ENGLAND PROVE LUSTANIA WAS NOT ARMED, SAYS CARSON

Newer Monitor General Also Denies Ship Was Acting as an Auxiliary to British Naval Forces

SINKING OF SHIP WAS MURDER, HE DECLARES

Fullest Inquiry Courted, He Says, but Adds Admiralty's Instructions to Vessel Will Be Kept Secret

LONDON, June 15.—"The Lusitania was not armed and she never was fitted out as a transport," said Sir Edward Carson, attorney general in the cabinet, in addressing the court of inquiry this morning at the opening of the board of trade inquiry into the loss of the Cunard liner, which was sunk off the Irish coast May 7 by a German submarine with a loss of over 1,100 lives.

Baron Mersey, president of the court, is assisted by Admiral Sir Frederick English and Lieutenant Commander H. G. B. Smith, who are acting as naval assessors, and Captain Davies and Captain Speeding, of the Cunard company and the passengers of the Lusitania, including the late Alfred G. Vanderbilt, all were present by counsel.

WILD PROVE CONTENTION

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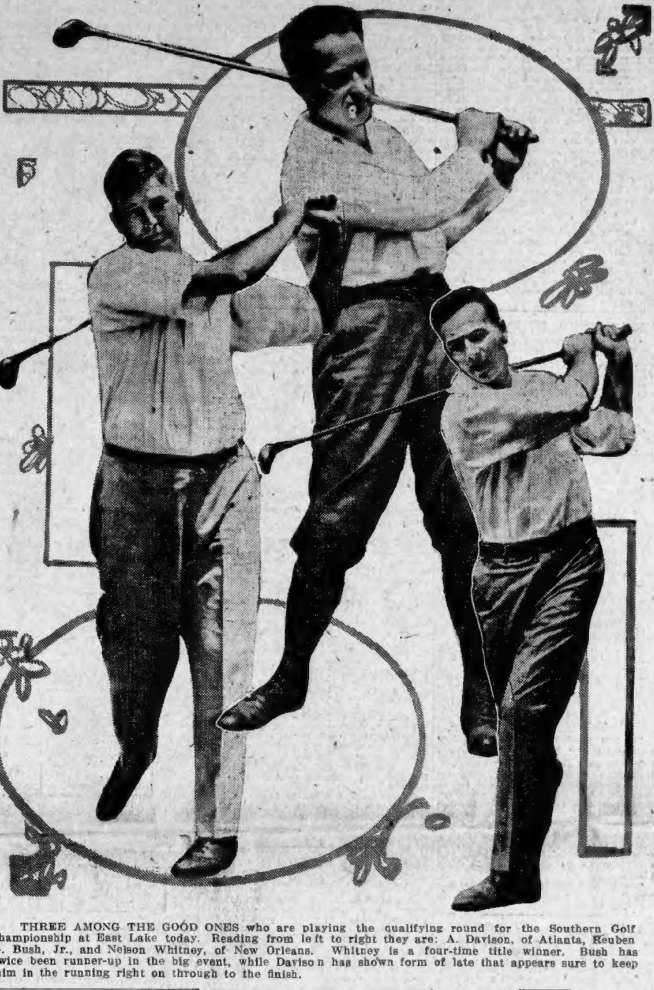
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C. L. DEXTER MAKES BEST SCORE SO FAR IN GOLF TOURNAMENT

INCREASE IS VOTED IN BUSINESS LICENSE TAX
Tax Committee Will Recommend 25 Per Cent Raise in About Eighty Classes

The tax committee of council, which has been working on a plan to revise the tax ordinance, has today agreed to report a 25 per cent increase in the license cost for about 80 classes of business.

The tax committee originally reported an increase of about 50 per cent in the 80 classes changed, but council sent the measure back to the committee in order that business men might have a hearing. The protest was effective to the extent of inducing the committee to increase the license cost from 25 per cent to 50 per cent. Any increase, however, is certain to be fought on the floor of council next Monday when the committee makes its second report.

