NEW YORK, Sept. 24--Because they shared with two young millionaires, Mrs. Edith Vincol and Mrs. Gertrude Sewell, eldest daughters of the Mayor Gaynor, were bequeathed only \$1,000 each in the will.

SMALL INTEREST IN FIGHT OVER CHARTER

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FINAL

BOHONES PLEASE DISCLOSE VOTE

Mayor's Attacks Apparently Failed to Arouse Interest It Was Expected They Would.

The slow voting in the charter election Wednesday set a new record in Atlanta. Up to 6 o'clock less than 2,000 votes had been cast in the whole city.

That there was little public interest in the charter was indicated by the small registration, but the lightness of the vote was a surprise to all. It was thought that Mayor Woodward's bitter charges against the chief supporters of the charter and the counter attacks would bring out a vote of at least 5,000.

Both sides professed to be cheerful of the outcome. Mayor Woodward once again expressed the opinion that if enough voters cast their ballots the substitute charter would be defeated.

A. H. Davis, secretary of the citizen committee, which has been handling the document, said he had no doubt the charter would pass.

Unbiased observers were rather inclined to think the measure would be defeated, although the lightness of the vote was generally considered to be greatly in favor of those supporting the charter.

Polls Close at 7 P. M.

The polls will be open twelve hours, closing at 7 o'clock Wednesday night. A majority of the votes cast and a majority of the registered voters, as has been rumored, is sufficient to carry the charter.

Besides the main issues two matters are to be voted upon separately. One is the reduction of Recorder Nash R. Brodie's maximum fine limit from \$500 to \$200, and the other is an initiative referendum and recall provision.

These issues were made separate by the Representatives in the General Assembly. The clause affecting the office of Recorder was added as something entirely new. The initiative, referendum and recall provision was included as a part of the main charter passed up to the Legislature by the City Council.

It is possible, in the election Wednesday, to defeat the new charter and attach both of these provisions to the present charter.

The interest among politicians generally is to get the charter adopted. The opposition has been conducted by Mayor Woodward almost alone. It will be interesting to note the power of organization methods against the appeal of a personality. The count of the ballots will be a true indication of public feeling toward Mayor Woodward's administration policies.

The difference in the campaigning methods of the two was strikingly illustrated at all of the polling places. There were a number of charter supporters at the voting precincts. Mayor Woodward's "good citizens" appeal, urging workers to station themselves at the polls and aid in the defeat of the charter, brought out few persons. The unorganized political

The warrant was sworn out by the district attorney, Mrs. Bertha Elliot, of Route 7, Simpson street, before Judge Bell at 11:30 a. m. Wednesday. It was identical with a warrant sworn out in Jacksonville, Fla., by Attorney Thomas a few minutes earlier by A. Deane, district attorney there.

The name of the person kidnaped was not mentioned in the warrant. It is understood at Denon, the daughter of Judge Elliot, is the girl who accompanied Elsie Elliot to Birmingham. The warrant was held by Chief of Detectives Newport Lanford, who did not attend.

Bond Fixed at \$300. Denon's bond was fixed at \$300 by Justice Davidson, and Denon expressed confidence of making it. The \$300 bond was fixed, Attorney Thomas will require the placing of a light bond.

When Judge Bell called the habeas corpus hearing, Chief Attorney Mayson announced that a warrant charging Denon with kidnaping had been sworn out a few minutes before, and he directed it to the court. Attorney Thomas demanded that the prisoner be granted his liberty, as there was no charge pending against him and the warrant had never been served.

Denon returned by the side of his lawyer until after the order granting him his freedom was read. He was escorted from the courtroom and Attorney Mayson and Chief Heaves entered from the courtroom and Thomas approached Deavers.

element does not respond in that way in ordinary elections. But the "wet pocket" voters may tell a different story from the talk around the voting precincts when the ballots are counted Wednesday night.

The election is proceeding in an unexpected quiet way, just as the campaigning before it was unmarked by any demonstrations. Nevertheless it is a very important election for Atlanta.

