The World-Praise of The Daring Emden.

The world is still ringing with praise of the prayery and daring of the heroic crew of the Emden, the German cruiser, which after an amazing record of damage to the shipping of its enemies was run ashore and destroyed by the Australian cruiser Syd-ney on Cocos island in the Indian ocean.

And none are more generous in acclaim of the And none are more generous in accessm or the wonderful exploits of the German ship than its former enemies—the sweetest of praise always to the warrior whether he win or lose. The British press choes with expressions of admiration at the gallantry of the intrepid raider and the British ad miralty has issued orders that the captured crew be accorded all the honors of war and that the Emden's captain, Karl von Muller, and the other officers be allowed to retain their swords.

At which all the world says, "Finely done." For tree months the Emden darted here and there about the Indian ocean preying upon British shipping. Though it is said that a total of seventy ships of the navies of England, France, Japan and Russia were after her, she escaped them all until her final ensince net, she escaped them all until her final en-counter with the Sydney. She destroyed a known total of twenty-two vessels. The majority of these were merchantmen though the Emden had the de-struction of a number of war vessels to her credit. The grand total of her victims is estimated at forty-two.

There is nothing comparable in payal history to the exploits of the Emden except the record of the fimous Confederate raider, Alabama, commanded by Captain Raphael Semmes. In the two years that the Alabama roamed the seas it captured sixty five vessels, which together with their cargoes were valued at four million dollars. The value of the known ves-sels destroyed by the Emden in its three months of activity is placed at four million dollars and the value of their cargoes at sixteen million.

Captain Semmes and his crew were der Captain Semmes and his crew were denounced as pirates but history has accorded them a front piace in the naval heroism of the world, for like men of the Emden they were rendering their utmost of serv-ice to their country in doing all the harm possible to the commerce of its enemies

The career of the Emden bespeaks not only the roism of the German navy, but also its thorough ness, its efficiency and its complete grasp of the naval advantages which it enjoys and the difficulties i faces in the present struggle