The committee was informed by the city attorney that council has no legal right to refuse licenses to vendors of revenue, so the change relative to the license cost was struck from the tax ordinance, has been inserted again.

The tax committee has directed the city attorney to prepare an ordinance which will have the effect of the prohibition of the sale of unwrapped ice cream or ice cream cones on the street, fresh meats from street wagons, and the operation of bootblack stands on the street.

JITNEY CALLED TAXI-CAB STILL JITNEY UNDER LAW
Can't Escape Regulation by Railroad Commission by Changing Name

Jitneys cannot escape regulation by the railroad commission, simply by calling themselves public hack or taxi-cabs. The old usage to the effect that a "taxi" is any other name is just as correct as the old usage in the case of the jitneys.

Information has been brought to the state railroad commission that a number of the operators of jitneys in Augusta have had the commission assumed jurisdiction of this class of transportation, labelled their vehicles as cabs, and that they hope in this way to escape regulation by the commission. From other Georgia cities come word that the jitneys are being labelled taxi-cabs.

When these facts were related at the office of the commission Tuesday afternoon was called to the order of the commission, in which it holds the jitneys to be common carriers, and, therefore, subject to regulation.

This order refers to motor vehicles as jitneys. The commission broadly takes jurisdiction over the business of the common carriers in operation of automobiles, auto-buses or other motor cars upon regular schedules, or over definite routes, or between definite points or termini for the transportation of persons for hire.

IT IS JUST AS EASY to catch the disease often is suggested by suggestion as it is that suggestion often is all that is needed to cure disease.

Anything, indeed, can verify this for himself by a simple experiment. Let him concentrate his thoughts on the tip of one of his fingers.

For the same reason they insist that the less people are told of the details of their bodily health the better their health will be.

Let him make a diagnosis, and if he pronounces the trouble not at all serious, cease to worry about it.

No great crisis in the affairs of a nation has been met by the press with such calmness, yet such unanimity of conviction, as the German-American crisis which is just now making world history.

The man who is judicious, cool, calm, and self-controlled need not fear the malign power of suggestion.

The spirit of freedom is the spirit of the age. It is the spirit of the future. It is the spirit of the world.

It would be a sad evidence of decadence, and the sure forerunner of further insult and greater injury, if the United States should pursue the narrow policy recommended by a secretary of state who was willing to demand redress until it seemed probable that the United States would be in a spirit of friendship.

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MENTAL HYGIENE--II. How It Is Practiced.

DO YOU EVER say one word when you intend to use another? Do you sometimes have dreams into which float ideas that are strange and inexplicable to you? Do you ever catch yourself, in conversation, assuming a position to which you were not quite entitled?

Such mental vagaries as these, experienced by almost everyone, are the result of a disordered mind. The mind is a vast storehouse of ideas, and it is just now coming into public notice. Almost everyone is familiar with the term "psychiatrist," but few know the operations of the mind.

The method of the psychiatrist, in brief, is to devote into the diseased mind, find the problem or sorrow that is the cause of the mental derangement.

This, for example, is a comparatively simple case: Patient Smith has happily and successfully had his mental balance. Smith tells the doctor of a collapsible umbrella he has invented that may be folded up and put into a pocket.

The untrained doctor, with the mentally deranged might draw the conclusion that there was a man who had lost his mind in attempts to perfect inventions and the worth of this is not estimated.

Mr. Jones, a strong, wholesome, handsome woman, is quite wildly insane. From her ravings it is gathered that she has been married and has a husband who now pays little attention to his home life.

But the psychiatrist must save this estimable woman from a mental collapse. To do so he probes deeply into her mind and into her past.

Mr. Jones tells of dreaming of her husband, her children, the other man, and of her father. Probably the father is present in more of the dreams than is the husband.

