





Organizer of Railroad Employees Says Men Were Discharged in Wholesale Lots

WASHINGTON, May 15.—W. H. Pierce, organizer of the Federated Railroad Employees union, today told the federal industrial relations commission that his efforts to organize Pennsylvania shophmen at Altoona, Pa., were frustrated by the wholesale discharge of men in wholesale lots who joined the union. "I do not say that the Pennsylvania railroad officials to 5 or 10 per cent of their men being organized," he said, "but when the organization shows great strength the company sets its machine in motion to wipe them out of existence. Our organization is still in existence, but the railroad company has almost swept me out of my clothes."  
The Pennsylvania is opposed to widespread organization of shophmen for two reasons. First, because they would have to pay them more money, and second, because they are against the transportation men when they would pay more money.  
At Altoona, Pierce asserted, the Pennsylvania used the clergy, board of trade and citizens generally to break up the shophmen's union.  
The witness severely criticized W. G. Lee, president of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen, for his part in the 1916 shophmen's strike.  
"W. G. Lee, president of the trainmen—I should call him brother, but I don't because of a discharge," said Pierce, "came to Harrisburg and addressed a joint meeting of shophmen and transportation men. Mr. Lee said to the shophmen: 'If the Pennsylvania railroad discharged one of the shophmen or joining the union, we have \$500,000 treasury and will use every dollar and every man against the railroad if they discharge these shophmen.' Mr. Lee's own hand was on his chest and he said 'I will go with you.' I tried to prevent the strike, but the trainmen said 'Strike and we'll go with you,' and strike they did. That the trainmen didn't strike was their loss."  
"If ever a man was guilty of high treason against his fellow men, it was W. G. Lee. He is the cause of suicides, great loss of property and the breaking up of homes."  
S. C. Long, general manager of the Pennsylvania, reiterated statements made yesterday by Vice President Albert. "From the creation of the corporation in connection with this entire territory," he said, "it is in our policy to keep the personal ambition of W. H. Pierce to create an organization, of which he would be the head, rather than from any actual difference between the company and its employees."

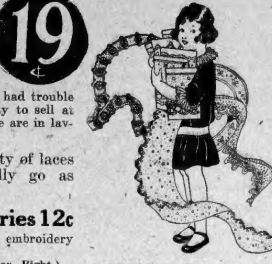

"The Belgians' Relief," Filmed in Atlanta, to Be Seen at Lyric This Week

Outside the appeal that it makes because it was filmed in Atlanta and will be shown for the benefit of the commission, "The Belgians' Relief," which will be seen publicly for the first time here Thursday night, is a photoplay that matches the best of war dramas produced by any screen company.

But had you entered in the middle of the performance you would never have thought it was taken in Atlanta. A squadron of cavalry dashes at top speed down a steep hill, guns thunder, the smoke of battle rolls, men fall and die.

It looks like real war stuff, but it was filmed at Piedmont park. The soldiers are members of the Fifth regiment, the trenches dug in the hills behind the park, the cavalry charge along the bridge path. But the scenes look genuine. They are full of action, and the producer, the members of the Fifth and everybody who took part are to be congratulated.

"The Belgians' Relief" will make a wide appeal, as all the scenes are not confined to Atlanta. Several were taken at Charleston and show the sailing of the relief ship and Governor Manning making a speech.

