





The citizens of the country know that he has been kept in the insane asylum—although he is not insane—through the efforts of the friends of Stanford White, who was about the vilest product of degradation that could possibly be conceived.

The people like fair play in New Hampshire, in New York, and in every State in the Union.

That is why in every State, if the matter were left to a public vote, Thaw would be set free.

This newspaper considers the case AS IT STANDS TO-DAY.

Thaw was declared insane by a jury that would not vote to execute him for having killed Stanford White.

The law says that a man who commits a crime and is declared insane shall be kept locked up unless his sanity returns. As soon as he is sane he is to be set free.

Only the friends of Stanford White, a few newspapers that sympathize with White, and some specialists, especially paid, declare that Thew is insane.

He will have his day in court, and will probably not be sent back to life imprisonment in an insane asylum for having killed Stanford White, whose death certainly saved from shame, degradation and horror many helpless girls.

No civilized human being would plead the unwritten law, or put the right of an individual taking justice into his own hands above the law.

And any same man who commits a murder for whatever reason should be punished for murder. Yet, if ever there was a killing that was justified, it was the killing of Stanford MULAND, HIS MOST INTIMATE FRIENDS KNOW THAT THAT
