INTEGRITY OF SERBIA PRICE TO KEEP PEACE

This Condition of Neutrality Demands Said to Be One of Chief Causes of Delay in Conversations

REPORTED GERMANY HAS DECLARED WAR ON ITALY

Rome Believes War Is Only Question of Days While on Border It Is Believed Question of Only Hours

ROME, May 11.—(Via Paris.)—Although negotiations with Germany and Austria still are pending, and there is a possibility the influence of former Premier Giolitti may avert war, military preparations pointing to Austria as an immediate antagonist are so thorough and vigorous that a conflict seems unavoidable.

Even discussions among the opposition parties virtually have ceased. Only a few respectable socialists whose deputies met in the chamber today still oppose Italy's participation in the war, and their attitude is believed to be governed by a desire to avoid a conflict because of opposition to war.

The Milan Secolo says Italy demanded the withdrawal of Serbia from a condition of neutrality, and that was one of the chief causes of delay in the conversations.

WILSON INTIMATES UNITED STATES CAN AND WILL STAY OUT OF WAR

Force Is Not Needed to Convince Others That We Are Right, President Tells Audience in Philadelphia

(By Associated Press.) PHILADELPHIA, May 11.—President Wilson's first intimation of the policy which should control the course of the United States government in dealing with the situation caused by the loss of American lives on the Lusitania was given in his address here last night to an audience of 15,000 people, including 4,500 naturalized American citizens.

Although his audience interpreted his remarks to mean that the United States will remain at peace but will underwrite a convalescence of Germany of the injustice to humanity growing out of the Lusitania tragedy. "America," said President Wilson, "must have the consciousness that on all sides it touches America and touches America. The example of America must be a special example. 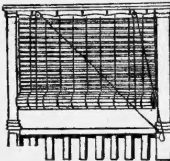

NO HOPE REMAINS OF MORE SURVIVORS OF LOST CORNDOZER

Scarcity of Life Belts Now Blamed for Heavy Death Roll of American Men, Who Gave Them to Women

(By Associated Press.) QUEENSTOWN, May 11.—Recovery today of the body of Albert Thompson, of Toronto, found by an admiralty trawler near the coast not far from the coast of the Louisiana disaster, led to the hope that additional bodies might be found in that vicinity. Ten unidentified bodies already have been landed at Baltimore, forty-seven men and one woman west of Cork. All hope of finding survivors now has been abandoned.

A current of from two and one-half to three knots across Old Head Kinale, and this has been augmented by a stiff east wind, which all the bodies around Cape Clear, on the west Irish coast. The winds ordinarily prevailing would have blown the bodies ashore on the Atlantic coast of Cornwall, England.

The Cunard company, after much trouble, has sent a tug to the scene of the disaster with instructions to run into the nearest cove and inform Cunard officials here if even a single body is found.

Sixteen bodies were brought into Queenstown by a tug chartered by the Cunard line. None of the bodies has yet been identified.

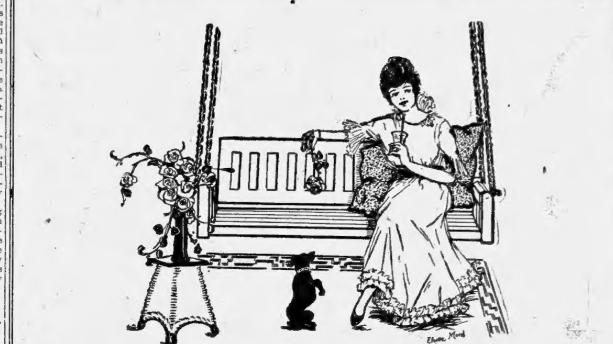
