Refuge Ships to be Neutral?

WASHIGTON, Aug. 15.—The United States government has notified the powers of Europe that it will regard as neutral "ships chartered for the sole purpose of repatriating American citizens stranded in Europe," and has asked the beligerent governments for The announcement follows:

"The state department has issued instructions to its diplomatic representatives in Europe to notify the different governments to which they are accredited that this government will regard ships chartered for the sole purpose of repatriating its citizens who are now stranded in Europe, due to the lack of transportation facilities resulting from the war, as neutral lines under the principles of international law and in 1907, having to do with the rights of capture in naval warfare of neutralized vessels that are charged with a philanthropic mission. The different European governments have been asked for declarations to this effect."

In this card the amazing statement is made that "There was no inspection law then in force to protect" the farmers of this State.

This statement is untrue. By the Act of 1874 it was made unlawful to sell or offer for sale in this State any fertilizer before the same had been inspected and analyzed.

By the Act of 1877 all fertilizers were required to be branded with the true analysis thereof. It was made a misdemeanor for any person to offer for sale or distribution in this State fertilizers without having a brand or tag attached showing the analysis thereof.

This analysis was made a guaranty by the manufacturer or seller that the fertilizer contained the ingredients indicated thereby and the percentages thereof therein named.

Without explanation this charge is calculated to injure Judge Harris. In 1881 there was an acute depression and panic in this country. There were no banks then in the rural districts. Farmers had to pay 8 per cent interest and 20 per cent commissions in order to obtain loans, making the money cost them 28 per cent per annum; and it was almost impossible to get money even at these exorbitant rates. It was thought that the farmers would be enabled to get money at a cost not to exceed 12 per cent, if the rate of interest was fixed at that percentage. With this end in view, Judge Harris introduced and voted for the bill mentioned in this card.

His purpose was not to injure the farmers, but to enable them to get money at a cheaper rate of interest than they were then paying.





No Cause for Pessimism.

In this time of world stress and tumult, the people of the United States have peculiar cause for thank of the United States have peculiar cause for inami-fulness and fath. Though their interests cannot escape the first shock of Europe's wast war, they are grantle proof against further peril or barm. Far re-moved from the struggie across the sea, their indus-tries will go forward undisturbed; their soil will con-tinue to yield its bounty and factories to turn out rich merchandise. Indeed, the United States stands oday as the only great nation whose natural resource and productive enterprise are free to serve the needs of the world; and since Europe's millions must stil be fed and clothed, the adversity of foreign lands, lamentable as it is, becomes the opportunity of American. "From the nettle danger we pluck the flower, safety.

Had these conditions befallen some years ago be-fore our financial system was reorganized upon a sound and scientific basis, we should have reason for But happily the new Banking and Currenc ted betimes and the safeguards it Dro vides against panics, the means and agencies it offer for business assurance, will soon be in actual opera We now have an abundance of monetary re es and furthermore these resources can be selized as to meet particular and extraordinary de mands. In the very outset, then, we are forearmed against financial injury from the European crisis.

In addition to this, plans are swiftly maturing for the development of an American merchant marine whereby our products can be carried to the eager Old World markets, and our commerce continue un-checked. In response to President Wilson's appeal, the House and the Senate have passed a shipping bill removing the drastic restrictions that have preonly removing the unastic restrictions that have pre-wonted the registry of hundreds of merchant vessels under the American flag. Minor differences between the measure as it passed the House and later the Schate must be adjusted, but that is a simple matter; and in the near future there will be ships aplenty to keep open the lines of trade between the United States and Europe. Nothing short of the destruction of Great Britain's

navy can close the markets of England or of her allies to American commerce. Daring and aggressive though Germany is on land she will scarcely venture a test with the enemy at sea. It seems evident that a test with the eleminy at seems evident that the German fleet is hugging its own shores as closely as possible; and the probability is that it will remain hemmed in or in the event of a decisive battle be crushed. The ports of England and France, Russia, Holland and neutral nations will thus be open to American trade. Liverpool will continue receiving cotton, and the demand for our food products will be almost Europewide