The issue is whether Atlanta is to approve the present form of city government and strengthen the bulwarks of the present controlling element, or clear the way in another campaign for a new form of government next year.

The most vital issue in the charter, perhaps, is the abolishment of the Police Commission and the creation of a Board of Public Safety to have control of both the fire and police departments. This might have a very significant effect on Police Chief Heavers except for the fact that the present Council includes the re-election of the members of the present Police Commission.

All city boards would be made stronger by the adoption of the new charter. The question in the election is whether the people of Atlanta want a well organized board system of government.

If the charter is adopted there will be a mad rush for places up until the elections by Council in January. Especially will this be true of the construction department board, which is a board to be created by the new charter to elect a chief of construction and have charge of all street and sewer work.

One of the most interesting things about the election is the work of the candidates for Council and their supporters. They are in evidence everywhere soliciting votes for the election which takes place next Tuesday. NEAL BANK WILL PAY A DIVIDEND NEXT MONTH

Depositors Will Be Given About Four Per Cent—Receivers Raise Money on Assets.

Neal Bank depositors will receive, between November 1 and 15, a dividend of 4 per cent of the amount they had in the institution the day it failed, December 23, 1930.

The Central Bank and Trust Corporation is winding up the affairs of the Neal Bank. It has collected from the assets of the defunct institution about \$10,000. There remains owing to depositors \$25,000.

"The depositor who had \$100 in the bank when it failed already has received \$40 and has \$25 still due. In November he will get \$125 of \$4," says A. P. Colby, vice president of the Central Bank.

Judge Peniston gave Monday for a statement of the condition of the Neal Bank. It was furnished to him. He has issued no formal order of court, but has intimated strongly that he desires a dividend paid and that he will issue an order by the date named. He thus notified our attorneys late Tuesday afternoon.

There are approximately 7,000 persons who were depositors in the Neal Bank. The last dividend to them, bringing the amount paid up to 3 1/2 per cent of their total claims, was paid in May, 1931.

Thompson, of Counsel Thompson & Hirsch, attorneys for the receivers, said:

"It is an expensive and laborious task to pay a dividend for the Neal Bank. It necessitates the writing of 7,000 checks and verification of every account. It costs so much that we intended to wait several months more when we hoped to pay a 10 per cent dividend. The amount still due to 25 per cent of the total. But depositors have been called for the report and asked us to pay what we can now.

"It is our policy to pay 5 1/2 or 6 per cent of the amount of the deposit, and to pay so small a dividend that the demands of the depositors show clearly that they prefer this small amount now, in spite of the expense, to waiting for a larger amount later.

Total deposits of the Neal Bank when it failed were approximately \$2,000,000, out of total liabilities of \$2,000,000.

City Savings Likely To Pay Dividend Soon.

Depositors in the City Savings Bank may expect a dividend within 30 days, according to L. F. McChesland.

"Preparations now are being made to submit a statement of condition to the judges," said Mr. McChesland Wednesday. "Collections have been made as needed for and the bank has no outward delay in making the first payment."

The City Savings, though solvent, closed the doors, and the depositors of a "run" by alarmed depositors.

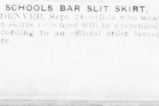
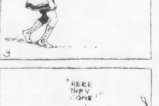

Neal Bank Depositors will receive between November 1 and 15, a dividend of 2 1/2 or 4 per cent of the amount they had in the institution the day it failed, December 23, 1930.

Judge Pennington asked Monday for a statement of the condition of the Neal Bank. It was furnished to him. He has issued no formal order of court, but has indicated strongly that he desires a dividend paid and that he will issue an order by the date named.

There are approximately 2,000 persons who were depositors in the Neal Bank. The last dividend to them, bringing the amount paid up to 64 per cent of their total claims was paid in May, 1931.