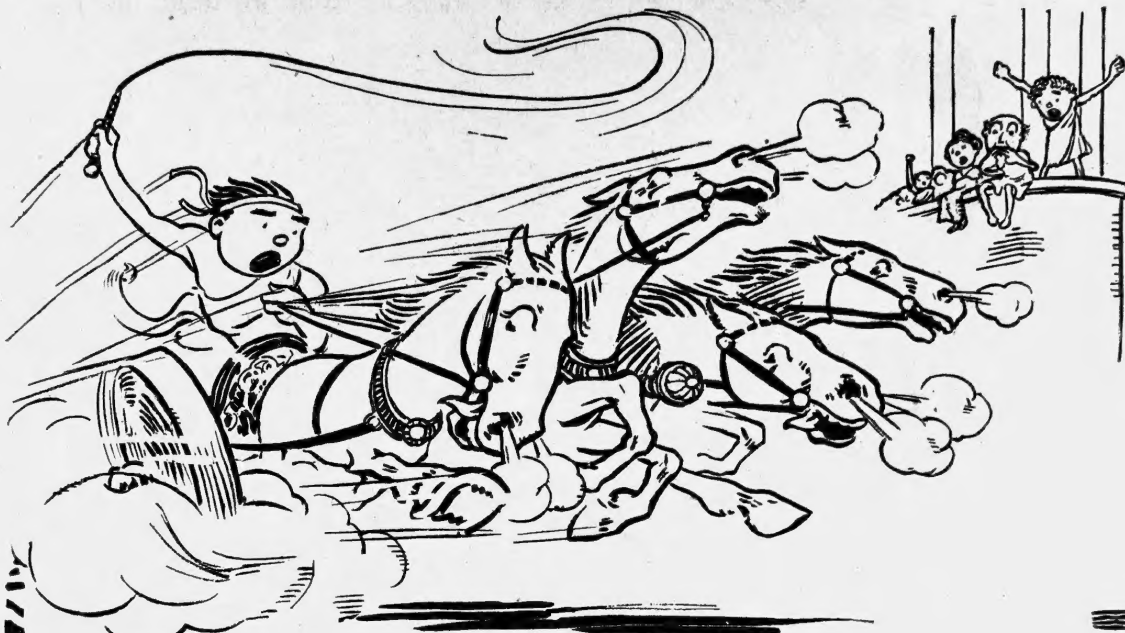
The movement for the building of a municipal golf course in some of the city parks is constantly gaining impetus.

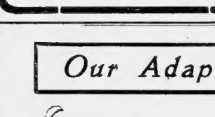

MAYOR AND CHAMBERS WAGE WAR OF WORDS

Each Again Denounces the Other in Second Statement of Their Controversy

A war of words is going merrierly along since Mayor Woodward referred to Aldine Chambers, his one-time opponent for mayor, as a sort of infelicitous power behind a curtain, working well in the interest of a brick manufacturing concern.

The mayor in a second statement of his contempt for Mr. Chambers and the latter, also in a second statement, declares the mayor has not advanced a progressive idea since he was inaugurated, and that his conduct has set the progress of the city back for a generation.

Mr. Chambers says the mayor is claiming sole credit for initiating the Liverpool fair project, when, as a matter of fact, he, Chambers, and three newspaper reporters, while talking to the secretary of Mayor Winn in 1912, originated the idea and secured for it the approval and co-operation of Mayor Winn.

"What little the city government has accomplished in the way of advancement during Mayor Woodward's administration has been accomplished by the city council over his veto," says Mr. Chambers.

In his dealing with council Mr. Chambers says the mayor has pursued the tactics of a brutal convict, concluding a vitriolic card, Mr. Chambers says.

In the present administration, like all of his previous administrations, will go on record not for construction but for destruction, not for achievement, but for failure; not for progress, but for ill feeling; not for good feeling, but for ill feeling; not as an era in which the people were helped, but as an era in which the people were hindered and held back.

"Worst of all, the mayor stands today just where he has always stood in private life and in public life, not as a champion of civic righteousness, but as the friend and refuge of lawlessness and vice, not of a type of the clean, moral, God-fearing citizenship which has made this community what it is, but as the defender and champion of the forces of the underworld; not as a bulwark of law enforcement, but as an avowed and unblinking advocate of 'wide open town'."

In his second statement Mayor Woodward deals briefly with Mr. Chambers, saying:

"I have too much contempt for Aldine Chambers and too little respect for his methods to engage in any controversy with a man of his caliber. The people know him well, since he repudiated him for mayor in 1912. They can also determine for themselves the veracity of Chambers and myself.

"In the statements that were accredited to me, authors were alive and records cited and I believe the men who gave me the information told the absolute truth. I further say that I will take their simple word before I would believe Aldine Chambers on oath. It is an old saying that God Almighty put a mark on every man's face denoting his character and he certainly put one on Aldine Chambers that no one may be deceived as to what manner of man he is. If anyone cares enough about him, let them investigate what practice he has where he gets his money, and where he puts in his time.

"With this I dismiss him not caring to exchange any further words with him."

Hints on Embroidery By Kathryn Mutterer (OF THE EMBROIDERY DEPT., VICTORIA REVIEW) Charting New Borders for Frocks and Linens

Borders have taken on a new importance this season because their sphere of usefulness has been widely increased. Not only are they in demand for the small accessories of the toilet, such as cuffs, collars, fichus, etc., but they are likewise used to embellish skirts (upper and under) and are legion.

A smart wrap in one of the fashionable centers features embroidered novelties and is showing a lovely afternoon frock in Havana brown chiffon tulle. It has a petalled skirt of unusual attractiveness, and which is sure to find favor with women of slender figure. The skirts are composed of rows of material, and the scallops are worked with buttonhole embroidery. The embroidery is so simple that anyone who has any knowledge at all of needlework can easily duplicate it.

