Still another plan, and one that is fundamental to all remedies that are suggested, calls for a cur-Ilment of next year's cotton production, by mean State legislation to restrict the acreage plante lation to restrict the acreage planted in the spring.

Each of these plans is admirable, each if put int effect will do a vast amount of good, but this fact must be noted: If either or both of the first two plane succeeds, acreage reduction will still be neces-sary; and if either or both of the first two plans fails, acreage reduction toll still bring relief and ulti-mately solve the problem. It is, therefore, supremely important that the Legislatures of the cotton States be called into extraordinary session to enact laws ing a fifty per cent reduction of the 1915

Upon such action, depends the complete and per manent benefit of both Government aid and banking aid. It is earnestly to be hoped that the vigorous efforts of Southern Senators and Congressmen will succeed, but it must be remembered that the cotton States represent less than one-fourth of the Union, and that it is extremely difficult to awing the other three-fourths to our particular point of view. It is earnestly to be hoped that the St. Louis plan will materialize, and there is good reason to believe that it will. Certainly, it should have the prompt and generous support of all Southern interests, for it provides feasible and far-reaching means of relief. But it matters not how much cotton may be retired by the Government, nor how cotton can be ware housed through a special loan fund, unless next year's production is rigidly cut down we shall face twelve months hence the same crisis which confronts

today.

If on the other hand a rigid reduction of the 1915 crop is guaranteed, and it can be guaranteed only through binding legislation, the present price of cotton will instantly rise and the future of cotton will

The War Outlook.

The fall of Antwerp brings Germany her greadvantage thus far, and the Allies their greatest re advantage thus far, and the Aries their greatest re-verse; but by no means is it an oracle of ultimate victory or defeat. It indicates a prolonged war and demands redoubled exertion of Great Britain and her co-mates in arms, but it is far from a decisive event. Even if the Kaiser's forces, making the most of their opportunity, press on to Ostend and other Channel ports, the struggle will be scarcely nearer an end than that in 1804 when Napoleon m my at Boulogne, opposite the shores of England the purpose of invading the island kingdom. "The military value to the Germans of the cap

ture of Antwerp is best measured," says a thoughtful observer, "If we think of what would have happened had the Allies succeeded in preventing its capture, or in raising the siege. Then they would have been in a position gravely to menace Brussels and the German communications in Belgium. It would have been hailed as necessitating the retirement of the Kaiser's forces from France, as well it might have, and the Allies would have cheered it as indicating the beginning of the end of one war on anything en cept German ground." To have lost the chance of so far-reaching an achievement is within itself a heavy misfortune to the Allies. Germany now has a base in Belgium on which its forces can fall back and offer telling resistance if they are beaten out of France. Furthermore, Germany can now release for rance. Carver, of Harvard University, declared some time before the city's fall: "It is as clear as anything concerning the war can possibly be that Antwerp is Germany's main objective," and he added in explanation:

"Antwerp is one of the three or four greatest shipping ports in the world. Eastern Belgium, when it becomes German territory, will give complete control of the railway lines between that port and the rest of Germany. Germany will then be on three sides of Holland, which her publicists, especially those who were in special favor with the watser, like the late Profess Halle, have openly stated should belong to Germany. It will then be only a question of time until Holland and the mouths of the 'German Rhine' will become a part of the German empire. Again, let him look at southeastern Europe. A union with Austria to control the Balkan States and Asia Minor would give her an all-rail route from the North Sea ports, via her Bagdad rail-way, to the Persian guif. Even the English navy could then hardly cut her communication with the East."

But when the utmost importance of Belgi tured stronghold is granted, it is still far from evi-dent that the Kalser has the key to the situation. Napoleon apoke of Antwerp as a pistol pointed at the heart of England, but never yet has the pistol been fired. Even were Germany's warships free for action, instead of being in blockade, they could not use Antwerp as a naval base except by passing through waters which neutral Hodland controls. True, the neutrality of Holland might impress Germany as little as did the neutrality of Belgium, if it stood in the way of a campaign plan. But it is noteworthy that thus far Berlin has treated The Hague with the pink of courtesy, and that Holland declares she will enforce her neutrality even at the cost of cutting her dikes. In ordinary ch imatances, Holland would not be an especially formidable foe, but the Kaiser would think well before driving her to the suppor

of the Allies at the present juncture of affairs.

The fact is, however, that the German navy is now almost negligible so far as aggressive action or cooperation with land forces is concerned; and without s navy. Germany will find Antwern, or for that matter any port along the Belgian or French coast, of scant usefulness as a base against England. An airship An airship raid might prove spectacular enough and might inflet serious damage to property, but airships are un-der the necessity of either hurrying home or falling victim to the enemy; they cannot win or hold an

It has been suggested that with Ostend and other It has been suggested that with Ostend and other points opposite the coast of England in their posse-sion, the Kaiser's forces could oring their giant guns into action and dominate the English Channel in spite of all the British pays could do. This is spite of all the British navy could do. This is rather a far-reaching, if not imaginative supposition, but conceding it to be possible, conceding that British merchant ships and transports as well as warships could be utterly routed from the Channel, the British kingdom would still have ample ports of communica-tion with its allies and with the world at large. Not until the British Isles are surrounded by an enemy, can their people be starved out or hemmed in. And not until Great Britain is completely done for can her enemy win this war.

Napoleon had an army at Boulogne in 1804, he Napoieca nad an army at Boulogae in 1894, he had transport in abundance and he had the support of an untrammeled navy; but he never got across the twenty miles of salt water. Austriltz made Napoleon master of the entire Continent, and having failed to take England by sea, he uttered his famous dictum, "I will conquer the sea by land." And for nine years he strove with all his genius to do so, but at the end he was on St. Helena.

The fall of Antwerp, and its probable cons mean much to German arms; it means, perhaps, a long drawn out war. But it must be remembered that the line of the Allies still stands, that the great slege guns which are fatal to a fortress are not effective in the field, that the sens are closed to Germany and open to the Allies. It must be remembered that the Kaiser's march upon Paris, when his need of a swift, decisive stroke was manifest and when he had every reason to hurl forward the best of his troops, was checked and forced back. The Allies were then evidently at their weakest; now they are battle-hardened. It must be femembered, too, that Grat Britain is flighting for her very existence, that her leaders are reconciled to a long war, and are preparing for it with all the resources and all the resolution of the greatest empire the world has known.

Ah, that the war could be decided as quickly, as delively and as bloodlessly as the world's series.