ONE OF MR. BRYAN'S IDEAS

Mr. Bryan's belief that American passengers should keep off the unarmed merchant ships of belligerents and the entire class of contraband goods, and that their cargoes is admitted by himself to have no basis in law.

Dr. William A. White, superintendent of this institution, is one of the nation's pioneers in this work. Finding that there were no specialists to be had he set out developing them.

The specialists who had been developed at the institution converted their hospital into a factory and the new recruits were put through a schooling of three months on the institution's specialty, the healing of the deranged mind.

Mr. Bryan's general attitude, indeed, is destructive of the established right to be sacrificed in the name of neutrality. It is to insist on neutral rights.

SCHOOL BOARD ADOPTS NEW SALARY SYSTEM

Salaries Are Readjusted and Grammar Grade Teachers Put on Merit System

With a few minor changes, the board of education Monday adopted the Aldine Chambers resolution readjusting the salaries of school officers and placing all grammar grade teachers in the merit system. The resolution must have the approval of city council before it becomes effective.

Two members of the board voted against the resolution, Commissioners Jesse W. Armistead and W. H. Terrell. Mr. Terrell argued that it would inject politics into the school system because every teacher would be using what influence she could to get in one of the six groups where she would be paid a higher salary.

As a remedy to this objection, Dan W. Green introduced an amendment, which was passed, that teachers shall be reported on annually by directors, supervisors, principals, superintendents and assistant superintendents; these reports to be based on scholarship, preparation, experience and efficiency. They will be made to the board by number and not by name, so that in classifying the teachers into the different groups the board will not know who is who, but will judge solely on an impartial basis.

SIX GROUPS. The resolution as adopted divides the teachers into six groups, the minimum salary, that of the first group, being \$400, and the maximum salary, that of the sixth group, being \$1800. Mr. Hatcher moved that the sixth group be stricken from the resolution, on the ground that a teacher should not receive more salary than an assistant principal. He stated that in Atlanta teachers were paid too high a salary, and cited statistics from Baltimore, Washington and Richmond showing that the minimum salaries in those cities were lower than in Atlanta.

Aldine Chambers opposed Mr. Hatcher's views, declaring that the sixth group, if left in, would furnish an incentive to every teacher in the city to take an interest in the schools and do all she could at all times to excel in her work. He stated that the minimum salaries in those cities were lower than in Atlanta.

Mr. Hatcher's motion to strike group six was lost, but in order to make this group difficult of achievement Chairman Quinn introduced an amendment which was adopted, requiring that teachers eligible for promotion must make a scholarship grade of 90 per cent, must have certificates of professional training and must have an average grading of at least 95 per cent in the reports of directors, supervisors and principals.

VACATION SCHOOL WORK. The resolution also makes the teachers subject to the vacation school eleven months in the year, but it was stated that a teacher would probably be required to work about a month or about one summer in ten years in the vacation schools. Teachers are to be paid \$14 a week, to be received over in all, for teaching in the vacation schools.

In fixing the salaries of school officers, Dan W. Green moved to change that part of the resolution which fixes the salary of superintendent from \$2600 to \$4000 a year. He said it had been agreed that there was a sort of agreement among the board members to cut the salary of the superintendent in order to increase the superintendent's, and that he, for one, did not want to be open to this objection. Chairman Quinn explained that the superintendent's increase of \$400 was made because the resolution provided that he shall act as secretary to the board, a position which has heretofore been filled at a salary of \$200 a year. The board then voted the increase.

Several members made a fight on the resolution fixing salaries for music directors and drawing directors. It was moved by Aldine Armistead to strike out all salaries of drawing inspectors. The vote on the question was a tie—5 to 5. A motion to strike out salaries of musical directors was also lost.

The board on request of Miss Jessie Muse, principal of the Girls' High school, voted to make a course in household arts elective with the senior class of the Girls' High school. This course is now required of third year pupils.

Ministers Appeal To Mayor and Council And Call Mass Meeting For Next Sunday 3:30 P. M.