The design of the scallop is worthy of particular mention because, in spite of its simplicity it exploits an exceedingly novel idea in edge finishes. The lower line of the border is shaped in a point, not too fine to be easily handled or made bulky in the working, and the upper edge is as original in its outline as the lower. Instead of the customary scallop, which is sometimes filled in with French knots or satin dots, there rises from upper edge of the scallop a little cone-shaped figure, surmounted by three circles of graduated size that can be worked with eyelet embroidery or so-called Mrs. Chamberlain's eyelets.

The embroidery pattern illustrated and described herein, together with 400 others covering all possible uses, are included in the "Innovative Embroidery Pattern Outfit" now being presented by this newspaper, as explained elsewhere in these columns.

The buttonhole stitch was used to develop the lower edge of the scallop, for this is the most important of all bordering stitches. It is used to cover scallops, plain and fancy, as well as for many other purposes. To cover a plain scallop such as is employed on the design in question, the space to be worked is first marked. There are several methods used for padding surfaces that are to be raised, but for all usual purposes the chain stitch made in rows, placed close together side by side, is the easiest way to raise any surface that is to be covered with buttonhole stitch.

First make a row of the chain stitches just inside the lower stamped outline of the scallop, then follow the stamped line of the scallop with this stitch. A second row is then placed close to the first row, this being repeated until the last row is placed just below the upper stamped line of the scallop.

The actual covering of the scallop is accomplished by bringing the needle to the surface of the material



posses. Here is a simple method for developing the stitch. Bring the needle up on the end of the scallop, throw the thread to form a loop, as for buttonhole stitch, set the needle for a back stitch, inserting it in the material near the point where it was brought to the surface of the material. Bring the point of the needle out inside of the loop formed by the thread and pull the needle through. For the second chain stitch throw the thread in a loop to the right and repeat directions.

GOVERNOR SIGNS NEW FLORIDA LIQUOR BILL

After Sept. 1915 Whisky Can Be Sold Only in Sealed Packages

(By Associated Press.) TALLAHASSEE, Fla., May 6.—Governor Trammell today signed the Davis "package" bill, a saloon regulation measure. It goes into effect on October 1, 1915, and after that date it will be illegal to sell liquor in less than half-pint quantity and in sealed packages only; removes all screens and protecting doors from saloons; makes it impossible to serve drinks in hotels, restaurants and clubs, as it is specified that no liquor may be drunk on premises where it is sold.

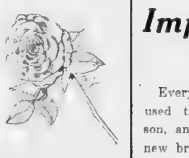

### Delicious Recipes

**Tomato Sauce on Steak.**  
Take one and a half pounds of steak cut in pieces, place in kettle and add one can condensed tomato soup. Add salt and pepper to taste, a piece of butter, three or four onions, one can Italian peppers and a cup of water. Simmer until steak is done.

**A Tasty "Left-Over."**  
Take one can condensed tomato soup, one can of water, and one cup of left-over meats ground or chopped fine. Small onion chopped fine. Season with salt, pepper and butter. Cook fifteen or twenty minutes and turn over buttered toast.

**Try Scrambled Eggs With Tomato Sauce.**  
To the yolks of four to six well-beaten eggs add one cup of tomato soup in its condensed form just as you get it from the grocer. Salt and pepper. Fold in the stiffly-beaten whites, pour into hot skillet, turn lightly with fork, and serve.

**Tomato Soup on Steak.**  
Take one can condensed tomato soup, two tablespoons flour, two tablespoons butter, one and one-half cups milk, eight slices of toast. Melt the butter and add the flour, pour in the milk gradually. When smooth add the can of soup undiluted, when the mixture is hot, serve at once on the toast. A spicy and pleasing novelty.

**Foam Eggs With Tomato Sauce.**  
Heat a can of condensed tomato soup to which has been added a can hot water, one-half teaspoon of salt, a dash of pepper and a small piece of butter. Lay pieces of buttered toast on a deep platter, turn over the tomato sauce. Place poached eggs on top.

**Quick Tomato Sauce.**  
To one can of tomato soup in its condensed form just as it comes from the grocer has been added a can hot water, one-half cup of flour blended in one-cupful of cold water, and bring all to a boil. The result is a rich fine-flavored tomato sauce really made in a "jiffy" and good for any dish where tomato sauce is used.
