DR. CHAPMAN PREACHES ON THE HOLY SPIRIT

Large Audience Hears Inspiring Sermon at Tabernacle Tuesday Afternoon

In spite of inclement weather a large audience attended the afternoon services of the Chapman-Alexander revival Tuesday and was rewarded with a fine sermon by Dr. Chapman on the subject of the Holy Spirit.

The text was taken from the second verse of the nineteenth chapter of Acts: "Have you received the Holy Spirit since you believed?"

Spiritual power in the daily religious life was Dr. Chapman's theme, and in the development of his argument he showed that simple acceptance of Christ is not sufficient, that every avenue of one's nature must be thrown open for the spirit to enter and abide.

The sermon followed: "This is one of the most important questions which can be put to a Christian. The revised version makes the text read: 'Did you receive the Holy Spirit when you believed?'"

It is a matter of small importance to me whether you take the authorized version or the revised. The question is: 'Are you living today as God would have you?'"

Are you a spirit-filled life?—are you consistent in your honesty—your place of business and with your friends?—

CAN GOD TRUST YOU?—are you in such a position with God that he could trust you with His power? I asked the question of the text one day in a professor in one of the western universities, and he told me first that he did not know what I meant by it, but after I had explained he went away and came back later to say that he had used the complete surrender, and that he had been the means of leading sixty of his students to Christ. Some years later I heard that all of those students had set their faces either toward the ministry or the mission field.

I am not talking to you about sinlessness. Regeneration does not mean the eradication of the old nature, but the implanting of a new one. Paul describes the warring of the two:—'I am living a worldly life, if I am selfish

and incontinent, my fleshly nature is in the ascendancy. If I have received the Holy Ghost into my life, the spiritual nature has power. What power?—that is the yielding of one's self to God. When I accept Christ, as my Savior I am saved, but when I then open every door of my nature for Him to come in and abide, when I place Him on the throne, then the spirit of God comes in and I am in possession of His power.

God is no respecter of persons in the matter of the bestowment of His power. He says when God wants the best of those who desire it, when I place Him in the bluest blood throne, when He is seeking the one with the highest social position, the surrender of fifty such women, the surrender of fifty such women, that He wants the women also who stand at the capitol or in the social life, the woman who feels the pinch of poverty, whose shoulders are bent with many burdens, who has aged before her time because of care, He wants her that he may work through her for her household, and, as a matter of fact, the greatest ministers, the greatest statesmen, and the greatest leaders of men have not, without exception, come from such homes.

I think I know the reason why we have not received the Holy Ghost for some clear command. God called us to the mission field, to the Sunday school, to some special effort in His behalf, and we said, 'No,' and man's 'No' is always a barrier to the bestowment of God's power. Or it may be that we are not right with our fellowmen. You cannot have a difference with another and not make it right. You cannot be inconsistent and not confess it. You cannot be sinful and not repent of it without lifting the barrier in the way of working out of God's will in your life. Or it may be that we have not confessed our sins.

CONFESSED HIS SIN. I know of a man who took \$100 from the cash box expecting to pay it back again, kept it for twelve years, prospered in a business way, but had no spiritual power. One day he confessed his sin and restored the stolen money with compound interest, and immediately he and his entire class for Christ. All of his children came into the kingdom and he became a marvel of spiritual blessing to others. If we should receive the Holy Ghost the work in this city would move forward with a bound, would be won to Jesus Christ, they would come to his own household. Those who are in the world, who are concerned would be seeking Christ for themselves.

The Bible would become a new book. It is not possible to be as God would have us as Christians, if we are neglectful of the Bible. A great change would come into our lives. The 'Blue-Bird'—the name of the means of the conversation of the slim girl in New York City known as 'Blue-Bird.' She found her in the 'violet' den of intimacy in the city, gave her a pink robe and a blue hat, and she said, 'Isn't you like to come to her own home if she needed help.' The girl came. The servant refused to admit her. She was still waiting outside the door when my friend returned. 'Please,' she said, 'Isn't you like to come to her own home if she needed help.' My friend, a delicate, refined woman, stopped down and kissed her, carried her into the house, bathed her with her own hands, put her in her daughter's bed and led her to Christ. She became one of the mightiest spiritual forces among women in our city, and when she died, a short time afterward, she had led sixty girls like herself to Christ, and they tell her story still in our city, blessing God for the change wrought, the same change which might come to many of us, did we but open our lives fully to Christ.

MAN WANTED HERE GIVEN TERM IN S. C.

The Fulton county sheriff's office was notified Tuesday morning by the county authorities of Charleston, S. C., that Frank R. Nolan, a young man wanted in Atlanta on two warrants charging forgery, and located in Charleston some weeks ago, has been tried in that city on the same charge, found guilty, and sentenced to serve ten years in the south Carolina state penitentiary. On completion of his term Nolan will find the Fulton authorities waiting for him, to bring him back here to answer the local warrants.