Atlanta, Ga., June 14, 1915.

WHEREAS, 220 beer saloons, more or less, and 20 locker clubs, are today operating in the City of Atlanta under Federal Liquor licenses;

WHEREAS, Under the law of Georgia, the possession of a Federal liquor license is prima facie evidence of guilt of violation of the prohibition law of Georgia, putting upon the holder of said license the burden of proving that he is not violating said law;

WHEREAS, Section 1673 of the Code of the City of Atlanta, attempting to legalize the sale of drinks containing 4% of alcohol, which is an intoxicant, authorizes in effect the violation of the law of Georgia;

WHEREAS, 147 and more of these saloons and 17 locker clubs—each one of which has in its possession a United States Liquor license prima facie evidence of guilt of violating the prohibition law of Georgia and a purpose to continue violating the same—are applying for renewal of license,

BE IT RESOLVED, that:

FIRST: We appeal to the Mayor and General Council to refuse to license said saloons and locker clubs.

SECOND: We appeal to the Mayor and Council to revoke those licenses not expiring July 1st.

THIRD: We appeal to the Mayor and General Council to repeal Section 1673 of the Code of the City of Atlanta.

FOURTH: Be it also resolved that to further consider and urge our protest against the violation of our laws and the manifest evils of the liquor traffic in our city, we call for a mass meeting of citizens next Sunday afternoon at 3:30 o'clock in the Grand Opera House.

FIFTH: Be it further resolved that the Chairman of this meeting be instructed to transmit immediately to the Mayor and General Council copies of these resolutions, and that thereafter the resolutions be published in the papers of Atlanta.

"Well, there you are," said Con carelessly.

