New and startling disclosures of corruption will be made if the evidence said to be in the hands of Chief Beavers is substantiated.

Coming on the heels of the stories disseminated as to the notorious Ols Bradley report in the rear of 113 Auburn, are the stories of the violation of the alliance between the policemen and the blind tigers and locker clubs are expected to "bring it home" to the public.

# LEE'S EVIDENCE IN FRANK CASE DISCOUNTED

Attorney Denies Confession—Asserts Conley Affidavits Put the Watchman in Background.

never had done before. While the prosecution will lay great weight on this testimony, the defense will seek to show that it is entirely without significance.

Admitted that Frank never called Lee before the evening. Frank's attorneys will present evidence to show that he had called repeatedly when the former night watchman was employed at the factory, and that he was led to call the night of April 26 because a discharged employee, J. M. Gantt, had been in the factory and had wished to make certain that Gantt had left.

Those concerned in the trial of Frank are awaiting with interest the outcome of the trial over the substance of the testimony. The defense has announced that it will combat the enforcement of these affidavits and has branded them as a subterfuge of Frank's lawyers to discredit the witnesses introduced by the prosecution.

If the State fails, it will have to produce in court all of the affidavits and statements made by its principal witnesses. The defense will be able to use these to make a close comparison of the oral testimony with that which was sworn to weeks before.

In the event that any of the witnesses give testimony in any respect contradictory to the statements in their affidavits the defense will be in a position to impeach and discredit their testimony. Solicitor Dorsey and Attorney Frank A. Hooper have characterized this as tricky on the part of the defense and have announced that they do not propose to submit their mass of affidavits for the use of the defense if the law will protect them in the matter.

NASHVILLE, July 1.—The plant of the Tennessee Picking and Stook Yards Company was destroyed by fire today, entailing a loss of \$875,000, partially insured.

The plant, which covers an entire block, was a part of the interests of William J. Cummins, the defunct Nashville and New York financier, and had the largest capacity of any stook yard in the South, with the exception of the one at Fort Worth. It was only recently sold at auction to New York capitalists.

# BATTLE IN HOUSE STATE SENATE'S ASSURED OVER COMMITTEES AND SEATING

## Defeat of Attempt to Oust McArthur and Brown Presages Stirring Fight Tuesday.

It became plain today that the effort to unseat Representatives McArthur, of Wheeler, and Browning, of Blaine, is to bring on tomorrow the first big spectacular fight of the session.

Although the special committee appointed to investigate the titles of these two gentlemen reported unanimously against seating them, the House failed to adopt the report of the committee at its session today, but postponed action until tomorrow.

On a motion to table, and thereby kill the session report today, the issue was left until the next day, thereby showing surprising strength against the committee.

The House, however, in its decision on the committee report in the morning, will not accept the committee findings without the consent of the entire membership of the House, and the report is open to the attack by a high majority.

Lawyers differ as to the constitutional aspect of the question involved. Some hold that the House has no power to sit in the House at both ends of the street, and do justice to the other. Others think it is doubtful merely, whether the House has the right to do so. They have no legal authority for seatings either man.

Both Blaine and Wheeler Committee have delegations on hand pleading for their members, but the Representatives by not insisting on the matter, are being considered as a strong and powerful sentiment in the House against unseating them.

The feeling is that the matter should be settled at once, however, in order that there may be no question in the future as to the status of the House membership in its entirety.

**House Vote Today.**  
The House of Representatives is to meet at 10 o'clock, but the session will be a quiet one, as the House will be holding its special session on the trial of the case of McArthur and Browning, the committee report to the contrary notwithstanding. It is expected that the House will vote on the report of the committee at 3 o'clock.

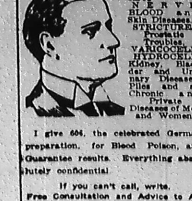

# WIDOW NOT TOLD OF MAN'S FALL TO DEATH

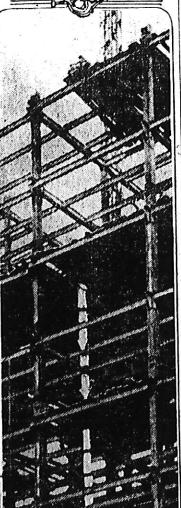


Photo-diagram shows how Newburn fell to his death.

Relative Goes to Illinois to Break News, Fearing the Effect of Telegraphic Message.

The body of William Newburn, the steel worker who fell to his death from the ninth story of the new Healey building Monday afternoon, was shipped Tuesday morning to the old home at DeWitt, Ill. where a lonely wife awaits his coming as she thinks alive. For she does not know her husband is dead.

Nor will she know he is dead until Tuesday night, when F. A. Weeber, brother-in-law and fellow workman with Newburn, who hastened away from Atlanta late Monday afternoon, arrives at the little home to break the news. He would not trust a telegram he said, for the terrible news would kill her if it were broken in that way.

Weeber, "Billy" sideman on the works, and now the messenger of his death, was an eyewitness to the tragedy Monday afternoon.

Newburn, he says, was standing on the ninth floor of the big skyscraper when the big derrick, which bears itself to a height several stories above the top floor, sawing a pile of lumber for an balcony over the side of the steel framework.

Something went wrong. There was a sudden slipping of three pieces of the lumber pile. Weeber, from his perch on the derrick, saw it slipping directly toward the spot where Newburn was. He called out frantically, by once, twice, but it was too late. The three big pieces of lumber fell with a crash, knocking Newburn over and into an open shaft to the second floor. The body fell from such a distance and with such force that it knocked a hole several feet in circumference in the floor of the second floor.

