

**COTTON FOR JAPAN IS
SHIPPED THROUGH CANAL**

Saved \$5,060 on the

Trip
WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—Traffic which Panama canal officials believed today would develop high importance recently was inaugurated when the steamer Penrith Castle, Galveston to

Okonahama, laden with 3,210 bales of cotton, passed out into the Pacific. By use of the canal the steamer saved 5,180 nautical miles. The canal record estimated the time saved at 23 days or 5,060 on the outward voyage alone. Bills amounting to more than \$4,000 were paid by the steamer, but similar charges would have been levied had she gone via the Suex canal, and the money saved is net gain to the owners. What-

Since cotton exported to Japan in 1918 was valued at \$32,573,054 and predictions are for an increased business with that country in 1914, officials believe the saving to carriers by the Panama way will insure the routing of the entire shipment hereafter through

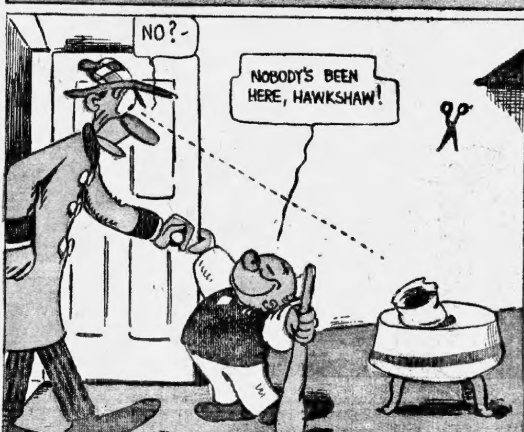
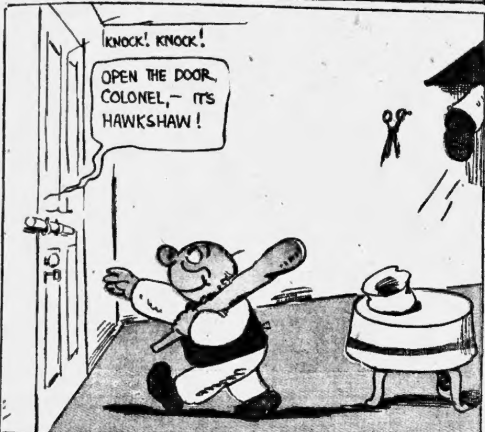