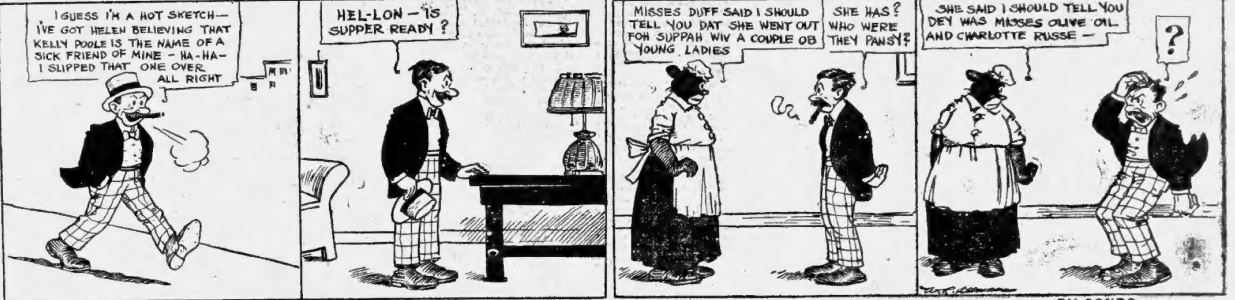

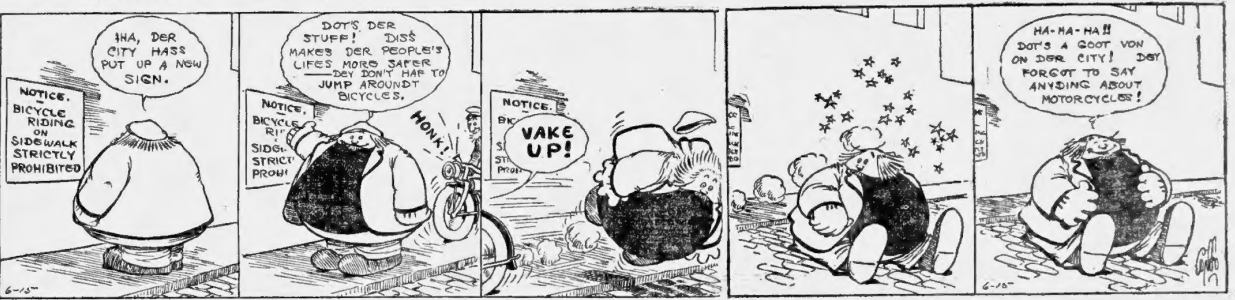

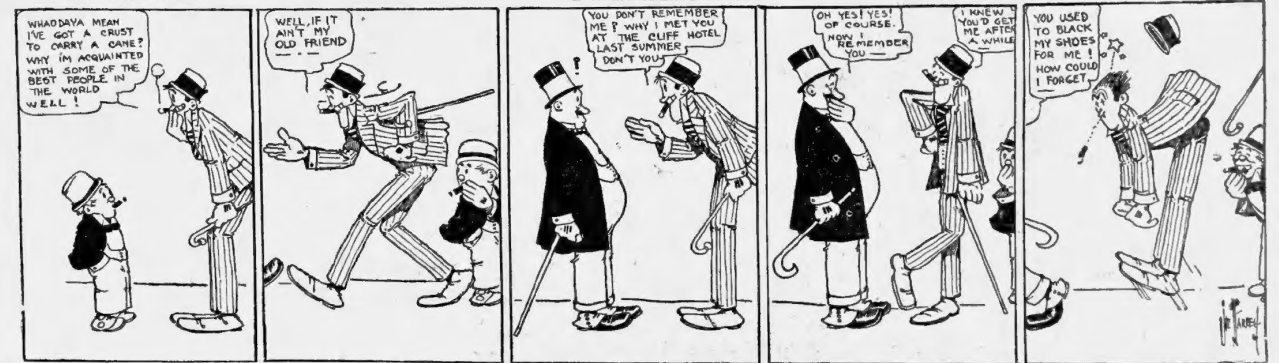

Anna Pawlowa's Daily Lesson In Dancing New Social Steps



Progressing from the salutation that closes the first figure in the Pawlowa, the dancers next move backward. They take three steps, of a different sort from those going forward, being shorter, and are taken with the ball of each foot being kept constantly on the floor.

From the lady's attitude of salutation she turns toward her partner and places her right foot forward and hand on his left forearm. The dancers are now standing with their weights nearly evenly distributed between both feet, the lady's left and cavalier's right arms elevated and somewhat back of them, almost as they were when the salutation was made.

The backward three steps are taken as follows: The lady on the "one" count stepping first with the left; then on the "two" count, bringing up the right foot so that the heel of her step comes nearly to the left instep; taking another short backward step on the left foot, on the third count and standing quiet on the "four" count.

There is relatively little difference between the steps and movements of the lady and her cavalier. He is at her left, and when she steps backward on her left foot he proceeds with his right, the alternating being only that required in their difference in positions.

After the fourth count of the music the dancers then start on the first of the next measure, to finish the figure with a salutation—much as the first figure was embellished. This salutation is somewhat more elaborate than the first one, requiring the lady to swing her hair around, so that she is facing her partner, whose bodily position is almost as much turned toward her.

From her pose at the conclusion of the backward three steps, the lady now takes two steps, first on her left foot,