It is noteworthy that England's wars have never interfered with her cotton manufactures. The British mbassy at Washington states that sixty per cent of England's cotton mill operatives are women and that there will be no dearth of labor in this industry. A large part of the South's cotton crop is sold to England; it is estimated that at least three-fourths of the usual crop will find a ready demand in the mills of that country and those of Canada and the United States. Indeed the only serious problem in this connection has been that of means to transport our products; and plans for an adequate merchant

The South has especial reason for assurance and The movement initiated by Senator Hoke Smith to protect cotton interests in the war crisis is swiftly approaching success. Legislative measures to this end have been introduced, with every promistion. The national Government may be counted give financial aid in carrying the cotton sur plus and to provide means for reaching foreign

But the ecofomic conditions and resources of this country are sound. We are buttressed with a banking and currency system that is fully sufficient to financial needs. We are blest with the most abundant food harvest America We are at peace with all nations; and when the Old World Powers end their struggle, bleed ing and forspent, our strength and treasure will be unimpaired. Business may well go its ways unalarmed, and face the future with courage

What Good Roads

Means to Farmers.

Particularly striking evidence of what good roads Particularly striking evidence of want good roads mean to farming interests is furnished by a report from the United States Department of Agriculture on the result of highway improvements in Spottsylvania county, Virginia. In 1909, it seems, the citizens of that county voted a bond issue of a hundred thou sand dollars to build and maintain forty miles of firstclass road. Two years later the shipment of agricultural products from Fredericksburg, county seat, amounted to seventy-one thousand tons for the twelvemonth, as compared with an annual average of only forty-nine thousand tons before the highways were improved. This gain of more than forty-five per cent in the community's agricultural exports within a period of two years is ascribable chiefly to the increased facilities and cheapened cost

of hauling which good roads made possible.

In every field of activity the county has produced more and has sold more since the highway bonds were issued and applied. Dairy products, for exwere issued and applied. Daily produces, for sample, increased from one hundred and fourteen thousand pounds in 1909 to two hundred and seventy-three thousand pounds in 1911, an advance of one hundred and forty per cent. Wheat increased fifty-nine per cent, tobacco thirty-one per cent, forest products forty-eight per cent. Of peculiar importance is the fact that within

this period the expense of wagon transportation was reduced as steadily and rapidly as the volume transports was enlarged. Experts of the Departm of Agriculture found that before the forty miles of improved road were built the average cost of haul ing was twenty cents per ton-mile, and that after the improvements were made this cost fell to twelve cents per ton-mile. This saving of eight cents, when cents per ton-mile. This saving of eight cents, when applied to the bulk of the county's outgoing products, represents an annual economy of forty-one thousand dollars. Thus the county's original Investment of one hundred thousand dollars for better roads is yleiding an annual dividend of forty per cent. Communiting on this result, the Courier-Journal aptly

As an example the experts of the Department of Agriculture, because the fact that in another Virginia county, Dinwiddle, where peanuts are one of the staple crops the average load for two mules on a main road was about 1,000 pounds before the road was improved. After its improvement the average load was found to be 2,000 pounds, and the time consumed in bauling the larger load to make the was much reduced. This is the explanation of the extraordinary rise in the total output of agricultural products in a county with a good road system.

What good roads have done for farming interests in Spottsylvania county. Virginia, they have done, and will do, for hundreds of other counties the nation over. They stimulate production, increase land values, give rural districts advantages comparable to those enloyed by cittes, they enable the farmer to reach markets more quickly and more easily and thereby increase the net value of his cropps.

It is estimated that the cost of wagon transportation in the United States amounts to some eight hundred million dollars a year. The average cost of hanling by wagon in the United States is approximately twenty-dive cents per ton-mile whereas in countries like France and England where the development of public highways has been carried almost to perfection, this cost is only the cents per ton-mile.