Thompson, of Counsel Thompson & Hirsch, attorneys for the receivers said: "It is an expensive and laborious task to pay a dividend for the Neal Bank. It necessitates the writing of 2,000 checks and careful verification of every account. It costs no more than we anticipated, but it will take several months more when we expect to pay a 10 per cent dividend on the amount which will be due to 25 per cent of the total."

WAY IS FOUND TO PROVE HUMAN BLOODSTAIN

Dr. John B. Murphy, of Chicago, Announces Discovery Important in Crime Detection.

CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—The discovery of a method as accredited to detection, may receive a setback as a result of a discovery in medical science...

It is a process by which it may be determined positively whether a bloodstain is human or from one of the lower animals.

The old way of determining whether bloodstains were human was by an examination of the stain under a microscope.

In the case now of the chimpanzee, the precipitate would come within 13 per cent of the human, while in the case of an ordinary monkey the percentage would be much lower.

Cancer Study Advanced. In the opinion of Dr. Murphy the most important matter before the congress had to do with the cancer problem.

"The problem was discussed by an Italian, a German and a Frenchman," he said. "Let it be understood that it is purely a scientific research into the cancer of mice, and has nothing to do with the cancer of humans as yet at any rate, except by analogy."

It was shown that cancer in the Japanese guinea pig is capable of transplantation in mice of the same breed in nearly 100 per cent of the cases used in experiments.

First Case of Impunity. "Then they crossed the Japanese and French mice and they could not infect a single one of the resulting mice with the disease."

"That," asserted the doctor, "is probably the first instance of immunity as a result of cross-breeding—or, for that matter, as a result of anything, and it lends a great hope in connection with the study of the cancer problem of humans."

Dr. Murphy spoke enthusiastically of the discussions of disease resulting from the mice, and of the wide publicity given the discussion by the English press.

As a result of this phase of the congress, Sir Malcolm Morris, at a meeting in Chicago, surgeon, President of the British Empire, stated that he had been called by the Government to investigate such diseases for the benefit, chiefly, of innocent victims.

Court to Find Jobs For Underpaid Girls. CHICAGO, Sept. 23.—Girls who are underpaid were asked to come to Municipal Judge Hopkins to-day and obtain a new job at which they could earn enough money to live on.

The judge, through the probation department, announced the organization of an employment bureau. Every firm in the city employing more than 25 for girl workers was asked to keep the court informed whenever vacancies existed.

GEORGIA BANKERS ASK CHANGE IN MONEY BILL

State's Delegation in Congress Besought to Work for Nine Important Amendments.

Georgia Representatives and Senators are doing to get great baskets full of letters which the next few weeks, wanting to combine them into the wisdom of the changes the banks are sending to the Owen-Glass currency bill now before Congress.

A conference of the American Bankers Association in Chicago suggested important changes in the currency bill and named a committee to draft the bill. A committee also was named to look into the views of the bankers in the Senate committee which had the bill in hand.

R. P. Maddox, who attended the conference in Chicago and spoke before the Senate committee, with Joseph A. McGowan, its minority commission of the A. B. A., appeared before the executive committee of the Georgia Bankers' Association at Macon Tuesday. They explained the situation, and the Georgia body took their view of it.

Resolutions were adopted endorsing the stand of the national body, and each bank in Georgia is asked to write to Georgia Congressmen asking their assistance in getting the desired amendments.

The resolutions recall that the bankers realize the need of a currency bill and see good features in the present measure, but that they have certain proposals in addition to serve to keep some national bank from participating in the regional reserve banks and certain will not make the plan sufficiently attractive to get State banks co-operation.

The proposals include: 1. That the circulating currency of the regional reserve banks be redeemed in gold; 2. That the regional reserve banks be required to subscribe only 10 per cent of their capital; 3. That the banks throughout the country who are expected to subscribe the entire amount of the Federal reserve banks be permitted to make a voluntary contribution to the Federal reserve fund.

That the part of the currency bill which provides for the withdrawal of the regional reserve banks from circulation be amended; 4. That the regional reserve banks be required to subscribe only 10 per cent of their capital; 5.
