

Frank Files Reasons for New Trial

PHAGAN CASE IN SUPREME COURT

Argument To Be Set for December 15 and Final Decision May Be Made by March.

All doubt as to when the argument will be heard by the Supreme Court in the Phagan case was set at rest Saturday, when the bill of exception, properly certified, was filed with the clerk of the court for record.

This means the case will go on the calendar for argument on December 15, although actual argument may not be heard for three or four days thereafter.

Arguments in the case may be made either orally and by brief, or by brief alone. If oral arguments are made, the hearing likely will take several days. If briefs are relied upon entirely, however, the hearing will be exceedingly short and non-spectacular.

Following the submitting of arguments the court of review will take the case under advisement for such length of time as it deems necessary, not to exceed twelve months, however. If the case takes the usual course a final ruling may be looked for about March.

If the verdict and reasons of the lower court are affirmed as matters of law, the case ends so far as the State of Georgia is concerned, and the execution of the defendant in the trial case will be necessary to close the case.

If the case is reversed, it will go back to the lower court for retrial, exactly as if it had never been tried, and likely will come on for trial again in July of next year.

3 AMERICANS DIE IN FALL OF JAUREZ

Rebels in Night Attack Rout the Huerta Forces—Powers Back U. S. in New Note.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 15.—Chargé d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy has gone to the national palace to see General Huerta, indications at the American Embassy were that he was the bearer of a message. While at the palace Mexican officials declared that Huerta had no intention of resigning to-day.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—On receipt of information that several Americans were killed during the capture of Juarez by the Constitutionalists early to-day, Secretary Bryan instructed Consul Edwards, at Juarez to investigate the matter and to report at once to the State Department.

Secretary Bryan admitted to-day that another note has been sent to President Huerta through Chargé d'Affaires O'Shaughnessy. The American charge will deliver this communication to-day or to-morrow. Upon the reply of the Mexican President will depend whether the United States will withdraw its embassy from Mexico City.

The Secretary of State further asserted that all the European nations have stated their intention of supporting the United States in its Mexican policy and added that Japan also has made plain the fact that it will support President Wilson.

News to this effect, reached the State Department to-day directly from Tokyo and removed doubt from the minds of Government officials concerning the attitude of the Japanese Government.

It has been feared here that Japan would attempt to block the American policy in Mexico by supplying President Huerta with arms, ammunition and other supplies. Now, however, that assurances have been received from all the world powers that the United States is to have a free hand in settling the Mexican trouble in its own way, administration officials are certain that President Wilson's policy will continue to prevail.


The feeling is strong in Washington that President Huerta has reached the end of his career and that another fortnight will see another head of the Mexican Government.

HURLED 50 FEET BY GIANT CRANE

H. M. Bannister, a boiler-maker, was hurled 50 feet Saturday morning into a "dump pit" at the city crematory and was taken to Grady hospital, still conscious and with no bones broken, but suffering with injuries about the head and face.

A traveling crane, used for hauling the refuse to the incinerators, swept over the platform and knocked the workman off into the adjoining pit.

Juarez was track shortly before 7 o'clock today when a detachment of constitutionalists turned a machine gun upon a detachment of Federal soldiers who were hiding behind some barracks.

The noise of the shots stamped the faces around them and many of them broke for their shells and ran wildly upon the track. Two more machine guns soon got into action and Villa deployed a heavy detachment of men around the track to prevent the escape of the Federal forces.

While the battle was going at the race track squads of constitutionalists were removing and burying bodies of the dead Federalists.

Victory in Three Hours. The position of the dead showed that the heaviest fighting had occurred in front of the American house, Kenn Hall, the custom house, the "old stone church" and in the street.

The powerful man who ruled with a hand of iron was removed, and no man came with power to take his place.

Mexico lacks a man with intelligence, character and motives to represent the will and welfare of the Mexican people. And she lacks a man with the genius to rule by force and keep peace by dread of his own greater violence.

The United States sooner or later MUST REGULATE MEXICAN CONDITIONS. Murder and anarchy can not continue indefinitely on this continent. The United States is bound to maintain order and respect for life and property in the Monroe Doctrine, which forbids European governments to interfere with governments on this continent.

The United States WILL NOT ABANDON THE MONROE DOCTRINE.

Our President at Washington has pursued a policy thus far which may be compared with the conduct of an able-bodied gentleman who saw his neighbor beating his wife to death. The able-bodied gentleman shook his finger at the wife beater and said, "Naghty, naghty, you must stop that."

Mr. Wilson will get tired of shaking his finger after a while. He will realize that a murderous dictator and his gang are different from a class of sophomores.

Eventually the United States will be compelled to attend to its duty as self-appointed regulator of conditions on this continent.

In what way the United States will act can not be foretold at this moment.

It is suggested that the Mexicans in revolt against Huerta's criminal government be freely supplied with arms from our side of the line.

At present we do not permit arms and ammunition to be sent to the revolutionists from our territory. This rebellion against Huerta is crippled and he is kept in power because his opponents lack weapons to fight him.

If we should permit unlimited shipping of rifles, cannon and ammunition to Mexico, it is quite probable that the revolutionists would overthrow Huerta, the present dictator.

But these questions arise: What man would they put up in Huerta's stead and what would be his character?

And if we found it necessary to intervene and pacify Mexico, should we not feel rather foolish if our soldiers were shot at from houses tops and hill tops with guns sent in UNLIMITED QUANTITIES FROM THIS COUNTRY WITH OUR PERMISSION?

Inasmuch as we may have before long to send our own men to police and pacify Mexico, isn't it better to have as few arms in the hands of Mexicans as possible?

Another very important question is raised by President Wilson's quite solemn statement (which, of course, is binding only on Woodrow Wilson) that the United States would not take or conquer any more territory on this continent.

Of course Woodrow Wilson has no right whatever to bind the United States by any statement of that kind. He is the representative of the people, not THE CONSCIENCE of the people. And it is not for him or any other man to say that the United States shall not extend to Mexico and all the way down to our possessions in Panama the advantages of the United States government and partnership that have been extended to Texas, California and other regions outside of our ownership.

However, Mr. Wilson is President, and if we are obliged to send troops into Mexico during his term they will go to Mexico with the understanding that he will do what he can to arrange matters so that their fighting, their dangers and the death of many will do no particular good to this country or to anybody else.

What good would it do the United States to spend a few millions and sacrifice a few thousand American lives now to pacify Mexico for a little while?

Does anybody imagine that anything but actual ownership will permanently pacify the Mexican territory?

How would the soldiers feel if told, "You may go to Mexico and be shot, and then you can come home and some Mexican gun-tlemen will get the reward of your work and run the country?"


We are afraid that they would not feel very enthusiastic. Mexico and the Mexicans need, although many of them may not realize it, just exactly what the inhabitants of territory in Texas and California and elsewhere needed before they entered the Union.

Mexico needs stable government, partnership in the greatest nation on this continent, prosperity, schools, industries, equal rights for all, encouragement for agriculture—all these things and many others the United States could give to Mexico.

The high school boy who writes us will find it hard work to take the negative side of the question. "Shall the United States intervene in the Mexican Situation?" If you were a very big and powerful man living next door to a quarrelsome, murderous little individual, shooting, hanging and cutting throats every day, you would be bound in common decency to intervene and protect the weak.




