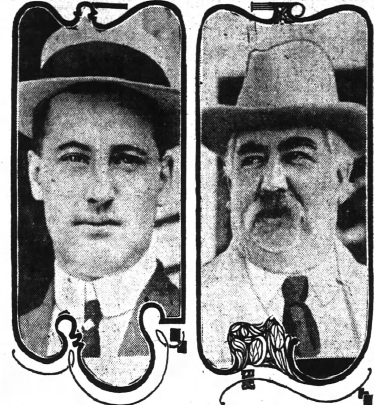

But for the fact, as she herself has stated, that she still cherishes a remnant of the victim's memory, they would have been introduced as evidence in the trial. This was made known last night when Mrs. Godbee took the stand a second time. "Gentlemen," she said, addressing the jury, "they have told you here of Judge Godbee's irreproachable character—irreproachable, I mean, as they tried to show it. By these letters and documents that have come to me from a source which I am at a loss to explain, I could readily show you that evidence of his attitude toward me and the treatment he gave me from me and from Mr. Godbee. There are also documents of business and financial transactions which would adequately disclose the man's true colors. They would show how I was fleeced and swindled and ruined. I have several reasons for not wanting them produced publicly, chief of which is the remnant of regard for the man who is the father of my children. They will not be introduced."

Colonel Davis, it is said, entered the case without charge, purely for his friendship to Judge Godbee, the victim. He represented Godbee in his divorce case of the Cole, Barlow, and has been the dead man's chum since boyhood. They were schoolmates. He is leading the fight to convict Mrs. Godbee. Boyer witness excepting one was examined in the trial, and the leading speech for the prosecution in argument will be made by him. He is one of the foremost attorneys of the section, and has held numerous political offices.

WORLD NEARS SHORTAGE IN FOOD AND CLOTHES

British Scientist Says That in Century We Will Be Up Against It. Birmingham, England, September 11.—The striking geographical explorations passed with the finding of the earth's two poles; the geographer of the future will have as the field the vital questions of supplying and distributing food and clothes to the world, in the opinion of H. N. Dickinson, president of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, who addressed the meeting here today. Mr. Dickinson is professor of geography at University College, Edinburgh, president of the Royal Meteorological Society and a recognized authority and writer on meteorological and geographical subjects. Foremost of these questions, Mr. Dickinson believes, will be that of growing wheat enough for the world's bread. A host of problems of the future whose trade he contemplates among them being the questions of obtaining power and energy sufficient to supply the needed increase in factories, the fuel question and the distribution of population.