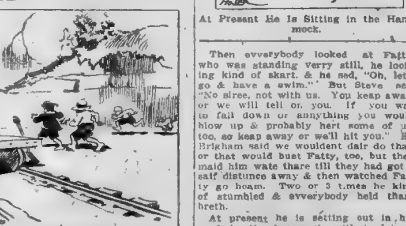

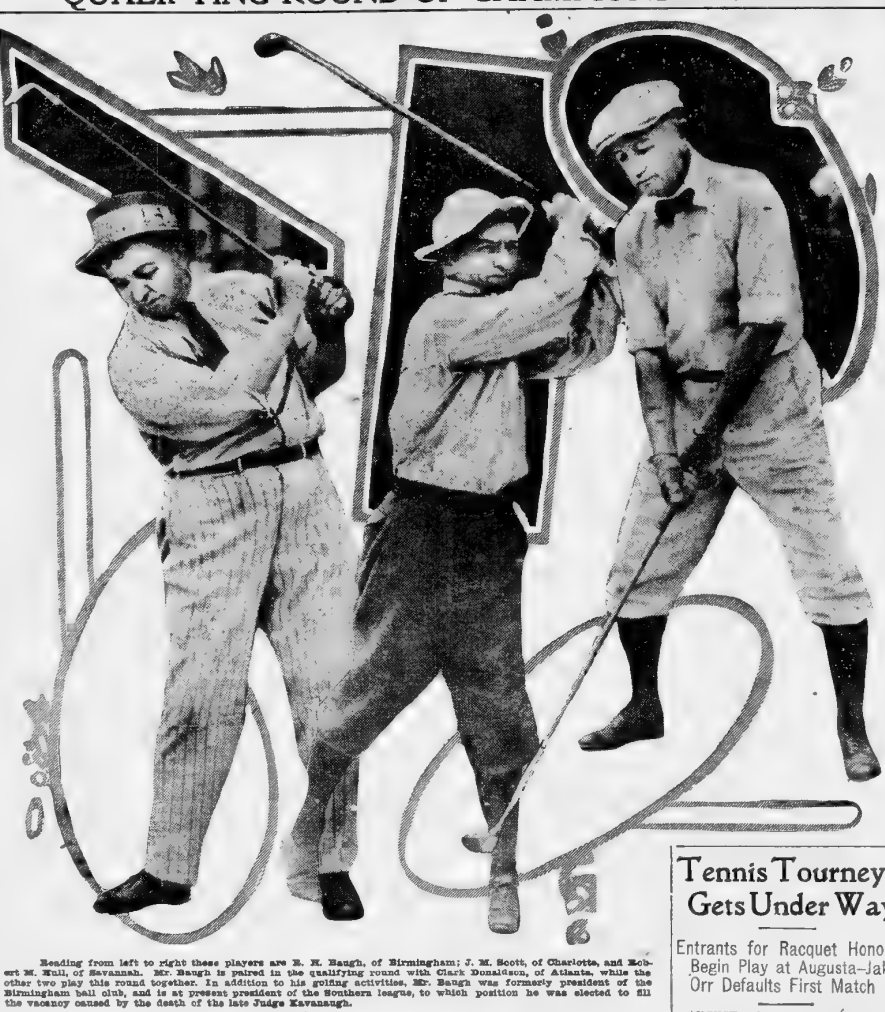

Austria Pulls Men Off Serbian Front to Stop Italian Rush

ROME, June 14.—(By Associated Press.) The following official statement was issued last night at the headquarters of the Italian general staff.

There have been no important developments along the Tyrol-Frentino frontier. The enemy persistently attacked Montpage at night, after an all-day bombardment from Forts Flax and Wiesse, but was repulsed each time.

Our artillery caused the explosion of ammunition depots towards Corte, in the Cortevole valley, and seriously damaged the enemy's works at Cassan.

Our bombardment of Malbergoth, in Carnia, resulted in an explosion in the lower part of the fortress.

Further reports of the night attack of Italian Alpinists in the difficult region of the Alps of Volca give details of considerable booty taken there, besides a number of prisoners, who were terrorized by the impetuosity of our troops.

Our batteries dispersed a camp of enemy in the region of Montebello. All prisoners taken near Piava (in the Isonzo region) agree that the Austrian losses up to this time have been serious. Most of the prisoners belonged to the regiment of mountain troops operating against the Serbians.

The Austrians retreated yesterday to cut the forest of Montebello, but our troops drove back the enemy and extinguished the flames.

Turks Claim Advance on Russians in Caucasus

On the Caucasian front we occupied enemy positions in the direction of Ouzumli on the Russian border in the Caucasus.
