

WILSON IS LAUDED AT BRENAN COMMENCEMENT

Nation's Greatest President, Says Dr. R. T. Torrey in Sermon to Graduates

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) GAINESVILLE, Ga., May 31.—In a powerful sermon to the graduating class of Brenan college Sunday morning Dr. R. A. Torrey, who noted Los Angeles minister and evangelist, declared Woodrow Wilson will rank in the after history of America as the greatest president the United States ever had. His sense of the strength and of the calm hand with which the president is guiding the nation through this crisis.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., May 31.—General Villa has lost approximately 8,000 men, about one-third of his force, in an attempt to drive the strongly entrenched Carranza army from the town of Elito, according to a dispatch received here from Agnes Caliente. The dispatch also stated that Villa's line of communication with his base of supplies is threatened by the advance of General Eulalio Gutierrez against Carranza, an important railroad center north of Agnes Caliente.

May Be Fat, Yet Underfed
(Detroit.) The majority of people do not understand that a person may be fat, excessively fat, and still be underfed and weak from lack of proper nourishment. The way to eat to excess is to eat too much bread, oats and sweet and as a result be rolling in fat and at the same time show a severe case of malnutrition, evidenced by lack of strength in muscular effort or mental concentration.

The system needs these foods, for they are known as the "fuel foods," because they furnish the body heat but the system also needs an abundance of the very elements of which the body is made, either the muscular fiber or blood. These muscle-making foods are fresh meat, eggs and milk, fresh vegetables and fruits.

If one is in the habit of eating rather soft or a mixed diet and is growing fat upon it, then reduce the amount of wheat starches and bread and find plenty of nourishment in the muscle-making foods.

"Friendship Strengthened by Bonds of Blood," They Declare

LONDON, May 31.—King Victor Emmanuel and King George have exchanged telegrams of felicitations over Italy's entry into the war. The message of King Italian king says: "The ancient traditional friendship between the Italian and English people has been strengthened by bonds of blood in a war against a common enemy. With an ardent hope for victory, I send Your Majesty my cordial and friendly salutation."

"I have received with much pleasure Your Majesty's telegram, and I hasten to return it most cordially and sincerely to the sentiments which you so kindly expressed. It is a source of deep gratification to me that our two countries now are closely allied in a great and noble cause against a common enemy, and I feel complete confidence in the success of our united efforts in conjunction with those of our allies."

"I beg Your Majesty to accept my best wishes for your welfare and for that of Italy, the old and valued friend of my country."

SAVANNAH STEAMER SUNK BY GERMAN SUBMARINE

Vessel Was Flying British Flag and Carried Cotton and Steel Cargo

(By Associated Press.) SAVANNAH, May 31.—The British steamer Dixiana, Brunswick and Steamship Co. Havre and Port Talbot, with a cargo of cotton and steel billets, has been sunk off the French coast near Ushant, by a German submarine, according to telegraphic advice to the agents of the Dixiana Steamship company here today. The captain and crew are reported saved.

The Dixiana is owned by G. D. M. Strachan, of Brunswick, N. H. The British flag was hoisted on the ship by Mr. Strachan and stated that the captain of the Dixiana and the crew had been safely landed at Swansea.

The Dixiana was loaded with cotton and steel billets and steel from Brunswick and Savannah. The cotton was for Havre and the steel billets for Port Talbot. VETERANS IN RICHMOND GREETED BY SUNNY SKIES

Virginia Capital Thronged With Thousands of Old Soldiers for 1915 Reunion

(By Associated Press.) RICHMOND, Va., May 31.—Richmond's streets were crowded today with the 40,000 or more veterans of the gray uniform of the Confederacy, who came by hundreds on every train for the 1915 reunion of the United Confederate Veterans. General headquarters is alive with activity; registering the old soldiers, issuing their official badges, directing them to state headquarters and assigning them to hotels, homes, or tented Camp Stuart as the case may be. The so-called "Long Season" in May, wet, cold and gloomy, gave way to the night to clear, sunnier skies and to cool, crisp weather, which probably says will continue through June 1, 2 and 3 of the reunion. A striking incident of today was the unveiling in the Louisiana room, at President Davis mansion, of a bust of General Beauregard. Unhappily, a Louisiana man, passing the bronze plaques, took a kick off its pedestal and it was shattered. The Louisiana Women's association in charge of the occasion, at once announced that the bust would be replaced and the unveiling proceeded.