The big pile of lumber fell with a crash, knocking Newburn over and into an open shaft to the second floor. The body came down and struck a heavy horizontal beam. It struck a hole several feet in circumference in the tile flooring of the second floor.

DEFENSE PLANS TO TEAR DOWN CONLEY TALE

Expect to Prove Frank Innocent by Discrediting Negro's Story of Phagan Crime.

Warned that the State is basing practically all of its expectations of sending Leo M. Frank to the gallows on the dramatic story told by Jim Conley, the defense this week is completing the collection of a strong line of evidence with which it is planned utterly to discredit the negro's statements and his testimony in court.

Conley again has insisted on confronting Frank. He says he is certain if he can meet the factory superintendent face to face he can make him "tell the whole story." The negro has told the detectives he not only is willing, but is eager to reveal in the presence of Frank the story of the disposal of Mary Phagan's body just as he has related it a dozen times since he first made the sensational acknowledgment that he had a part in the crime.

It is regarded as most unlikely that the two will be brought together. Luther Z. Rosser, attorney for Frank, has refused to make any definite statement of his attitude in the matter, but it is known he looks with suspicion on every word and every act of the negro. He has given the impression that he is not unwilling for the client to face the negro, but that he regards the court room as the proper place for the meeting and the actual trial of Frank as the proper time.

For this reason, the dramatic moment when attorney and accused confront each other in all probability will be saved for the time when the legal battle is in progress for Frank's life.

Attack Planned on Negro. At this time, it is the intention of the defense to begin with the first statements by which Conley connected himself with the case after he had remained silent for two weeks following his arrest. Frank's lawyers will take the opening details of the negro's affidavit, one by one, and seek to show that in the light of probabilities they are utterly absurd and ridiculous.

Particular emphasis will be placed on the fact that the negro has lied deliberately many times in the stories he has told of the crime. The defense will take the position that it is most unreasonable for the State, after the negro has made two affidavits admittedly perjurious to base its case on a third affidavit which it holds is absolutely true.

In the firm belief that Conley's refusal to demand to be brought face to face with Frank is a mere subterfuge by which the negro is endeavoring to shift the blame for the crime, Attorney Hoover is expected to give the most merciless grilling which he called to the highest standard by the State. The defense makes no secret of its expectation of breaking down the negro's tale. An open court confrontation would not surprise them, they say.

Believes Conley Went Back. Solicitor Dorsey and his associate in the prosecution, Frank A. Hooper, will make a confession on the witness stand. Mr. Hooper said Monday morning that he believed the negro would make an excellent witness, probably the most valuable one the State would call. He did not believe that Conley would break down under the fire of questions from Attorney Rosser and Heuben Arnold, both of whom have a wide reputation for the raising cross-examination to which they can subject to anyone in the witness chair.

"I haven't any thought that Conley will falter," said Mr. Hooper. "He told me a clear, straightforward story. The details are not important. He can not be confused, and the court, of course, will not permit him to be intimidated should there be any effort of the sort on the part of the cross-examiners, which I do not anticipate."

Dissolution Proposal Puts \$88,000,000 of \$126,000,000 Stock in Trustees' Hands.

ST. PAUL, MINN., June 30.—The new plan for separating the community of stock interests between the Union Pacific and the Southern Pacific Railroads was presented for judicial approval to the Federal Court here today. This plan has been approved by the President and Attorney General McReynolds, and is intended to carry out the decree of the Supreme Court in the merger case.

The main feature is a provision whereby the Union Pacific shall sell to the Pennsylvania Railroad \$18,250,000 of Southern Pacific stock and accept in exchange \$15,425,000 of Baltimore and Ohio securities. The remaining \$88,000,000 of Southern Pacific stock held by the Union Pacific is to be held in trust by a trust company to be designated by the court, the company to collect and hold the dividends, beginning April 1, 1913.

The stock will be registered in the name of the trustee, but can not be voted except under direction of the court. The Union Pacific asks the right to offer pro rata to its stockholders certificates of interest to be issued by the trustee on the Southern Pacific shares held in trust. Negotiable receipts are to be given as part payments.

Provision is made that he trustees in all future financial transactions report frequently to the courts and to the Attorney General.

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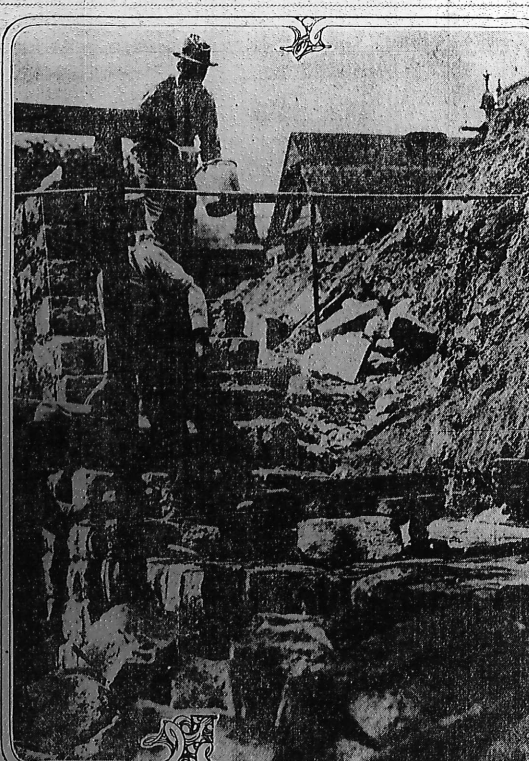
